## Complete probe within a month

High Court asks police

The High Court yesterday directed police to complete investigation in arms and drug-related cases and submit reports to the courts concerned within a month after the cases are filed.

The court also ordered the Inspector General of Police to set up monitoring cells in all districts to make sure that the investigation officers (IOs) follow the directive. It said the officers, who would fail to file the probe reports in a month

will have to explain to the courts that why they could not do so. The court also said the investigation in such cases should not take more

than 15 to 20 days, according to their observation. But, the IOs take several months and even years to complete investiga-

tion into such cases which is not desirable, it added.

The HC bench of Justice Jahangir Hossain Selim and Justice Riaz Uddin Khan came up with the order and observation while hearing a bail petition filed by one Nurul Islam Sheikh, who was accused in a drug case lodged with Joydevpur Police Station in Gazipur.

Deputy Attorney General (DAG) Zahid Sarwar Kazal told The Daily Star that a team of police, led by Sub-Inspector Abdul Halim, arrested one Raju and recovered 10 yaba pills from his possession on November 29 last year.

Later, SI Halim filed a case with Joydevpur Police Station in this connection and implicated Nurul, a Bangladeshi expatriate in Norway, in the case following the statement of Raju.

#### Protect identity of children involved in criminal cases

The High Court yesterday observed that the media cannot publish names, addresses and photos of

children involved in crimi-

nal cases. The name, address and photo of a person aged below 18 cannot be published before, during and after the trial of a criminal case as per the Children Act

2013, the HC said. Delivering the judgement on a writ petition, the court cautioned the media saying that their reports cannot provide information which can disclose the children's identities.

The main sprit of the Children Act, 2013 is to protect the privacy and dignity of the children before, after and during the

A Japanese cultivator of bonsai trees yesterday appealed for the thieves who made off with his expensive potted plants to take good care of them. Seiji Iimura, a fifth-generation bonsai cultiva-

tor who runs a garden in Kawaguchi, north of Tokyo, told AFP the seven tiny trees stolen from his garden were his "family treasure".

"It's something I would never sell even if I got 10 million yen (\$90,000)," he said.

"Of course I hate the thief who stole them, but I want to tell him or her: please pour water on them and please take care of them," Iimura said. "I would feel sad if they die."

#### 'Robber' killed in 'gunfight' in capital

Two cops hurt; bullet-hit body found in Rajshahi STAFF CORRESPONDENT

An alleged robber was killed in a "gunfight" with police in the capital's Wari area early yesterday.

The victim, Shanto Chowdhury, 18, was a resident of Narayanganj, said Nurul Amin, additional deputy commissioner of police (Wari Division), adding that he, along with at least 14 others, used to rob people in different areas of the city.

Two sub-inspectors Raqibul Islam and Shukanta Biswas were seriously injured during the incident, the ADC added.

Nurul said police conducted a drive on information that a gang of robbers was taking preparation to commit a robbery in Gopibagh Rail Gate area around 11:45pm on Monday.

## Delhi hotel fire kills at least 17

Poor safety standards blamed as victims suffocated to death in narrow corridors; 35 rescued

A fire swept through a hotel in New Delhi early yesterday, killing 17 people, authorities in the Indian capital said, raising fresh questions about safety standards in poorly regulated budget hotels.

Frequent raids by civic authorities to enforce building codes, fire safety measures and evacuation procedures have failed to curb violations in a rapidly expanding city of more than 18 million people.

"Seventeen people are no more, they died because of suffocation, not fire," said deputy fire chief Virendra Singh, adding that 35 people had been rescued.

Most of the victims were sleeping when the fire broke out, believed to have been caused by a short circuit, media

The dead included a woman and a child who had tried to escape by jumping from a fifth-floor window of the 65room hotel in the shopping district of Karol Bagh, some of which had been booked by a wedding party. Television showed pictures of flames leaping from the

top floor. Those staying in the hotel included a group of tourists from Myanmar, broadcaster NDTV said, adding that authorities were trying to ascertain their whereabouts. Authorities appeared to have been negligent in enforcing
