Legal action against establishments storing 29 hazardous chemicals

Says DSCC mayor

Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC) Mayor Sayeed Khokon yesterday said they will take legal action and cancel licences of establishments that will be found storing 29 most hazardous chemicals at shops and warehouses.

The DSCC mayor also said they will seal off the offending factories, warehouses and

He was visiting chemical factories in Mitford area in Dhaka's Babubazar yesterday noon, according to a press release.

Khokon said they have spoken to businessmen and reached an agreement on 29 identified chemicals that are most hazardous. These chemicals can cause fire to break out, he added.

The chemicals include ethyl alcohol, 2-Ethylhexanol, Isopropyl alcohol, methyl ethyl ketone (MEK), Methyl isobutyl ketone (MIBK), Thinner B and Diacetone alcohol.

"We will take legal action against traders who store these chemicals," said the mayor. He said they will assist businesses that do

getting their licences renewed.

"Don't keep excessive amount of chemicals in your shops. Rather, keep chemicals in distant warehouses," he said.

In yesterday's drive, DSCC renewed locals.

licences of establishments.

Earlier this month, DSCC declared the drive at chemical warehouses and factories in Old Dhaka. According to Bangladesh Environment

Conservation Rules 1997, no industry -using hazardous chemicals or goods -- can operate in and around a residential area. More than eight years after the devastat-

ing fire in Nimtoli that killed 123 people, chemical warehouses -- considered prime fire hazards -- are still being run in Old Dhaka, due to lack of proper action by the authorities concerned. According to locals, some 1,000 chemi-

being run in the over-populated residential areas, although DSCC has stopped providing new licences as well as renewal of old ones since last year. The chemical warehouses and stores are

mostly located in Mitford, Armanitola, Kayettuli, Agamasi Lane, Islambagh, Bangshal, Shaheednagar, Chawkbazar, Imamganj and Babubazar areas.



Confiscate copies of 'Bangladesh Bank-er Itihas' HC directs govt

distorted history. The bench of Justice Md Ashfaqul Islam and Justice Mohammad Ali passed the order and summoned Shuvangkar Saha, editor of the book and executive director of Bangladesh Bank, on March 12 to explain why distorting the history should not be

declared illegal. Earlier, Dr Kazi Ertaza Hasan, chairperson of Bangladesh Human Rights Development Commission, filed a writ petition challenging some of the contents of the book published by the central bank in 2017.

Bangladesh enjoys greater press freedom than others

Claims information minister

Information Minister Dr Hasan Mahmud yesterday claimed that Bangladesh has been enjoying greater press freedom than other countries around the world. He made these remarks

after holding a meeting with visiting chairpersons of press councils of India, Turkey, Nepal, Sri Lanka, and Bhutan at the secretariat.

In a country like United Kingdom, the minister said, a 108-year-old newspaper was forcefully shut down following the publishing of wrong news. Besides, many officials,

including executive director of an institution like BBC resigned following the broadcast of wrong information about a member of parliament, he added. The minister said the

Bangladesh government issued licences to 44 television channels, of which 33 are already on air. Besides, there are also

200 newspapers and 3,000 web portals operating across the country.
