Soumya in line for meaningful return?

During the Asia Cup less than three months ago, the team could

not piece together two whole batsmen to open an ODI innings. It got to the point that in the final of the tournament, off-spinner and lower-order batsman Mehedi Hasan Miraz opened the innings with Liton Das.

That picture was turned upside down when Soumya Sarkar hit a blistering ton for BCB XI in the one-day warm-up match against the West Indies. Now Bangladesh have their pick of four inform openers -- Imrul Kayes, Soumya, Tamim Iqbal and Liton -- to choose from for the first ODI against the Caribbean outfit on Sunday in Mirpur. However, Soumya's unbeaten 83-ball 103, which featured six sixes and nine fours, may have tipped the scales in his favour.

Bangladesh's best opener and one of the best in the world, Tamim was seen as the lone ranger at the top of the order without a partner to rely on. The only time someone matched him at the top was in 2015, when Soumya burst onto the scene and laid waste to Pakistan and South Africa's bowlers during dominant home series wins. That element of matching Tamim in

quality was also evident during their 114-run partnership yesterday.

Soumya however fell away and for much of 2016, 2017 and the first half of 2018 seemed to be fading into oblivion, but a string of scores -- most encouragingly in the domestic longer format games -- has shot him back into contention.

He had also scored a century in the warm-up game against Zimbabwe in October, but could not find a place in the first two ODIs, before coming into the side and scoring a century in the third game, along with Imrul.

"I tried to bat long, that has helped me score runs," Soumya said after the knock yesterday. He said that after the century against

Zimbabwe in the third ODI as well. Imrul hit two centuries in the

Zimbabwe series but has hurt his chances with failure in the Test series against West Indies; Liton hit a century in the Asia Cup final and scored 83 in the second ODI against Zimbabwe, but has been inconsistent. With his string of scores in the National Cricket League and in onedayers recently, Soumya may possibly make a meaningful comeback -perhaps the first of its kind for someone trying to partner Tamim.



## 'I'm wondering if they're tricking us'

Ahead of an ODI series against Bangladesh, West Indies were served up as flat a track as can be in the warm-up match against BCB XI at the BKSP in Savar yesterday. West Indies skipper Rovman Powell was not buying a bit of it.

It is no secret that West Indies' strength is their big-hitting prowess. It is even less of a secret that Bangladesh like to hound visitors with spin, and West Indies know that better than most after losing all of their 40 wickets to spin while being thrashed in the recently concluded two-Test series.

"I am wondering if Bangladesh are trying to trick us and put us on pretty good wickets just before the first game," said Powell after they lost the practice game by 51 runs in the Duckworth-Lewis-Stern method. "That is something to think about."

West Indies have good reason to see conspiracy in a docile wicket. That is exactly what was given to the tourists in a two-day practice match at the MA Aziz Stadium in Chattogram before a raging turner at the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium saw the lose the first Test by 64 runs.

"Definitely not," he responded when asked whether he was expecting a similar pitch in Mirpur for Sunday's first ODI. "Just like the Test games, we believe that the pitches will spin here."

It is also something to think about that they were handily beaten on the type of wicket they would presumably prefer over a turner. Having scored 331 for eight, they allowed BCB XI to score 314 for six in just 41 overs before bad light stopped play. That may have displeased Powell more than the loss because after the spin domination in the Tests, they would have expected to be at least on level terms on a flat wicket.

While results in practice games do not count for much, the home side will be happy that they have already started winning a few mind games.

# Warm-up provides the right answers

A warm-up match ahead of an international series does not routinely garner a lot

of attention, but West Indies' one-day tune-up against BCB XI yesterday was a special case as two of Bangladesh's most beloved cricketers -- opener Tamim Iqbal and ODI skipper Mashrafe Bin Mortaza -- made the trek down to BKSP in Savar to play the unofficial match.

Tamim would be playing competitive cricket for the first time in nearly three months after fracturing his left knuckle during the Asia Cup opener on September 15. Mashrafe, meanwhile, would be playing for the first time since buying nomination papers for the upcoming general election. All eyes were therefore on the BKSP to see what impact these different kinds of distractions had on the two.

There was good news all around for Bangladesh supporters when bad light ended play yesterday with nine overs of BCB XI's chase of West Indies' 331 for eight.

