
Even without taking a wicket, Rajshahi Kings pacer Mustafizur Rahman was the hero as his brilliant last over,

bowled four consecutive dot balls to Forhad Reza and Rilee Rossouw, on 43 at the other end, only managed to get strike in the last ball through a bye. But the left-hander could not take the

game to a Super Over and only managed to take a single off a fuller Mustafizur delivery as Rajshahi clinched their second win in four games.

Defending the small total of 135 for eight, it was Mustafizur who, despite being wicket-less conceded just 17 runs from his four overs, changed the scenario for Rajshahi.

while chasing the modest target, Rangpur lost their way at the end and ended up on 130 for six in 20 overs. It was Rangpur's third defeat in five games and the defending champions will surely be looking for a comeback as the tournament shifts to Sylhet from January 15.

Rangpur however came up with a surprise when skipper Masharfe Bin Mortaza opened the innings with Chris Gayle. However, the strategy did not work as Mashrafe edged a brilliant delivery from Kamrul Islam Rabbi for a second-ball duck in the first over.

In the day's second game, Mushfiqur Rahim's 41-ball 75 took Chittagong Vikings over the line by four wickets in their clash against the Comilla Victorians.

The right-hander smashed seven boundaries and four sixes and almost singlehandedly willed Chittagong to a win. Mohammad Shehzad was the only other notable scorer for Chittagong, with a 27ball 46, in chase of a 185-run target.

Earlier, it was Thisara Perera who stole the show with his dynamic 26-ball 74. The Sri Lankan was in rampant form, hitting eight sixes and three boundaries. He saved his best for last however, when he hit Frylinck for four sixes and a boundary in the penultimate over to provide a huge boost.

Unfortunately, Comilla's bowlers could not do the job in the end and do Perera's magnificent innings justice.

passed him. Due to Mehedi's intention to dupe the batsmen into not taking the second run the on-field umpire decided to give penalise Rajshahi. Mehedi admitted his mistake during the post-match briefing and said: "Yes, I knew the rule and I admit the mistake and I hope I won't repeat that again.

The upcoming edition of the Dhaka Premier League (DPL) will start from February 20 and the playersby-choice system will once again be in place, a Cricket Committee of Dhaka Metropolis (CCDM)

official informed yesterday. The decision to keep the players-by-choice system - during which the 12 clubs choose from a player pool in a sequence decided by lottery -was taken after consulting with the clubs. The

CCDM has decided to host the country's lone fifty-over tournament from February 20. "This year we are going to players' by choice system after the consent of the partic-

ipating clubs'. It's always tough to get the national team's players for their international commitments and considering the

participation of the players we're going to players' by choice system," said CCDM acting in-charge Tawhid Mahmood.

"We have decided to start the Dhaka Premier League (DPL) just after the BPL ends. Bangladesh's tour of New Zealand will go on till March 22 from February 15. The tour will start with ODIs, so those who will not play Test series will play group phase DPL matches. But all the players will be able to play from the Super League stage."

Tawhid said that the CCDM is yet to decide whether they will be able to telecast at least one or two important matches of the Super League.

Each team can retain a maximum of three players and after the players' draft, clubs can release three players on the basis of mutual understanding. Any foreign player will be considered a free player but each team can field only one foreigner in the playing eleven.

De Kock powers Proteas' surge

A century by Quinton de Kock ensured Pakistan would face a huge

task in their quest for a consolation win in the third and final Test against South Africa at the Wanderers Stadium on Sunday.

Needing 381 runs to win, Pakistan scored 153 for 3 at stumps on the third day.

De Kock equalled his Test-best score of 129 before South Africa were bowled out for 303.

It was De Kock's fourth Test cen-

tury and his first in two years.

side in some trouble at 93 for five, at which stage their lead was a modest 170.

De Kock shared a sixth wicket stand of 102 with Hashim Amla, who made 71, before adding 79 for the eighth wicket with Kagiso Rabada (21).

In an innings studded with flowing strokes, De Kock reached his fifty off 49 balls and his century off 121 deliveries.

He was finally caught in the deep, trying for a second successive six off legspinner Shadab Khan, after facing 138 balls and hitting 18 fours and a six.

Shadab finished with three for 41 while medium-pacer Faheem Ashraf took three for 42.

Pakistan opening batsmen Imam-De Kock went to the wicket with his ul-Haq and Shan Masood both

started confidently as they scored freely against Dale Steyn and Vernon Philander, neither of whom was able to find the swing or seam movement that they generated in the first innings.

Pakistan have only made one total over 200 in their first five innings in the series and have not batted for longer than 70.4 overs.

Rahul and Pandya were suspended pending an investigation into comments they made about women on a TV show this week which have been condemned as sexist and inappropriate.
