RUSSIAN MEDDLING IN US Facebook removes more pages, accounts

Facebook Inc said yesterday it had removed hundreds of Russia-initiated pages, accounts and groups that it judged to be involved in coordinated inauthentic behavior on its Facebook and Instagram platforms.

Facebook's head of cybersecurity policy, Nathaniel Gleicher, said in a blog post it had unearthed two separate operations which originated in Russia, with one active in multiple countries across eastern Europe and the other specific to Ukraine. https://bit.ly/2W1h9LR The company said it had taken down about 364 Facebook

Pages and accounts run by the first Russian network and operating in Baltic Sea states, Central Asia, the Caucasus, and Central and Eastern Europe, adding that these pages were linked to employees of Russian news agency Sputnik. The company also said that based on a tip from U.S. law enforcement, it had separately removed 107 Facebook

pages, group and accounts and 41 Instagram accounts that originated in Russia and operated in Ukraine. "We didn't find any links between these operations, but they used similar tactics by creating networks of accounts to

mislead others about who they were and what they were doing," the company said. Facebook has been under fire for the last two years for its self-admitted sluggishness in developing tools to combat

extremist content and propaganda operations.

Facebook and Twitter Inc took down millions of posts and shuttered accounts linked to influence operations by Russia, Iran and other actors in the run-up to U.S. mid-term elections in November.

Urgent! Babies wanted

Birth rate falls in Nordic nations despite govt push

"Norway needs more children! I don't think I need to tell anyone how this is done," Norway's prime minister said cheekily, but she was raising a real concern. Too few babies are being born in the

Nordic region. The Nordic countries were long a

bastion of strong fertility rates on an Old Continent that is rapidly getting older. But they are now experiencing a decline that threatens their cherished welfare model, which is funded by taxpayers. In Norway, Finland and Iceland,

birth rates dropped to historic lows in 2017, with 1.49 to 1.71 children born per woman. Just a few years earlier, their birth rates hovered close to the 2.1 level required for their populations to remain stable.

There's no single explanation, but financial uncertainty and a sharp rise in housing costs are seen as likely factors.

In the long term, this means there will be fewer people of working age to pay taxes that fund the generous state

welfare systems.

Experts present differing diagnoses and prescriptions to remedy the situation. In Norway, one economist concerned about the effect the slowing demographics will have on economic growth has suggested giving women 500,000 kroner (50,000 euros, \$58,550) in pension savings for each child born.

Finnish municipalities have already decided to loosen their purse strings to encourage locals to get busy under the covers. The town of Miehikkala, home to 2,000 people, is offering 10,000 euros for each baby born and raised in the municipality.

In Denmark, Copenhagen has meanwhile turned its attention to men, who are in less of a hurry to become parents than women, with a campaign aimed at raising awareness about how sperm quality declines with age.

But when all that is still not enough to encourage people to have more children, immigration can be a lifeline -- or a threat, depending on the point of view.

'I never said there was no collusion' with Russia

Says Trump's lawyer Rudy Giuliani

US President Donald Trump's personal attorney, Rudy Giuliani, on Wednesday insisted he "never said there was no collusion" between Trump's 2016 presidential election campaign and Russia -- only that Trump himself was not involved.


Speaking to CNN's Chris Cuomo, the former New York mayor said he did not know if others involved in the campaign had worked with Russia.

"I never said there was no collusion between the campaign, or between people in the campaign," Giuliani said.

"I said the President of the United States," he added.

"There is not a single bit of evidence the President of the

United States committed the only crime you can commit here, conspiring with the



Russians to hack the DNC." A day earlier, Trump had

insisted he "never worked for Russia" following two bombshell reports. "It's a disgrace that you

250,000 deaths a year a 'conservative estimate'

Climate change could "halt and reverse" progress made in human health over the last

The grim analysis comes from one of the Hygiene & Tropical Medicine. authors of a new report in the New England Journal of Medicine that suggests rising global temperatures could lead to many more deaths than the 250,000 a year the World Health Organization predicted just five years ago. In 2014 the WHO said that climate

change will bring with it malaria, diarrhea,

heat stress and malnutrition, killing that

many more people annually around the world from 2030 to 2050. In reviewing the research on the topic, study co-author Sir Andrew Haines thinks our health is much more vulnerable to climate change -- and he believes 250,000

deaths is a "conservative estimate." "We think the impact is more difficult to quantify because there is also population displacement and a range of additional factors like food production and crop yield, and

the increase in heat that will limit labor productivity from farmers in tropical regions that wasn't taken into account among other factors," said Haines, a British epidemiologist and former director of the London School of

Due to climate change-related food shortages alone, the world could see a net increase of 529,000 adult deaths by 2050, the report said. Climate change could force 100 million people into extreme poverty by 2030 and poverty makes people more vulnerable to health problems.

Haines adds that climate change, "while the most important environmental threat facing humanity," is not the only environ-

mental problem that threatens our health. The depletion of freshwater resources, the unprecedented biodiversity loss, ocean acidification, overfishing, pollution, deforestation and the spread of invasive species, that are related to climate change, but are environmental problems on their own, all compound these public health threats he said.

US bills pile pressure on Huawei, ZTE

Beijing slams 'hysteria' as legislations seek to ban chips sale to China IT giants

A bipartisan group of US lawmakers introduced bills on Wednesday that would ban the sale of US chips or other components to Huawei Technologies Co Ltd, ZTE Corp or other Chinese telecommunications companies that violate US sanctions or export control laws.

The proposed law drew sharp criticism

from China where Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Hua Chunying called the US legislation "hysteria", intensifying a bitter trade war between Beijing and Washington. The bills were introduced shortly before the Wall Street Journal reported federal

prosecutors were investigating allegations that Huawei stole trade secrets from T-Mobile US Inc and other US businesses. The Journal said that an indictment

could be coming soon on allegations that Huawei stole T-Mobile technology, called Tappy, which mimicked human fingers and

was used to test smartphones. Huawei said in a statement the company

and T-Mobile settled their disputes in 2017 following a US jury verdict that found "neither damage, unjust enrichment nor willful and malicious conduct by Huawei in T-Mobile's trade secret claim".

Hua urged US lawmakers to block the The legislation is the latest in a long list of

actions taken to fight what some in the Trump administration call China's cheating through intellectual property theft, illegal corporate subsidies and rules hampering US corporations that want to sell their goods in China. Many US lawmakers and intelligence

sources claim Huawei as an effectively intelligence-gathering arm of the Chinese Communist Party. Meanwhile, German government yester-

day said it is debating whether to follow the United States and allies like Australia in restricting China's Huawei Technologies from accessing its next-generation mobile networks on national-security grounds.
