A Day at the Ekushey Boi Mela 2019

Dressed in a black and white panjabi, I was excited to go to the Ekushey Boi Mela for the first time. I was prepared for the hustle and bustle that I was told would ensue, even a distance away from the venue. It was surprising to see however, that the streets were not too busy. The road leading to Bangla Academy was blocked off, and only a few groups of people were walking in. Making a mental note to return during the weekend, I walked into the venue.

The gates had just been opened around 3 pm in the afternoon and people were only beginning to crowd the place. It was like being in a gigantic outdoor library. The smell of fresh new pages wafted through the air. The stage near the entrance to Bangla Academy, then empty, is where puppet shows and other performances would be held during the weekends. A smaller stage and a sitting area for the audience was designated for interactive sessions with guest speakers. Most people were crowding around the stalls, flipping through the pages, looking for books to buy. I browsed

through the stalls, looking through their collections. Many books were written by first-time young authors. I was looking to buy some English novels written by our local authors but unfortunately, there were not many of those. There were however, some Bangla translations of popular novels by internationally acclaimed writers such as Haruki Murakami and others.

Next, I slowly made my way to Suhrawardy Udyan. I found stalls owned by a plethora of different publication houses there, including Shomoy Prokashon, the publisher of many new authors each year, Anyaprokash, the pub-

lisher of several Humayun Ahmed and Muhammad Zafar Iqbal novels, Academic Press and Publishers Library and Borshadupur Books among several others. Some stalls were creatively decorated- one was fashioned into a small hut made of hay, another selling children's books had cartoons painted all over. Many were ornamented with fairy lights of different colours. A small area with Sisimpur cartoons drawn on the fences was enclosed around a tree where children ran around and

played. As the sunset turned into just a splash of orange and pink across the horizon, visitors sat on the benches around the Shadhinota Stambha, admiring its spectacular hues. Once the winter evening began to set in, people wrapped their shawls around themselves, putting on their jackets and sweaters or just huddling a little closer to each other. The lights were turned on and the fountains came to life. The sounds of excited children filled the air as people brought out their cameras, capturing the beautiful moments. I would have taken a picture myself, but I don't think a digitally captured image could do justice to it all.

BYLC Career Fair Connecting new graduates to employers

With the theme, 'Gateway to A Successful Career', the Office of Professional Development (OPD) of Bangladesh Youth Leadership Center (BYLC) hosted their third career fair on February 7, 2019. The fair brought together nearly 300 students and 26 national and international organisations under one roof with the support of the Aga Khan Foundation Bangladesh and the Rizwan Adatia Foundation.

The pursuit for skilled graduates seems to be a ceaseless quest for employers. The event created a platform where recruiters and job seekers interacted with each other and bridged the gap between the supply and demand sides of skills. Employers informed the students about different job posts, their future prospects, required skills for the jobs, and existing recruit-

critical thinking and leadership skills in young people, and creating economic opportunities by facilitating important connections between employers and jobseekers." In addition, Ejaj Ahmad, President of BYLC, mentioned how the OPD works to improve the livelihoods of the youth by providing professional skills development training, placement opportunities and online learning services.

More than 70 HR professionals were present at the venue to assess students. They took spot interviews to evaluate students' subjective knowledge, cognitive and humane qualities, and professional skills. It also featured two panel discussion sessions where some of the market experts of the country talked about reducing youth unemployment rate and developing institutional capacity to produce a better labour force.

With a view to make information about employment opportunities more available to fresh graduates, the OPD of BYLC invited several leading organisations of the country. Counter Foto - A Center for Visual Arts has organised a set of programmes to celebrate its 6th anniversary from February 10, 2019. The programmes include an exhibition titled 'PARK-in Place for Public' with photographs from senior students of the institution. The exhibition is curated by artist Wakilur Rahman and Mahmuda Tuli. 80 photographs, clicked by the students, are being exhibited at Counter Foto's Mirpur campus. Photographers, activists and cultural personalities were also present at the artist talks and panel discussions each evening from 5 pm to 8 pm, running from February 10 to 13 at Bishwo Shahitto Kendro.

Significant among the events were the artist talks from Indian photographers Altaf Qadri and Arko

Datto. On the eve of the anniversary, the team organised two international master-class workshops and a portfolio review consisting of a panel of three international photographers for reviewing works of young and upcoming photographers. The reviewers were Arko Datto, Sumit Dayal and Altaf Qadri. A book show was also arranged at Counter Foto's Mirpur campus. A discussion and keynote speech by journalist Faruk Wasif titled 'Perilous water trail of refugees, the expendable lives and the gaze of the Rohingyas' on Saiful Huq Omi's book, 136: I am Rohingya, was also scheduled on that day. The celebrations conclude today with an evening of classical music at Counter Foto's Uttara campus.
