ELECTION CAMPAIGN

The perils of plastic laminated posters

Contestants for the 11th parliamentary polls have been using laminated posters in the campaign, which are harmful for the environment.

Such posters can be seen across Dhaka city and the country, displaying faces and electoral symbols of candidates, mostly of the Awami League grand alliance, Left Democratic Alliance, and Islami Andolon Bangladesh. They are also using PVC sheets, which are equally harmful.

Candidates said they were laminating posters with plastic to protect those from the elements, and that it was not a violation of electoral rules.

However, Abdul Matin, general secretary of Bangladesh Poribesh Andolon (Bapa), said, "This is bad news. These plastics will eventually block the drainage system in urban areas, and canals in rural areas."

Politicians usually do nothing to protect the environment, he said. "Now, it appears that they are acting against the environment. This is reprehensible."

As many as 15 crore posters could be printed for the upcoming election, Shahid Serneabat, chairman of Printing Industries Association of Bangladesh (PIAB), told The Daily Star.

During the 2008 election, six crore posters were printed, according to PIAB esti-

Mohammad Aslam, owner of New Bangladesh Laminator at Fakirapool, Dhaka, said several candidates used laminated posters during the union parishad and city corporation elections. "But that was on a limited scale,"he said.

This election, some candidates are laminating two to three lakh posters, he claimed.

With the increased demand for lamination, the cost of plastic film has gone up since the beginning of the month, said Md Mustafizur, proprietor of Popular Lamination at Fakirapool, a printing hub in the capital. He has already laminated 50,000 posters and is expecting more orders.

Bapa's Matin demanded that the Election Commission ban the use of laminated posters.

Information Minister Hasanul Haq Inu, who is contesting in Kushtia-2, said he is using laminated posters to protect them from dew, and it saves cost. "Otherwise, I would have to print posters daily."

Inu also said it is legal.

Asked about the harm to the environment, he said he had no idea about the matter.

ELECTORAL MANIFESTO

BSD pledges non-partisan polls-time govt

Bangladesher Samajtantrik Dal (BSD), a partner of Left Democratic Alliance (LDA), yesterday pledged to restore a non-partisan election-time government to ensure a free and fair election, if voted to power.

"Both police and ruling Awami League are now working for 'boat', and the Election Commission is also playing a biased role. So, no fair election can be held under a party-led government," BSD General Secretary Khaliquzzaman claimed as he unveiled the party's 17-point manifesto for the 11th national election, from a press conference at Dhaka Reporters' Unity (DRU) in the capital.

He said a constitutional amendment will be made to bring back non-party government, and election will be held as per proportional representation (PR) through which people from different constituencies will only cast votes for party symbols, and parties will then nominate parliament members as per voting percentage.

VIOLATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS LAWS

'Political delinquency' to blame: speakers

Laws to protect human rights in Bangladesh are not being implemented properly due to "political delinquency", for which people are suffering the most, speakers at a discussion said yesterday.

They also alleged that the government has not excluded Section 57 from the Digital Security Act, despite the commitment they had made before adopting the law. Bangladesh Society for the

Enforcement of Human Rights (BSEHR) organised the discussion at Jatiya Press Club in the capital, marking the 70th anniversary of Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR).

Terming the recent shutdown of 58 websites by the government "human rights violation", they also urged the government to withdraw

the ban immediately. Prof Lailufar Yasmin of Dhaka SEE PAGE 4 COL 1 University's International Relations

department was the chief speaker, while Advocate Sigma Huda, chairperson of BSEHR, presided over the programme.

Prof Yasmin described the context of UDHR on November 10, 1948 and double-standards in its implementation in the world: "There is also politicisation of understanding of UDHR... We can see how children are dying in US custody... whether we are talking about Rohingyas or people dying in Syria... all of these need to be taken into consideration [in light

of UDHR]." Advocate Sigma Huda said, "The judiciary in Bangladesh has turned blind; it is only for the rich... we have to make the people aware of

their rights." Moderated by Tarik Haider, former district judge and a member of BSEHR, a number of human rights activists spoke at the programme.


