ing experience for me. As a writer and director, Ashfaque bhai always looked out for his actors on the sets. He is a really thorough and caring leader. We shot the telefilm at different locations around Dhaka and I had a great time.

However, at the same time, I am a bit nervous. I hope that people like our work. Can you tell us anything about your other upcoming projects?

My next film will be Moina Pakhi, directed by Arun Chowdhury. We will be going to Manikganj to shoot it.
