

# RU admission seekers' plight

The admission tests for the honours programme of Rajshahi University (RU) under 2018-19 session begins today, and every year, aspirants are facing serious accommodation crisis.

For those who have no relatives or acquaintances in the city or its surrounding areas, the sufferings have escalated as most residential hotels, rest houses and private dormitories are already booked.

Around 88,543 admission seekers and their guardians have already started swarming the city for the two-day tests.

Many RU students are helping out as much as they can in this regard.

Robiul Alam, who lives in the city's Binodpur area, said, "Three of us [RU students] share a room, still we have taken in seven admission seekers."

Even the university dormitories are packed to the brim. The 17 halls, 11 for male and six for female students, with a capacity of 8,000 students, are accommodating more than double the capacity.

Rana Talukdar, an aspirant, staying at a hall, said, "Eight of us are crammed into the room."

Finding no other alternatives, many are also staying at mosques on the campus.

Many aspirants alleged that owners of private dormitories are charging them extra. Meanwhile, two admission seekers were reportedly robbed off their valuables around 1:00am on Saturday night.

RU Proctor Prof Lutfur Rahman said, "We have instructed the hall authorities to remain empathetic to the admission seekers and accommodate them as much as possible."

"We have also requested law enforcers to take actions against private dormitories charging students extra." He said they were also implementing tight security measures in and around the campus during the tests.

The law clearly states it's illegal and there were protests by locals, yet the Sadar upazila sports field, now known as Sheikh Russel Mini Stadium in Sylhet's Shahi Eidgah area is once again being set up as a venue for Sylhet International Trade Fair 2018, denying children and youths their right to play.

In March last year, the field was declared Sheikh Russel Mini Stadium by the National Sports Council (NSC), ushering development work on the field, which was finished in the middle of this year.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday inaugurated 66 upazila-level mini stadiums -- named after Sheikh Russel -- including the Sadar upazila sports field in Sylhet, through a videoconference.

Still, work for setting up the fair, scheduled to be held next month, is continuing in full swing. This has been a recurring theme for the ground, which is used more often for trade fairs and cattle markets than serving as a sporting ground.

The Daily Star also published a report headlined, "Fair playing foul", on November 11, 2017, highlighting the issue.

Sylhet Chamber of Commerce and Industry (SCCI) is organising the fair, after the field was allotted to them by the district administration.

Last year, it was arranged by Sylhet Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce and Industry (SMCCI).

The field used to be under the supervi-

The newspaper also spoke to a few locals in the area, who seemed agitated by the recurring decision of the authorities concerned.

Mobarok Hossain, a businessman, said, "The field was developed for sports. Just last month, a cricket tournament was held here. But now, they have stopped all sporting activities and started messing it up."

"We protested them and are doing so now, but all our protests fell on deaf ears," he said.

Another local, Mohammad Mizan, said, "At least we are lucky that they [authorities] did not allot the field for cattle market this year."

Abdul Karim Kim, secretary of Bangladesh Poribesh Andolok, Sylhet, said, "Instead of holding the fair on the field, the organisers can arrange it inside a convention hall or community centre."

Kim, also the coordinator of Concerned Citizens' Movement, said, "Also, there are unused open land in the city, where such events can be held."

Last December, when the field was allotted to SMCCI by Sadar upazila authorities, Ashfaque Ahmed, chairman of Sylhet Sadar upazila, had said it would be for the last time, and after completing the development works on the field, it would not be allotted for such purposes again.

Contacted, Ashfaque, also vice-president of Sylhet district unit of Awami League, said, "The field is now in possession of district administration, not Sadar upazila. They gave permission to SCCI to hold the fair."

# Father Marino Rigon laid to rest in Mongla

Father Marino Rigon, a recipient of "Friends of Liberation War Honour" -- who died in October last year in Italy, was laid to rest yesterday at Shelabunia Church cemetery in Mongla of Bagerhat.

Honouring his last wish, Father Marino's mortal remains were buried at the cemetery of the church that he founded, after he came to Bangladesh in 1953 to spread the teachings of Christianity.

Earlier, the coffin with his remains arrived at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport in Dhaka on a Turkish Airlines flight. It reached Bagerhat around 9:45am and the burial was completed by 3:00pm, said Iqbal Bahar Chowdhury, officer-in-charge of Mongla Police Station.

A guard of honour was given to the Father at the churchyard, where people

from all walks of life paid tributes to him at Mongla Upazila Parishad ground, the OC added.

Khulna city Mayor Talukder Abdul Khaleque, Superintendent of Police in Bagerhat Pankoj Chandra Roy, and Bagerhat Deputy Commissioner Tapan Kumar Biswas were present on the occasion, among others.

