Still reeling from shock

Shukria Begum, the 11-month-old daughter of Hamida Begum, was having breathing difficulties and was showing signs of diarrhoea in late October. Hamida took her to a nearby doctor at Shahbajpur Bazar of Moulvibazar's Baralekha upazila on 28 October as her condition deteriorated.

The doctor, around 2:00pm, diagnosed her with diarrhoea and pneumonia and asked Hamida to take the child to the upazila health complex immediately.

Despite the health complex being less than 15km away, this put Hamida in trouble. A 48-hour transport strike was underway and there were no forms of public transport on the roads.

"I managed an autorickshaw to take us to the hospital but the local transport workers did not let it move. Around 4:00pm, I hired a rickshaw but the workers let the air of its tyres out.

Malaysia won't allow graft in recruitment

Mahathir Mohamad on foreign workers

Malaysian Prime Minister Mahathir Mohamad has said his government will not allow any corruption in the process of hiring foreign workers into that country.

During the tenure of the previous government, there was a lot of corruption involving the employment of or the bringing in of foreign workers, reports Bernama, state news agency of Malaysia.

"Now we have a proper policy for foreign workers. We do not allow any corruption or buying or selling of workers or the smuggling of workers," said Mahathir, leader of the new government that came to power in May.

"We want only people that have jobs in Malaysia to come in," he said during a dialogue session at a Malaysia-Japan business conference in Tokyo on Tuesday, second day of his three-day visit to Japan.

The robber was identified as Salauddin, alias Sajal alias Kamal alias Aslam, 39, from Gosairhat upazila.

Abdul Momen, superintendent of police in Shariatpur, said a team from the Detective Branch (DB) of police arrested Salauddin from Kajirhat in Jajira upazila on Tuesday, reports UNB.

Project approval spree continues

Govt okays 28 more development schemes ahead of election

The government yesterday approved 28 projects involving Tk 30,234 crore. The Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (Ecnec) approved the projects at a meeting the day before the Election Commission announces the polls schedule today.

On Sunday, the government approved 39 other development projects involving Tk 86,687 crore, the second biggest allocation for development projects in a single Ecnec meeting under the present government.

In December 2016, Ecnec approved the Rooppur Nuclear Power Plant, the country's biggest ever project in terms of costs, requiring an estimated Tk 1,13,092.91 crore.

Between July and September, 75 projects, involving Tk 56,819 crore, have been Okayed.

At least 82 projects, involving Tk 88,782 crore, have been approved in October.

Two Ecnec meetings in the last seven days had approved 67 projects involving Tk 1,16,921 crore. Planning minister AHM Mustafa Kamal said, "Many of you may ask whether

the projects are politically motivated. But you know we work for the people...." These projects will contribute to reducing poverty and cutting unem-

ployment, he said. One of the 28 projects approved yesterday is of purchasing vehicles for Rab and constructing flats government officials in Chattogram.

Superbugs to 'kill millions' by 2050

Warn experts, blame misuse of drugs

Millions of people in Europe, North America and Australia will die from superbug infections unless countries prioritise fighting the growing threat posed by bacteria immune to most known drugs, experts predicted yesterday.

The Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) warned of "disastrous consequences" for public healthcare and spending unless basic hospital hygiene is boosted and unnecessary antibiotic use slashed.

Drug-resistant bacteria killed more than 33,000 people in Europe in 2015, according to new research published separately this week.

In a landmark report, the OECD said 2.4 million people could die from superbugs by 2050 and said the cost of treating such infections would balloon to an average of \$3.5 billion (three billion

Runaway train travels 90km

A huge runaway train laden with iron ore had to be derailed remotely after speeding through the Australian outback for almost an hour.

The 268-wagon train started on its solo journey when the driver got down from his cab to carry out an inspection, and was soon hurtling along at up to 110 kilometres (68 miles) per hour.

Mining giant BHP, which owns the fourlocomotive train, decided to derail before it reached the town of Port Hedland near its Western Australia Pilbara site, and flicked the points.

The train crashed off the rails, damaging around 1,500 metres (1,600 yards) of tracks, but hurting no one.

ROHINGYA REFUGEES

UN expert warns of rushed plans for Rohingyas

The United Nations' human rights investigator on Myanmar urged Bangladesh on Tuesday to drop plans to start repatriating hundreds of thousands of Rohingya refugees to Rakhine state this month, warning they would face a "high risk of persecution".

More than 700,000 Rohingya refugees crossed into Bangladesh from western Myanmar, UN agencies say, after Rohingya insurgent attacks on Myanmar security forces in August 2017 triggered a sweeping military crackdown.

The two countries agreed on October 30 to begin the returns to Myanmar in mid-November. The UN refugee agency has already said that conditions in Rakhine state were "not yet conducive for returns". Yanghee Lee, UN special rapporteur on human rights in

Myanmar, said in a statement that she had received credible information from the refugees in Cox's Bazar that "they are in deep fear of their names being on the list to be repatriated, causing distress and anguish". She had not seen any evidence of the government of

Myanmar creating an environment where the Rohingya can return to their place of origin and live in safety with their rights guaranteed. It has "failed to provide guarantees they would not suffer

the same persecution and horrific violence all over again," Lee said. "I urge the governments of Bangladesh and Myanmar to

halt these rushed plans for repatriation," she said. SEE PAGE 13 COL 4
