'Let's just keep going like this'

taste of tradition

Despite Shakib Al Hasan's all-round performance, including a maiden five-wicket haul in T20Is, that led the Tigers to a series-levelling 36-run win in the second T20I against the West Indies, there was a sense of anger about the champion cricketer yesterday. The first words that the T20I skipper and man-of-the-match said before the start of the post match press conference were: "First of all there is an announcement. I won't be available for press conferences for the next match as promised by the media manager. In fact I won't even interact before the third game." The excerpts of the lively media interaction are given below:

Question (Q): You suffered a blow to your SAH: Obviously it feels good if anything toe before the first T20I and were also ill happens for the first time. I am happy. I before the second game. Is it that you want think bowling-wise this performance will to play despite illness or that the team be right among the top. management urged you to play?

Shakib Al Hasan (SAH): I am still sick. Everyone thinks that Shakib is meant to play. Is there anyone who thinks I won't play?

Q: Liton Das and Soumya Sarkar provided a good start which was followed by you and Mahmudullah. Do you think this should be the template to win a T20 game? SAH: There are no fixed rules to win a T20 match. I think we had a good day and I think overall we had a very good game. Liton started off well and Soumya continued well followed by Riyad bhai and I. I think our batting did the main job. Our batsman took a lesson from the previous game.

Q: Your take on your own bowling since you just mentioned that the main job was done by the batsmen?

SAH: How would I judge my own bowling? It's you guys who will talk about it. Obviously it was difficult for the spinners but Mehedi also bowled well.

Q: Your feelings on taking five wicket?

Q: There was a sense of disappointment from you after the defeat in the first game during the post-match presentation. What was your message before the second game? SAH: There was no message for the team as I did not speak to anyone after that. The thing is I did not blame our batters. There was nothing negative. You guys won't say the whole thing and only focus on the negatives as people like whenever there is any negative news about me. I like it too and I think these

things somehow inspire me to play well. Q: Were you inspired for the same reason today [yesterday] to play well?

SAH: Whenever such situations occur, Allah gifts me something like this ... I was told by the media manager that I would be asked only seven questions.

Q: Talking about the negatives. Is that you don't understand us or we don't get you? SAH: I don't know. I actually don't think in such a way but it has been going on like this for the past 10-12 years. Let's just keep going

like this.

Refined approach pays big dividends

In what was a perfect example of how a stable start from the batsmen could lay the platform

for a big total, Bangladesh did almost everything right as they posted their highest-ever T20I total of 211 for five while batting first against the West Indies in the second T20I in Mirpur yesterday. The Tigers' team management opted to

stick with the same eleven that was on the receiving end of an eight-wicket hammering in the first T20I in Sylhet, but the approach was completely different as the hosts banked on their strengths instead of trying to overpower their opponents.

There were no blistering hundreds or fifties as the Tigers sacrificed their overlyaggressive approach, displayed in the previous game, for a collective approach.

Liton Das's scorching 34-ball 60 was highlighted by clever improvised shots instead of raw power and a record unbeaten fifth-wicket 91-run partnership between skipper Shakib Al Hasan and Mahmudullah Riyad ensured the hosts finished their innings with a flourish.

Interestingly, that partnership came on the back of a mini-collapse which saw Bangladesh lose the wickets of Liton, Soumya Sarkar and Mushfigur Rahim in the span of just 12 balls.

However, it was the momentum that was set right at the top which helped both experienced campaigners ensure a large total as they added 71 runs in the last five overs.

Liton adjusted to the pace of the pitch before opening up and starting to attack. The stylish right-hander struck three boundaries off Sheldon Cottrell, the hero of the previous game, with some proper cricketing strokes.

From a scoop to waiting till the last moment to smash a good length delivery through point, Liton took on the Caribbean bowling attack, even striking back-to-back sixes off West Indies skipper Carlos Brathwaite. The first was a gorgeous flick towards the fine leg boundary which was followed by a perfectly executed pull off a length delivery.

After Tamim departed with the score on 41, Liton, on a roll, cleared his front leg and perfectly timed a straight six to pacer Oshane Thomas, producing what was arguably the shot of the day. He hit another six off the next delivery, a scoop through fine

Liton, who looked like he could well register the fastest fifty by a Bangladeshi when he was on 41 off just 16 deliveries, reached his fifty off just 26 balls, setting the stage for Bangladesh to compensate for their mistakes from the previous game.


"Everything I dreamed of, everything I was a part of was just falling to pieces," Smith says in the commercial.

Vodafone Australia responded to criticism from one Twitter user, saying the company was supporting Smith "in his mission to spread awareness about It concludes with Smith saying: "I want to come mental health for young Australians."

Smith denied **BPL** debut

Former Australia captain Steve Smith is not eligible to participate in the upcoming sixth edition of the Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) as the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) have decided that letting him play would go against the by-

The objection issued by the franchises was based the BPL by-laws which state that a replacement player can only be selected from the players' draft list.

"The matter of taking players from outside the draft was not in the BPL bylaws. We allowed it owing to the greater interest of the franchises. Since the franchises objected, we had to take the decision [to not allow him to play]," said BCB media committee chairman and chairman of the BPL technical committee, Jalal Younus, yesterday.

The Australian cricketer, currently serving a year-long ban for his role in a balltampering scandal which occurred during the Test between Australia and South Africa last March, was expected to join the Comilla Victorias from the fifth game of

the tournament.

Coming in to bat, Central's Saif and Nazmul did justice to their bowlers efforts, adding over 100 runs together before the latter fell prey to a Naeem Islam delivery on 67 runs off 95 balls. Saif remained unbeaten on 66 to see his side take a three-run lead with nine wickets remaining going into the final day.

In the day's other match between East Zone and South Zone at the Shaheed Chandu Stadium in Bogura, East batsman Yasir Ali was dismissed on the very first ball
