Education system has to shed colonial legacy

Speakers say at DU conference

Speakers at a conference yesterday urged the government to take proper initiatives to improve the existing education system which still bears "legacy of the British colonial era".

They demanded global-standard education facilities, including focus on information technology and special care for students with disabilities.

A group of educationists and researchers placed the demands at a conference titled "Future of Education: Fellows' Visions" at Nabab Nawab Ali Chowdhury senate building at Dhaka University (DU). In collaboration with the Bangladesh unit of German political foundation Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung (FES), Centre for Genocide Studies of DU organised the conference.

In opening remarks, Professor Imtiaz Ahmed of DU International Relations department said the British introduced an education system in the subcontinent to serve its own interest, and that is why our education system is divided into three mediums: Madrasa, English and Bangla.

"The country should create its own iden-

tity and modernise the education system," he added.

Presenting a research paper on "Educating Children about peace and education: perceptions of the educators of BD", DU Center of Advanced Research in Arts and Social Science's senior fellow Kazi Sameeo Sheesh said children may grow up to be violent in future if they are taught glorification of war and violence in the form of history.

"Lessons on peace should be given to children," he added.

Presenting her research on "Schools of the Future in Bangladesh", Turkish Asian Center for Strategic Studies Director Dr Sevinc Tunali said the country's education system should be reformed in line with the global job market.

She urged teachers to be more practical instead of using traditional methods during lecture delivery.

Presenting a research on "Online Distance Learning (ODL) policy framework for Bangladesh: An empirical perspective", Islamic University of Technology teacher Dr Md Aktaruzzaman said if DU introduces online distance learning method for

The government is mulling distribution of free insulin to disadvantaged

diabetes patients, who cannot survive without the drug on a regular basis. "Destitute people who have type-1 diabetes should get insulin free of

cost. We are considering how we can provide them with the drug," Zahid Malik, state minister for health and family welfare, said yesterday at a press conference organised by the ministry on the occasion of World Diabetes Day [on November 14].

PM inaugurates new Toshakhana Museum

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday urged everyone to work together for upholding the country's dignity and making it a poverty and hunger-free nation.

The PM made the call while inaugurating the newly built State Toshakhana Museum (state depository) near Bangabandhu Military Museum on Bijoy Sarani in Dhaka.

She said during her government's tenure over the last 10 years, living standards of people have improved. "We want to improve the quality of life further," she said.

"We are aspiring to celebrate the golden jubilee of independence through freeing the country from poverty and hunger, and Bangladesh would be a developed nation by 2041," she said.

The five-storey state depository spanning 50,000 square feet area was constructed under the supervision of Bangladesh Army at a cost of about Taka 80 crore.

All gifts received by the president, prime minister, ministers and officials in their official capacity should be deposited to the Toshakhana under the supervision and maintenance of the Cabinet Division.

it the third year in a row that the number of students have dropped. This year, a total of 30,95,123 students have

registered for the test, considered the largest public examination in the country. Of them, 27.04 lakh students are from primary

schools and around 3.18 lakh from madrasas, said the minister. The examinees will take 600-mark examinations on

six subjects in as many days with English on the first day. The tests will end on November 26. "We have already made all-out preparations to hold

the examination in free and transparent manner," said Mostafizur Rahman. He also said the ministry

took special security measures to prepare and distribute question papers.

This year, 3,294 students with special needs will sit for the exams, and they will get additional 30 minutes.

DU 'GHA' UNIT Fresh exam for admission today

Fresh admission test of "Gha" unit under social sciences faculty of Dhaka University will be held today.

University authorities on October 23 decided to hold the test afresh, following a question leak scam, but did not scrap the entire test.

A total of 18,463 admission seekers, who scored the pass mark in the first exam, are eligible to retake the test against 1,615 seats. The hour-long exam will

be held from 3:00pm to 4:00pm at 19 centres inside DU campus. The allegation of the question paper leak surfaced midway through the

test on October 12. Authorities initially denied the allegation, terming it a "digital forgery". In face of protests, the

authorities formed a probe body, which found evidence of question leak. Six people, including an

admission seeker and his father, were arrested over the incident.
