


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

# Politics shows positive signs

Both ruling, opposition parties seem willing to end standoff over election

The state of politics in the run up to the upcoming parliamentary polls looks quite different from what prevailed in 2006 and

The first week of the 90-day timeframe from October 31 for holding the polls saw some positive signs like talks between the ruling and opposition parties and deferral of the election schedule by the Election Commission.

The EC had earlier decided to announce the schedule on November 4 but on that day deferred it to November 8. The announcement could be delayed further as hinted by a senior ruling AL leader.

The most significant thing is the absence of a violent street agitation by the opposition parties for mounting pressure on the government to meet their demands ahead of the polls.

But violent agitation was common before and in the first weeks of the 90-day countdown to polls in 2006 and 2013. And both sides remained rigid on their stances, diminishing efforts to resolve the crisis.

In 2006, the AL-led alliance vehemently opposed former chief justice KM Hassan, who was supposed to become the chief adviser, and then chief election commissioner Justice Aziz, who was embroiled in controversy over a flawed voter list.

Its archrival, the then ruling BNP, stood by Justice Hassan and Justice Aziz terming the opposition demand unconstitutional.

The 2006 crisis led to the 1/11 changeover and installation of a military-backed caretaker government in 2007. The AL-led grand alliance won a landslide in the 2008 election under that caretaker rule.

Later in 2011, the government abolished the caretaker system.

The BNP-led opposition alliance took a rigid stance in 2013 on its demand for election under a neutral and non-party administration and refused to join the polls with the AL in power.

### Quiet but deadly, Taijul lends hope

Tigers need 321 to win first Test

Despite his outstanding entry into the international cricket when he took five wickets across two innings of his debut Test, Bangladesh left-arm spinner Taijul Islam has never been feted as a superstar.

The spinner has quietly been playing his role without much fuss and that was the case again yesterday at the Sylhet International Stadium, where his second five-for of the match repaired some of the damage done by the batsmen being bundled out for 143 in the first innings and conceding a lead of 139. Taijul's five wickets for 62 runs helped bowl out Zimbabwe for 181 in their second innings, setting up an unlikely but still possible chase of 321 that the home side will resume today on 26 without loss.

#### Complete all examinations by Dec 10

Govt asks schools as JS polls ahead

The government has rescheduled and brought forward the dates of all primary and secondary school final exams so that students do not face any problems during the 11th national election, likely to be held in late December.

Officials of the Directorate of Primary Education and the education ministry said they had already issued directives to all the schools concerned to complete their final exams by December 10 as per the time frame given by the Election Commission.

## School offers more than education

MD ASADUZ ZAMAN, back from Sirajganj

Children at Sirajganj's Kagmari char are now free from the hassle of making risky journeys to school on boats. They thank O Aa Ka Kha School, the brainchild of Sirajganj resident Dr Nazmul Islam, for that. The school not only saves the little learners' time but also provides them with education materials at a monthly fee of Tk 10 only.

It all started in 2016 when Nazmul, a graduate of Gonoshasthaya Samaj Vittik Medical College, received a blow in his persuasion of MBBS after he failed in a course on surgery. But instead of lamenting over it, Nazmul made the best possible use of his time by setting up the school in Savar

on the outskirts of Dhaka. In January this year, he extended his vision and established another branch for the children at Kagmari char, which is about 10 kilometres off his home town. Twenty of his friends, who were studying at the same medical school

in Savar, supported him in his mission. Sabina Yasmin, 9, feared that she might end up as a dropout as she had to go to Bhuapur upazila of Tangail to pursue education before O Aa Ka Kha was born.

"Due to safety concerns on the river way, many of my female friends stopped going to the school in Bhuapur," Yasmin told this correspondent recently.

Her friend Swarna Khatun narrated how she braved rain and scorching heat while making the journeys by boat. "Now I can let go off the worry of drowning and happily travel to my new school," said Swarna.
