# Pak army backs US peace efforts

Pakistan's army yesterday threw its support behind the latest US efforts for a political settlement with the Afghan Taliban to end a 17-year-old war, urging Washington to leave Kabul as a friend of the region rather than a "failure". The comments by Pakistan's army spokesman, Major-

General Asif Ghafoor, came just after the US special representative for Afghanistan, Zalmay Khalilzad, concluded a visit to the Pakistani capital of Islamabad. "As much as we can, we will facilitate," Ghafoor told a

news conference in the garrison city of Rawalpindi, replying to a query about what Pakistan could do to help the United States negotiate a political settlement with the Taliban.

"What the US is expecting from us, and the foreign office is cooperating with, is that somehow they could have these negotiations with them (Taliban)."

Ghafoor added, "We wish that (the) US leaves Afghanistan as friend of the region, not as a failure." He did not elaborate.

Khalilzad, an Afghan-born veteran US diplomat who served as George W Bush's ambassador to Afghanistan, Iraq and the United Nations, was named by the Trump administration three months ago as a special envoy to negotiate peace.

His visit to Pakistan followed a request from US President Donald Trump to Prime Minister Imran Khan seeking assistance in moving forward peace talks. The overture to Khan came after an exchange of barbed tweets between the leaders last month.

Washington has long been pushing Islamabad to lean on Taliban leaders, who it says are based in Pakistan, to bring them to the negotiating table.

# Australia passes new laws

### Experts warn of global security threat as legislation will allow spies to sneak into encrypted communications

Australia yesterday passed controversial laws allowing spies and police to snoop on the encrypted communications of suspected terrorists and criminals, as experts warned the "unprecedented powers" had far-reaching implications for global cybersecurity.

There has been extensive debate about the laws and their reach beyond Australia's shores in what is seen as the latest salvo between global governments and tech firms over national security and privacy.

Under the legislation, Canberra can compel local and international providers -- including overseas communication giants such as Facebook and WhatsApp -- to remove electronic protections, conceal covert operations by government agencies, and help with access to devices or services.

Australian authorities can also require

Sri Lankan President Maithripala Sirisena said that the current political crisis in the country will not drag on beyond a week even as a war of words between him and ousted prime minister Ranil Wickremesinghe intensified.

His statement came days after a lower court temporarily barred Sirisena's appointed prime minister, Mahinda Rajapaksa from performing his duties.

Sri Lanka is going through a major political crisis since October 26 when President Sirisena, in a controversial move, removed Wickremesinghe and installed exstrongman Rajapaksa in his place. The president later dissolved

Parliament and called for a snap election on January 5. However, the Supreme Court overturned Sirisena's

decision to dissolve Parliament and halted the preparations for snap polls. In a statement, Sirisena said that he has

# 'We'll fight them in court'

### Says Philippine journo in govt showdown

Threatened with prison and closure of the news site she co-founded, Philippine journalist Maria Ressa says there is one clear response to the government onslaught she faces: fight back.

The site, Rappler, has taken a critical stand on President Rodrigo Duterte's deadly antidrug crackdown and now finds itself the target of grinding, unrelenting

attacks from the authorities. Ressa turned herself in this week to face one tax

evasion charge, but could still face arrest on four other counts that she insists were crafted to bring the site to heel. "I have nothing to hide. We have done

nothing wrong. I'm willing to challenge the government and I will hold them accountable," she told AFP at Rappler's Manila headquarters.

### Indonesia military finds 16 bodies

Indonesian security forces yesterday stepped up the grim search for victims of a massacre by suspected separatist rebels in restive Papua province, having retrieved 16 corpses so far, the military said.

The fatalities, believed to be of construction workers, mark the deadliest bout of violence in years to hit a region wracked by a low-level independence insurgency.

"This was a very cruel act," national military chief Hadi Tjahjanto told reporters in Papua, vowing to catch the "rebels" and "bring them to justice".

# China, US, EU, India top CO2 emitters list: study

China, the US, the European Union and India have been ranked as the world's top four emitters respectively of carbon dioxide accounting for 58 percent of global emissions in 2017, according to a study.

The study, released on the occasion of the world climate conference in Katowice, Poland, warned that global emissions of carbon dioxide from fossil fuels and industry are projected to rise for the second consecutive year in 2018 by more than 2 percent to a new record mainly due to sustained growth in oil and gas use.

The emissions in the rest of the world -remaining 41 percent of global emissions -are expected to grow by 1.8 percent in 2018. This group is of mainly developing countries and the five countries contributing most to the growth in this grouping in the last decade are Saudi Arabia, Iran, Turkey, Iraq and South Korea, the study said.

While China contributed 27 percent, the US (15 percent), the EU (10 percent) and

India (7 percent), the rest of the world contributed 41 percent last year, said the projection by the Global Carbon Project.

It identifies China, the US, the EU, India, Russia, Japan, Germany, Iran, Saudi Arabia and South Korea as the world's top ten carbon dioxide emitters.

remains three percent lower than its historical high, it is expected to grow in 2018, driven by growth in energy consumption in China and India.

According to the study, China, India and the European Union are setting the pace representing 40 percent of global carbon emissions.

The study said that while China and India still rely heavily on coal, the US and the EU are slowly de-carbonizing.

As India's robust economic growth across all fossil fuels-- coal (7.1pc), oil (2.9pc) and gas (6.0pc)—continue to soar, the country's emissions look set to continue go up by an average of 6.3 percent in 2018, said the study.

## Migrants tend to live longer: study

Migrants tend to be healthier than the residents of wealthy countries they travel to, such as the United States, and often help fight diseases by becoming healthcare workers in those nations, according to a study published on Wednesday.

Populist arguments that migrants pose a health risk and a burden to health systems are myths used to drive anti-It also said though global use of coal | immigrant sentiment, the report published by University College London and the Lancet medical journal concluded.

The two-year study found that migrants, in general, have a greater life expectancy than residents of host countries and were less likely to die of illnesses such as cancer and heart disease.

They were, however, more prone to diseases such as hepatitis, HIV and tuberculosis, but tended to spread those infections among immigrant communities rather than the general population, the study found.

"Our analysis suggests that migrants are healthier, migrants contribute positively to the economies of host countries, and in wealthy countries like the United Kingdom and United States, migrants constitute a large portion of the health workforce," said Ibrahim Abubakar, chair of the UCL-Lancet Commission on Migration and Health that carried out the study.

The report, which looked at 96 studies and 5,464 mortality estimates for more than 15 million migrants, found inconsistencies between migrant groups.

In the 2014 Lok Sabha

elections, the BJP had snatched the Pune Lok Sabha seat from the Congress, with Anil Shirole winning by a margin of over three lakh votes.
