Singapore National University Hospital on January 20 with multiple complications including low haemoglobin.

Ershad's younger brother Hossain Morshed and his wife Roksana Khan Morshed and Ershad's Personal Assistant Maj (retd) Khaled Akhtar have been accompanying him there.

As he was leaving for Singapore, Khaled said, "His [Ershad] bilirubin count is high and he is also suffering from acute knee pain.

"The JP chairman has hardly been able to take food properly for nearly a month due to liver complications which has further deteriorated his health."

The acting chairman of the party GM Quader told The Daily Star last week that Ershad's liver condition was quite serious.

JP Secretary General Moshur Rahman Ranga yesterday told a doamahfil at the party's Kakrai office that Ershad would probably return by January 30.

At another doamahfil last week, Quader said Ershad was able to walk without any assistance.

The 89-year-old former military dictator had been undergoing treatment at the Combined Military Hospital in Dhaka for three months before he was taken to Singapore on December 10.

The JP took part in the December 30 election as part of the ruling grand alliance and bagged 22 seats. Ershad won in Rangpur 3.

But on January 4, he issued a statement saying he would act as the opposition leader, a day after his party decided to be part of the ruling alliance. The sudden change of mind surprised and aggrieved many JP lawmakers.

In the statement, he also appointed his younger brother Quader as deputy leader of the opposition.

Some JP lawmakers had been saying that Quader's leadership might face challenges from several MPs loyal to JP Senior Co-Chairperson Raushan Ershad, who was in favour of joining the government.

Over the last few days, several JP senior leaders have been remaining absent at the party events.

## Trump backs off shutdown

required to work without pay. Many employees as well as contractors were turning to unemployment assistance, food banks and other support. Others began seeking new jobs.

With polls showing most Americans blamed him for the painful shutdown - the longest of its kind in US history - Trump embraced a way out of the crisis that Democratic House Speaker Nancy Pelosi had been pushing for weeks. The shutdown, which pitted Pelosi against Trump, was her first test since assuming the post three weeks ago. She drew praise from fellow Democrats for what they said was an outmaneuvering of the president.

Democrats remained unyielding in their opposition to a wall, one of Trump's signature campaign promises that they call ineffective, costly and immoral. Trump has said a wall is needed to curb illegal immigration and drug trafficking.

Asked by reporters if she could guarantee there will not be another government shutdown in three weeks, Pelosi said, "I can't assure the public about anything that the president will do, but I do have to say I'm optimistic."

An administration official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said that stories of law enforcement officials not being able to do their jobs at full capacity helped convince Trump to agree to a short-term solution to reopen the government. The official said the White House ultimately would accept a deal with lawmakers if it includes wall funding, even if it is less than \$5.7 billion.

"We really have no choice but to build a powerful wall or steel barrier," Trump said. "If we don't get a fair deal from Congress, the government will either shut down on Feb 15 - again - or I would use the powers afforded to me under the laws and the Constitution of the United States to address this emergency."

He previously has indicated he was considering an emergency declaration to circumvent congressional funding powers if lawmakers do not fund his wall, an action that almost certainly would be swiftly challenged by Democrats as exceeding his authority under the US Constitution.

Trump triggered the shutdown, which began on Dec 22, with his wall-funding demand after being criticized by conservative commentators for being willing to sign legislation funding the government without securing wall money.

former state minister Lutfozzaman Babar, an accused in the case, was absent.

was a member of the Myanmar Army. "We will hand him over to Myanmar border guards soon on completion of our interrogation."

Coulter lashed out at Trump for capitulating on Friday, calling him on Twitter "the biggest wimp ever to serve as President of the United States." Trump took to Twitter to say his about-face was "in no way a concession" and that he was simply "taking care of millions of people who were getting badly hurt by the Shutdown."

Top Senate Democrat Chuck Schumer said he hoped the experience would be a "lesson learned" for Trump and his party that it is self-defeating to shut the government over policy disputes. Schumer said Democrats and Trump have "so many areas" of agreement on border security but not a wall.

