Sources at the medical college said police handed over the body to the BNP leader's family around 4:30am yesterday. He was buried at his family graveyard in Jashore's Keshabpur in the afternoon.

Meanwhile, Chief Election Commissioner KM Nurul Huda yesterday said he would ask the law enforcement agencies to bring those involved in the incident to justice.

Awami League General Secretary Obaidul Quader at a press briefing at the party president's Dhanmondi office said the "killing" of Abu Bakar might be a result of the BNP's internal feud.

He said his party was not involved in the incident. "In no way the Awami League wants to keep the BNP away from the national election."

Earlier on Thursday night, BNP Senior Joint Secretary General Ruhul Kabir Rizvi alleged that Abu Bakar, a four-time chairman of Majidpur Union Parishad in Keshabpur upazila, was killed after he was picked up by law enforcers from the capital.

Thursday, Abu Bakar's nephew Ashikuzzaman said his uncle came to the capital last week to collect a nomination form for contesting the December 30 parliamentary polls from Jashore-6.

He was "abducted" from the capital's Bijoynagar area around 8:30pm on Sunday, a day before he was supposed to be interviewed by the BNP's nomination board, according to the family and local party leaders.

As per the abductors' demand, relatives gave them Tk 1.7 lakh, but yet they killed him, Ashikuzzaman said.

Abu Bakar was staying at room-413 of the Metropolitan Hotel in Paltan area. The hotel's CCTV footage showed that the BNP leader left the hotel around 7:30pm on Sunday with two bags, said Abdul Mannan, manager of the hotel.

Pilot killed

Wednesday, and the party's nomination board finalised candidates for around 250 seats, apparently leaving the rest 50 seats for its partners in the Jatiya Oikyafront and the 20-party, which the BNP leads.

After party nomination is finalised, candidates will have to return to their constituencies to submit the nomination papers to the Returning Officers. The ROs will then scrutinise the papers and accept or reject their bid to run in the December 30 polls. THE JP FACTOR

JP aspirants had collected 2,865 nomination forms. Of them, 780 were called for interviews on Tuesday.

But instead of interviewing them, JP

Chairman HM Ershad, a deposed military ruler, asked his party leaders to leave the matter to him. Ershad, now a special envoy to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, wrote

twice to her, requesting the PM to settle the issue. But he did not get any response yet, JP sources said. "I will make the decision if the party needs to go for another alliance on

political grounds," an apparently frustrated Ershad told his party colleagues and nomination-seekers on Tuesday. Initially, the JP had sought 100

The JP leadership is unhappy that the AL is taking this long to settle the matter, party sources said.

Ershad is likely to hold a meeting with Hasina today to discuss it, said JP

Secretary General ABM Ruhul Amin Howlader.

"We hope to get 50 to 60 seats and the issue will be resolved by tomorrow [today]," he told The Daily Star yester-

GM Quader, co-chairman of the party, said the matter should be settled by today as their candidates needed time to prepare the documents for nomination submission.

10 FOR JAMAAT?

Jamaat leaders cannot contest under their party banner as the Election Commission has cancelled the party's registration following a High Court verdict.

However, they can run as independents or under the banner of alliance partners. Sources say they remain open to both options.

In the past few weeks, Jamaat and BNP leaders sat thrice to discuss seatsharing.

In the first meeting, the BNP agreed to offer the Islamist party five seats against its demand for at least 40. In the second meeting on Monday, the

BNP doubled its offer but Jamaat stuck to its demand. The two allies sat again on Wednesday, but the meeting ended without a decision, BNP sources said. Jamaat leaders are also in talks with

now living in London, by phone, added the sources. In a recent interview with BBC Bangla, Jamaat Secretary General Shafiqur Rahman said they would like

BNP acting chairman Tarique Rahman,

to get 50 to 60 seats. In 2008, Jamaat contested in 39 constituencies under the BNP-led

alliance banner, winning only in two. "This time, we hope to get more seats and we will settle the matter through talks," Golam Parwar, Nayebe-Ameer of Jamaat, told The Daily Star recently.

However, a senior BNP leader said that much had changed since 2008. In the current situation, there is no scope to offer Jamaat more than 20 seats.

The BNP also needs to set aside some seats for its allies in the Jatiya Oikyafront and Liberal Democratic Party. In all, it wants to offer 50 seats to its partners.

had secured a 78-run first innings lead.

West Indies had started the session -- during which nine of the day's 17 fell -- on 187 for six and Dowrich was intent on the attacking mindset that Hetmyer had set before the break. He smoked a six off Mehedi in the second over of the session, but that gain was offset by Nayeem -- bowling with the wiles of a veteran -- in the next over as he beat Devendra Bishoo's attempted sweep and trapped in front with a slightly quicker delivery and got rid of Kemar Roach, also leg-before. From 205 for eight Jomel Warrican helped Dowrich take West Indies to 225 before he was castled by arguably the best delivery of the day. Nayeem looped one up outside the off stump and it spat back through the gate to hit middle stump.

Dowrich then added a four and six off Nayeem's next over before hitting another maximum in the next over by Shakib, which also yielded the wicket of Shannon Gabriel, who was caught at slip to signal the end of West Indies' innings with 246 runs on the board. Dowrich was unbeaten on 63.

Far from driving home the advantage, however, Bangladesh opener Imrul Kayes set the tone in the second over of their second innings by driving left-arm spinner Warrican against the turn and losing his stumps. Soumya Sarkar took the cue and played an airy waft to off-spinner Roston Chase in the

next over and was caught at slip. Firstinnings centurion Mominul Haque was not much better -- after hitting Chase for four through midwicket in the seventh over, he played across the line in the last ball of the over to be trapped plumb in front. Skipper Shakib Al Hasan, when he should have been looking to take the side safely to the close in the fading light, slog-swept Warrican off the second ball he faced to be caught at deep square leg. The quintet was completed when Mohammad Mithun, who continues to look out of his depth at number four, played needlessly back to a Bishoo delivery and was bowled off his pads, ending an 18-run stand with Mushfigur Rahim. Instead of Mahmudullah Riyad, Mehedi came out and along with Mushfigur took the team to the close without any further damage.

Earlier, Bangladesh's innings lasted just 4.4 overs for the addition of nine runs after lower-order batsmen Taijul Islam and Nayeem Hasan resumed the day on 315 for eight. It was time enough for Taijul to unfurl a cover top-order batsman proud, but Nayeem's staunch resistance ended in the 93rd over, when he pushed at a delivery outside off stump from leftarm spinner Warrican and got an edge that was gobbled up by slip. Last man Mustafizur Rahman lasted just two balls as he was trapped in front, giving
