

Leave banks alone

Top economists urge politicians not to interfere in banks any further; CPD shows Tk 22,000cr plundered thru' scams, Tk 1 lakh cr stuck as nonperforming loans

The most debated topic right now outside politics is probably the banks laden with around Tk 100,000 crore in nonperforming loans and at least Tk 22,000 crore taken out through scams in recent years. This is a roll back on the improvement achieved in the 1990s through reform programmes.

And yesterday, the country's top economists and bankers called on the politicians to pledge not to further interfere in banks, the heart of the economy, if Bangladesh must move on as a middle-income country.

They observed that the banking sector was now passing through "the worst time ever" that needs to be corrected with stern decisions. "Breaching of rules and regulations has

been pulling down the banks continuously," Wahiduddin Mahmud, former adviser to a caretaker government and an eminent economist, said yesterday.

"Please leave the banks alone.... When the country's economy grew faster in the last decade, the banking sector, the heart of the economy, is the only sector which sees decline in terms of breaching rules instead of improvement," he said.

According to former deputy governor of the Bangladesh Bank Khondokar Ibrahim Khaled, banks are in their "worst state" now.

"The central bank is unable to look after the interest of the depositors. We need to raise voice against the political interference in banks," he told a dialogue organised by the Centre for Policy Dialogue at a city hotel.

Zahid Hussain, lead economist of the World Bank's Dhaka office, said there had been a nexus of regulators, bankers and big

"The risk of our inaction is very high because of the bleeding happening in the banking sector," he warned.

Debapriya Bhattacharya, a distinguished fellow at the Centre for Policy Dialogue, called on political parties to pledge in their manifestos not to interfere in the banking sector and carry out reforms to bring the banks from their brink.

He also announced that the CPD would form a citizen's commission on the banking sector after the election to find out the reasons behind the current state of the banks and suggest remedies.

The experts came together at a dialogue on "What Do We Do with the Banking Sector of Bangladesh".

At the beginning, Fahmida Khatun, executive director of the CPD, gave a presentation on how the banks slid backwards in

Earlier removed as secy general, Hawlader now 'next to chairman'

It was all set.

The Jatiya Party was going to unveil : the final list of candidates at a press conference around 8:00pm yesterday. · Journalists and senior JP leaders had already started arriving at the party : chief's Banani office for the event.

But things took a dramatic turn just about half an hour before the press conference. JP leaders said it has been postponed.

In no time, a press release was sent to the media announcing that JP Chairman HM Ershad has made party presidium member and lawmaker Ruhul . Amin Hawlader his special assistant.

And the new status of Hawlader is "next to the JP : chairman."

In a similar move, less than four weeks before the December 30 election, Ershad on December 3 · removed Hawlader as the party secretary general : and replaced him with State Minister for LGRD * Moshiur Rahman Ranga.

A number of JP presidium members last night SEE PAGE 2 COL 1: told this newspaper that they were totally confused

as to what was going on in the party and who actually ran the organisation.

"As the secretary general, Ranga is the party's second-in-command. But now Hawlader got a position that is next to chairman. So who is actually the second-in-command?" a JP senior leader asked.

In the press release signed by Ershad, it was mentioned that Hawlader would carry out the party's entire organisational activities in the absence of the

party chairman.

The JP boss took the decision as per section 20/1/Ka of the party charter and it will take immediate effect, read the release.

It comes a day after Awami League General

Secretary Obaidul Quader on Friday formally announced that 40 to 42 seats were left for JP to contest the 11th parliamentary polls.

Following Quader's announcement, JP Secretary General Ranga asked around 20 party aspirants to come to the Banani office on Saturday (yesterday) to receive letters that have to be submitted to returning officers to get the party's electoral symbol "plough."

Aggrieved party men vent anger

BNP activists pelt stones at chairperson's office, lock Rizvi inside Nayapaltan headquarters

Supporters of the Awami League and BNP leaders who were not nominated have demonstrated in the capital and several other districts, and demanded party tickets be given to their favourites.

Activists of both the parties protested yesterday, turning

violent in many places. As part of their protest, supporters of failed BNP nomination

seekers pelt stones at party chief Khaleda Zia's Gulshan office. A group of aggrieved BNP activists also locked the party's

Nayapaltan office from outside, confining Senior Joint

Secretary General Rizvi Ahmed for nearly an hour. About a hundred supporters of BNP leaders ANM Ehsanul Haque Milon (Chandpur-1), Taimur Alam Khandaker (Narayanganj-1) and Selimuzzamn Selim (Gopalganj-1) gathered in front of Khaleda's office around 5:30pm and started chanting slogans denouncing BNP

Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir for "depriving" their favourites of nominations. At one stage, they tried to break into the office and then hurled stones at its windows, witnesses said.

Fakhrul and BNP standing committee members Khandaker Mosharraf Hossain and Nazrul Islam Khan and some other leaders were inside the office at the time.