"The walls we are building are not medieval walls," Trump said. "They are smart walls designed to meet the needs of front-line border agents and are operationally effective. These barriers are made of steel, have see-through visibility, which is very important, and are equipped with sensors, monitors and cutting-edge technology, including state-of-the-art drones."

"We do not need 2,000 miles (3,200 km) of concrete wall from sea to shining sea. We never did," Trump added. "We never proposed that. We never wanted that because we have barriers at the border where natural structures are as good as anything that we could build."

Pelosi said she would discuss with Trump "a mutually agreed date" for his annual State of the Union address, which she had effectively forced him to postpone amid the shutdown show-down. A senior White House official said the address will not be on Tuesday, as originally planned, and it is up to Pelosi to reschedule it.

The effects of the shutdown had been spreading. Hundreds of flights were grounded or delayed at New York-area and Philadelphia airports on Friday as air traffic controllers called in sick.

FBI Director Christopher Wray in a video message to his employees called the shutdown "mind-boggling" "shortsighted" and "unfair."

The deal was reached a day after Wilbur Ross, Trump's commerce secretary who amassed a personal fortune buying distressed companies, said unpaid federal employees should get a loan if they were financially squeezed.

## Iran accuses France of 'destabilising' region

Iran has accused France of being a destabilising force in the region after its foreign minister threatened new sanctions against Tehran over its missile programme.

"The Islamic republic has always called for the strengthening of peace and stability in the region," the Iranian foreign ministry said in a statement released overnight Friday.

As such Iran "considers the mass sales of sophisticated and offensive weapons by... France as a factor in destabilising the balance of the region," the statement said.

It came after French Foreign Minister Jean-Yves Le Drian on Friday said Paris was ready to impose new sanctions on Tehran if talks on its missile programme and its regional influence fail to make progress.

"We have begun a difficult dialogue with Iran... and unless progress is made we are ready to apply sanctions, firmly, and they know it," Le Drian said.

Le Drian also demanded that Iran change its behaviour in the region, specifically regarding its military presence in Syria.

The Iranian foreign ministry responded saying "Iran's missile programme is not negotiable" and warned that "any new sanction by European countries will lead to a review of our relations with them".

Rajshahi's left-arm pacer Mustafizur Rahman who picked up two wickets and eventually helped the side clinch their fifth win in ten games. This was Chittagong's second consecutive defeat but the port-city outfit remain on top of the points table with six wins in nine games.

Yasir Ali top scored with 58 runs off 38 balls while opener Mohammad Shahzad added 49, however, it was not enough as Chittagong fell short in the end.

Mustafizur was yet again the pick of the bowlers for Rajshahi, bagging three wickets for just 28 runs from his four overs while Kamrul Islam and Mehedi Hasan Miraz took two wickets each.

Earlier, Rajshahi posted the tremendous total riding on a 43-ball 55-run knock from opener Johnson Charles while Chris Jonker added a quickfire 17-ball 37-run, laced with three sixes and a four, later in the innings.

In the day's first game, Sylhet Sixers kept their hopes for a spot in the playoffs alive by registering a comprehensive 58-run win over Khulna Titans.

In chase of a huge 196-run target, Khulna were all-out on 137 in 18.1 overs without a fight. Brendon Taylor's 34 was the highest score for the batting side while left-arm spinner Nabil Samad was the pick of the bowlers for Sylhet, bagging three wickets for 20 runs from his four overs.

Sylhet posted 195 for four, courtesy of a flying start from Liton Das and Afif Hossain as the two added 71 runs for the opening wicket. Liton was dismissed after scoring 34 off 22 balls while young Afif top scored with 49 off 37 balls, however, after their departure Sylhet lost their way at the middle.

It was then Sabbir Rahman and Mohammad Nawaz who added a blistering 89-run unbeaten fifth-wicket stand as Sylhet gained momentum, scoring 76 runs in the last five overs.

Sabbir remained unbeaten on 44 runs off 29 balls, including two sixes and four fours, while Nawaz was not out on 39 runs off 21 balls featuring two sixes and three fours.

names during short clips played in cinemas before the main screening, and now authorities in Hebei have announced an app that detects debtors in a 500-meter-radius, allowing users to report or shame them.

