## BLAST to send report on disabled persons to UN

The authorities concerned of the government should have taken opinions from non-government stakeholders before sending its initial report on the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) to the United Nations, speakers at a discussion on CRPD alternative report said yesterday.

Bangladesh Legal Aid Service Trust (BLAST) organised the discussion at Azimur Rahman conference hall in The Daily Star Centre.

BLAST will send the alternative report to UNCRPD committee on behalf of different non-government organisations that work for disabled

On April 18, 2017, Bangladesh government submitted its initial report to UNCRPD committee on disability.

UNCRPD working group will hold a meeting in Geneva on April 8, 2019 to discuss these reports,

sources said.

A six-member team of BLAST, all of them persons with disabilities, prepared the alternative report.

Advocate Rejaul Karim Siddiquee, head of the team, told The Daily Star, "In fact, there is a difference between the reality and the report prepared by the government. We have pointed out the flaws in that report."

Monsur Ahmed Chowdhury, former member of UNCRPD committee on disability, said, "This report is not the end, it's only a beginning. We have to continue the discussion to improve the lives of persons with disabilities."

Abdul Hie Mondol, president of National Grassroots Disability Organization; Mohua Paul, vicechairperson of Access Bangladesh Foundation; and Osman Khalid, chairman of Society of the Deaf and Sign Language Users, spoke at the programme among others.

## Eviction to begin Monday, three years after HC order

Chattogram district administration has decided to launch an eviction drive on February 4 on illegal structures built occupying banks of both sides of Karnaphuli River, three years into a High Court order to do so.

The decision was taken from a meeting held at the conference room of Chattogram district administration yesterday.

Md Elias Hossen, deputy secretary of Chattogram district administration told The Daily Star that demarcation work and public announcements to vacate the illegal structures will begin from today. The programme was delayed due to a fund crunch, he had earlier said.

"Finally we have managed the fund, and will start work to rid the river of illegal settlements,"

Elias said.

Advocate Manzill Murshid filed a writ petition on behalf of Human Rights and Peace for Bangladesh with the High Court in 2012, seeking an order for survey on how much land of the river was taken up by encroachers.

That same year, the HC ordered the district administration to conduct a survey and submit its findings to the court. The authorities detected at least 2,185 structures, and submitted the report to the court in 2016.

The High Court then ordered the district administration to remove all illegal structures within six months, but the authorities could not comply with the order in

the last three years. Manzill Murshid told The Daily Star that he was happy to learn of the development. "I hope

the district administration won't bow down to any pressure, and will execute the order as given by the High Court," he added. Edris Ali, professor of Chemistry

College and a researcher, said the eviction drive, if executed, will be a milestone in saving rivers. "District administration should have a tough approach to remove the structures, no matter

however influential the people

who own the illegal settlements

are," he said. He said the nation's economy revolves round the Karnaphuli river as the key port of the country lies at the estuary of the water body.

"The river is also a crucial part of the under-construction tunnel and outer ring road. If we don't save the river, the country's economy will die with it," he added.

## Empowering women by enhancing skills

'Jukta Hoye Mukta' project completes its tenure

For over a decade, Sabita, whose husband abandoned her, had been looking for opportunities for a better life. She had to consider the well-being of her son too. Things started looking up, as the 30-year-old got a job at a garment factory following a training for women from the underprivileged Dalit community.

Like Sabita, many women have been beneficiaries of a project called "Jukta Hoye Mukta" (United We Stand) that completed its tenure yesterday with an event highlighting its success at Six Seasons Hotel in the capital. The aim was to raise awareness among women, mostly divorced or separated from their husbands, through giving them information and to empower them by

enhancing their skills. Under the project that ran from February 1, 2016, a mobile app was developed to disseminate information on child marriage, menstrual health, family planning and many other important issues. Daycare centres, complaint centres and adolescent clubs were also set up. The European Union provided

the funds while Terre Des Hommes Italia oversaw the project implementation with the help of seven local organisations, includ-

ing Manusher Jonno Foundation. "The project succeeded in affirming an alternative model for women, turning them into 'respected breadwinners' in their households," said Valentina Lucchese, country representative of Terre des Hommes Italy, while speaking at the

programme. The women who participated in the project chose to break gender stereotypes and work for a better future for their children, themselves and their families, she added.

Regarding childcare, Valentina said conversations were on with several factories in Gazipur to sustain components of the project. "All these elements clearly indicate synergies between private sector and civil society organisations are untapped, and more efforts

need to be made towards this direction." Jukta Hoe Mukta, on a small scale, has shown that multi-stakeholder alliances are possible and beneficial, and has laid out the path to be followed in future, she added.

Five people including two children were killed in road accidents in four districts yesterday, according to reports from our correspondents.

In Tangail, two people were killed when a train hit a battery-run auto-rickshaw at a level crossing in Hatia area of Kalihati upazila.

The accident occurred around 5pm, leaving the driver of the three-wheeler and its lone passenger dead on spot, said Mosharaf Hossain, officer-in-charge of Bangabandhu Bridge East Police Station.

Identities of the deceased could not be known immediately, he said.

In Dinajpur, a fifth-grader was killed as a tractor hit him in Laxmanpur village of Parbatipur upazila.

## CMCH doctor dies by 'suicide'

A doctor of Chittagong Medical College Hospital (CMCH) died allegedly by suicide at his residence in Chandgaon Residential Area in the port city early yesterday morning.

The deceased was identified as Mustafa Murshed Akash, 32, who was posted at the medicine department of CMCH,

said Newaj Morshed, Akash's younger brother. Akash was brought to CMCH in a critical state where the on-

duty physician declared him dead around 6:20am, said Assistant Sub-Inspector Alauddin Talukder of CMCH Police Outpost. Dr Rajib Palit, emergency medical officer of CMCH, how-

ever, said the reason of death will be confirmed through autopsy report. "I don't want to say anything at this moment...we are

shocked," Akash's brother said. Akash was a student of Chittagong Medical College's

47th batch and completed MBBS in 2010, said Mujibul Haque Khan, president of Bangladesh Medical Association, Chattogram, adding, he was also doing postgraduate training. Dr Nahid Hasan, a colleague of his at CMCH, said Akash

was a brilliant doctor. "The news of his death has left us shocked." Abul Bashar, OC of Chandgaon Police Station, said police

were investigating into the incident. Though a note was found with the deceased, The Daily Star has decided not to publish its content, on ethical grounds.