A blistering 73-ball 107 from Tamim and an unbeaten 83-ball 103 from Soumya Sarkar took BCB XI to 314 for six by that point and made them winners by 51 runs through the Duckworth-Lewis-Stern method. Mashrafe was his wily self with the

Tamim [lqbal]. ball, recording the most economical MINHAJUL ABEDIN figures of the run-drenched day with eight overs for 31 runs and the wicket of CHIEF SELECTOR Marlon Samuels. He also scored an ON THE SWEET DILEMMA OVER aggressive 22 to help Soumya navigate a THE OPENING POSITION tricky situation and take the team to a

winning position.

The biggest boon for Bangladesh heading into the ODI series from Sunday against the same opposition was that Tamim appeared not to have missed a single beat over the last 10-11 weeks. On the contrary, the left-hander seemed to take it up a notch in how he went after the West Indies bowlers. He got going in his customary style in

the third over, clipping Kemar Roach off his pads through midwicket for four and then launched into a cover drive to collect his second boundary. Most encouragingly, there was no sign of the side strain that delayed his comeback to the side when he got up on his toes and creamed a square cut to the point boundary. The tone of his innings was set when,

in the seventh over from Kemar Roach, he rolled back the years by dancing down the track and lofting the fast bowler over long on for six.

Imrul Kayes scored 27 in an 81-run opening stand before he was caught at point off Roston Chase in the ninth over. Soumya then came in and gave able support to Tamim, who was in murderous mood.

The Chattogram native reached his fifty off just 34 balls and took just 36 more deliveries to notch his century.

Bangladesh's highest scorer in ODIs and Tests added a fourth six to 13 boundaries after reaching his hundred before being stumped off Chase trying for a fifth, ending a 114-run stand over just 13.5 overs for the second wicket.

A mini-collapse followed as Mohammad Mithun, Ariful Haque, Towhid Hridoy and Shamim Patwary all

came and departed in quick succession. Soumya, however, was assured throughout -- apart from when he skied a ball before reaching fifty and it eluded a confused Marlon Samuels. Patwary's dismissal, bowled by Fabian Allen, brought the score down to 265 for six in the 36th over, which is when Mashrafe walked out to uproarious cheers.

Earlier, it was Rubel Hossain -another returnee to the scene who impressed with the ball -- who went out for the toss, which the West Indies won before choosing to bat. Their 331 for eight was built on 81 from opener Shai Hope and an unbeaten 51-ball 65 from Roston Chase. It however proved insufficient on a belter of a wicket at the BKSP.



Nathan Lyon, Pat Cummins, Josh Hazlewood and Mitchell Starc all grabbed two wickets as temperatures topped 36 Celsius (96.8 Fahrenheit) and the tourists wilted to 250-9 at stumps on day one.

Pujara went for a quick single on the second last ball and was removed in a brilliant run-out by a diving Cummins. "It was one of my top innings in Test cricket, I could say



Batting after Kohli won the toss, the visitors crumbled in a disastrous morning session under a pace barrage before digging in later in the day, with Pujara and Ravi Ashwin (25 off 76 balls) staging a fightback as the bowlers tired.



The Bangladesh Under-23 team put up a sordid batting display as they suffered a 97-run defeat to the UAE in their opening match of the Emerging Teams Asia Cup at the Southend Club ground in Karachi yesterday.

170 all-out was Bangladesh's reply to the UAE's 267 as batsmen like Nazmul Hossain (8), Mosaddek Hossain (0) and captain Nurul Hasan

(0) failed to even reach double digits. It could have been even more embarrassing had Shafiul Islam and Shoriful Islam not added 54 runs for

the ninth wicket. Left-arm spinner Ahmed Raza dismissed Shafiul for 32 runs to break the partnership and then ended Bangladesh's chase by removing last man Khaled Ahmed to finish with

match figures of four for 50. Shoriful, who hit three sixes and a four, was unbeaten on 31.

Raza, along with leg spinner Imran Haider, scripted the memorable win for UAE. Imran also picked up four wickets, giving away 35 runs.

Before the exchange, opener Ashfaq Ahmed's 93-ball 98 and Ghulam Shabber's 57-ball 52 gave UAE a competitive total of 267.

Bangladesh will face Hong Kong in their second match today.