Italian national Father Rigon was given honorary citizenship of Bangladesh in 2009 and was conferred the "Friends of Liberation War Honour" award in 2012, for his support and contribution during the country's war of independence in 1971.

During Bangladesh's Liberation War, Father Rigon was at Baniarchar Church in Gopalganj. He provided support and medical treatment to sick and injured freedom fighters, and actively took part in the war.

After Bangladesh's its independ-

ence, he made Shelabunia of Mongla his permanent residence.

Father Rigon translated 40 books throughout his life, including Gitanjali by Rabindranath Tagore, 350 folk songs by Lalon Shah and Naksikantha Maath, Sojan Badiyan Chaat and a number of poems by Jasim Uddin.

"I have Rabindranath in my head and Lalon in my heart," Francis Sudan Halder, former headteacher of St Paul's High School, quoted Father Rigon as saying often.

He also established 17 institutions including St Paul's High School, St Paul's Hospital and St Paul's Sewing Education Center (a Naksikantha workshop for women).

In 2014, when the priest fell gravely ill with cardiac disease, his brother took him to Italy. Father Rigon breathed his last at age 92 on October 20 in 2017, in Vicenza.

## PKSF CONFERENCE Teens promise to work for country's welfare

More than seven hundred teenagers at an adolescent conference yesterday took an oath to work for the welfare of the country as well as for humanity.

They also promised to keep themselves away from extremism, negative thinking and harmful activities, and build self-confidence.

Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation (PKSF), a government-run institution to fund rural development and provide training, brought the boys and girls together at the conference -- held at Bangabandhu International Conference Centre -- through a competition.

The 710 teenagers were selected through a talent hunt, under which they took various tests on history, traditions and culture of Bangladesh. They were selected from 1 lakh participants from 11,000 educational

institutions from across the country.

The participants took part in the conference as future change agents and would work in various areas including social awareness-building for sustainable development.

Speakers at the conference enlightened the teenagers on different issues and challenges Bangladesh is facing today, and how to overcome those.

Finance Minister Abul Maal Abdul Muhith in his chief guest's address said, "We've defeated poverty in many respects. But 3 crore people are still below the poverty line. Of them, 1 crore are extreme poor."

To ensure development of this huge number of people, it is necessary to continue the trend of progress for seven to 10 more years, he said. Only then the poverty level will come down to below 10 percent.

## JOB REGULARISATION Sylhet Palli Bidyut workers go on strike

Meter readers and messengers of Palli Bidyut Samity in Sylhet enforced an indefinite strike yesterday to press home their four-point demand, including regularisation of their jobs.

Their other demands are reinstating all certified employees, who left their jobs on completion of agreement, to their previous positions, reducing work pressure and withdrawal of the district quota system.

The demonstrators held a gathering in front of the offices of Sylhet Palli Bidyut Samity 1 and 2 with placards reading their demands.

They said they will continue the strike until their demands are met.

Samity officials said following the strike, preparation of electricity bill will be disrupted.

Anuj Chowdhury, one of the meter readers, said each of them used to read 2,000 electricity meters and each messenger handed over copies of the bills to consumers on a monthly basis.

But now, one person -- either the reader or the messenger -- has to do the entire work due to manpower crisis, he said.

Like him, many other meter readers alleged that some officials trying to put work pressure on them so that they quit their jobs.

The demonstrators said the number of meter readers and messengers is only 100 who have to cover the entire district.

The general managers of the Samity 1 and 2 could not be contacted over the phone despite repeated attempts.

## Rajshahi concert pays tribute to Ayub Bachchu

Ayub Bachchu was slated to perform at a concert in Rajshahi yesterday, and while his fate was written otherwise, thousands of music lovers of the city, and the performing musicians at the event, paid rich tributes to the recently-deceased rock icon.

The concert, titled "Shekorer Sandhaney" held at the city's Liberation War Memorial Stadium, began with a one-minute silence to pay respects to Bachchu, who passed away in the capital on Thursday of a cardiac arrest, at the age of 56.

And then, as the organisers played one of

his most iconic songs "Sei Tumi" on the loudspeakers, the audience sang their hearts out in unison, waving the flashlights of their cell phones in the air.

Other performers at the concert, including Abdul Kuddus Boyati, Chisti Baul, Oyshee, Ringku, Jane Alam, Reshma, Pulok and Shamim also remembered Ayub Bachchu, dedicated their songs to Bachchu, a pioneering guitarist and the founder of popular band LRB.

More than 10,000 people enjoyed the concert, organised by the cultural affairs ministry with an aim to spread the ideologies of the Liberation War and promote the government's development activities.