Described as "a map of deadbeat debtors", the controversial app can be accessed through Chinese all-in-one social media platform WeChat. State-run newspaper China Daily reports that the app can be used to detect debtors within a 500-meter radius. Debtors' information can also be accessed through the app, making it easier for "whistle blowers" to report them if they appear capable of paying their debts.

"It's a part of our measures to enforce our rulings and create a socially credible environment," a spokesperson for the Higher People's Court of Hebei said.

It's been reported that the "map of deadbeat debtors" shows the exact location of a person in debt, making it easier for users of the app to identify them, but it's unclear whether it will show people with any debt or only those over a certain threshold.

Russia is the only other country that even comes close to China when it comes to cracking down on debtors. Just a couple of days ago we reported on the unconventional method used by a public utilities company in Irkutsk to scare people into paying their debts. It installed a wooden outdoor toilet labeled "Toilet for Debtors" outside an apartment building, to remind residents that they risked having their utilities cut off.

## Khaled sent Tk 39 lakh

Where the duo had been hiding and how they had collected the money would be known after interrogating Khaled further, he added.

A Dhaka court yesterday placed Khaled on a six-day remand in a case filed with Mugda Police Station under the Anti-Terrorism Act.

Police earlier said Khaled and Ripon went to India in April 2016, just two months before 20 hostages, 17 of them foreigners, and two police officers were killed during a terror siege at the Holey Artisan Bakery, a posh café in Gulshan.

According to Rab, Khaled came back from hiding in October 2017 and was trying to reunite militants again.

With him, all the eight charge-sheeted accused in the café attack case have now been arrested. The Rab caught fugitive Ripon from Gazipur on January 20.

Khaled also led the killing of Prof Rezaul Karim, a teacher of RU English department, on April 23, 2016, Rab says.

A Rajshahi court sentenced Khaled and another JMB militant Maskawath Hasan Sakib alias Abdullah to death and three others -- Rahmatullah, Abdus Sattar and Ripon -- to life imprisonment over the Rezaul killing in May last year.

Khaled, himself a student of the RU English department, went into hiding after coordinating the killing of his teacher, said Mufti Mahmud.

Asked why he led the killing of his teacher, the Rab official said, "The murder was part of JMB's plan and there was no personal grudge."

The responsibility for the murder was reportedly claimed by the Islamic State.

Hailing from Bagmara of Rajshahi, Khaled was a talented student and got scholarship in class V and class VIII, said his father Abdul Hakim, a teacher of Bagmara Pilot High School.

But he dropped out when he was a third-year student at Rajshahi University in 2013 and became involved with the militant group, according to Rab.

Khaled last contacted his father in May 2015. "I called him on May 23 in 2015 and since then his phone has been switched off," said Abdul Hakim.

The father also said they used to have normal conversations before Khaled went missing and he didn't see any change in his son back then.

"I wanted him to be a civil service officer," Hakim said, adding that he never thought that his son would end up this way.

"If he's involved in such crimes, he should be punished."

Initially inspired by Islamic State, Khaled was motivated by one of his seniors at the RU named Ahsan Habib Shovon. First they started spreading extremist ideologies in educational institutions based in Rajshahi and

Hobi's body was found on the spot when others managed to flee, police said.

The law enforcers also claimed to have recovered a gun, three bullets and 800 yaba pills from the spot.

However, The Daily Star could not independently verify the law enforcer's claim.

According to police, Rab earlier arrested Hobi in 2015 but he fled Rab custody in handcuffs.

There was once a prayer hall on the fourth floor which is not there any longer. Another lost feature is a large playground that used to be open to visitors, who could also gaze at the Karnaphuli river from the rooftop.

Now other high-rises block the view.

According to a study by Ali Akbar Razon, an architect who teaches at the port city's Premier University, PK Sen Bhawan is a shining example of how, with available resources, people can build a home in tune with their culture, religion and taste.

A book called "A Study of Space Use Pattern and Historical Residential Building Morphology of Chittagong" was published in the International Journal of Scientific and Engineering Research in 2017 where the PK Sen Bhawan was mentioned.

During a visit, this correspondent found the structure in shambles with plasters falling off the faded walls full of cracks.

Locals and the residents claimed that the building was made in 1890, but according to the findings of the archaeology department, it was built in 1920.

Any structure needs to be at least 100 years old to obtain the heritage status, said Lovely Yasmin, deputy director of the department, adding that they had conducted a survey of the building and sent a report to Dhaka in early 2018 saying it could be restored and preserved even though the struc-

Not engaging in the "madrasa-trend of militancy", they mainly targeted educated people and became active online.

Later, Shovon introduced Khaled to top JMB leader Tamim Chowdhury in his mess at Saheb Bazar of Rajshahi. Tamim used to stay in the mess whenever he visited Rajshahi.

Rab claimed that Khaled started communicating with extremists of different tiers in the country in 2013 and the next year, he worked to unite the different militant groups.

In 2015, they held an important meeting at Mamunur Rashed Ripon's house in Bogura, joined by Sarwar, Tamim, Saddam, Marzan and Sakib.

Many important decisions were taken there and Khaled was also part of it. He was included in the media team of JMB.

Khaled also took part in a meeting of top JMB leaders in Gaibandha in February 2016. Later that year, he also joined different meetings in Dhaka.

Six others charge-sheeted accused in the Holey Artisan case, who were arrested earlier, are Jahangir Alam alias Rajib Gandhi, recruiter of the café attackers; Rashed alias Rash, one of the planners; Sohail Mahfuz, grenade supplier; arms suppliers Mizanur Rahman alias Boro Mizan and Rakibul Islam, a so-called religious trainer, and Hadisur Rahman Sagar.

Besides, 13 others, including café attack mastermind Tamim Ahmed Chowdhury and top JMB leader Sarwar Jahan Manik were killed in different anti-militancy drives. Their names were not mentioned in the charge sheet as they were dead.

Masud's identity was attached with claims of him being a "fake doctor". Syeed alleged the man was using his friend's identity and registration number. He also attached photographs of an ultrasonogram report that was prepared by the fake doctor.

Syeed notified Masud about the identity theft by tagging him the post.

"When I came to know of the matter [from the post], I informed the local health administration, hospital authorities and law enforcers to take action. I went to the hospital as well, but the man went into hiding," Masud Karim told The Daily Star on Saturday.

Masud said, "I don't know how the man managed to get hold of my certificate, BMDC registration number and how he got the job. He must be punished as he cheated with the patients for long," adding that he would file case in this regard.

Masud demanded exemplary punishment of the fake doctor.

Speaking to The Daily Star, Md Abdul Jabbar, director of Bhangura Health Care, said "Masud Karim" was on a five-day leave.

"After the authorities were notified about the incident, they asked him to submit his original documents. He then took leave to go home to bring the documents and has been missing since Tuesday," Jabbar said.

Asked about the recruitment, Jabbar said they had taken photo copies of his medical certificate, BMDC registration papers and Bangladesh Medical Association certificate. "We had no way to know whether they are fake or not," he added.

Speaking to The Daily Star, Dr Tahazzel Hossain, civil surgeon in Pabna, said the man went into hiding after the incident came to light.

The "fake" Masud Karim, whose real identity was still unknown, was contacted by this correspondent but his cell phone was found switched off.

ture is a year younger than the rules required it to be.

She said they were waiting for their Dhaka office to respond.

Mithun Chowdhury, a resident of Sadarghat who believes the building is 129 years old, stressed on the fact that such a structure should be preserved at any cost.

Shipra Ghosh a relative of the owner, said, "If it is to be restored by the government, then why aren't they doing so? There is no assurance from the government's side and locals are not letting us take any initiative out of sentiment."

She told this paper that a couple of years ago, her family tried signing a deal with a developer called AirBell Development Technologies Ltd but stepped back in the face of resistance from locals.

Md Abu Taslim, general manager (sales and marketing) at AirBell Development, said they spoke to the owners about building a block of flats there since the structure was not protected. But they had to backtrack due to resistance from locals.

He said the building could be restored or torn down and that it depended on the owners and the government.

"Retrofitting while keeping the original design intact is necessary. The decision must be taken soon otherwise the building may turn dangerous for its residents."
