
International Art Exhibition opens tomorrow at Shilpakala Academy

Dedicated to the martyrs of 1952 Language Movement, the exhibition will feature diverse visual art by artists of 32 countries. The organisers will honour eminent Bangladeshi artist Murtaja Baseer, a Language Movement Veteran, with a Lifetime Achievement Award, including a cheque worth BDT one lakh, a crest and certificate for his lifelong contributions to art at the opening ceremony.

An open call for artists worldwide took place, where they submitted 2200 artworks. The artwork selection committee selected 212 artworks for display, from where the jury committee nominated five of the best artworks to be awarded. The organisers will also confer a grand award worth BDT 50,000 and four honourable mention awards (each worth BDT 25,000) along with crest and certificates to the awardees.

Eminent educationist and National Professor Dr Anisuzzaman, Padma Bhushan, will inaugurate the grand art exhibition as chief guest. The opening ceremony will be held at the National Art

Gallery Auditorium of BSA tomorrow at 5 pm. Mahfuz Anam, Editor and Publisher of The Daily Star and Tamanna Tahmina Tanji, Director, Asrotex Group, will grace the occasion as special guests, while internationally renowned artist Monirul Islam, also the Chairman of the Jury Committee of the exhibition, will attend the exhibition as honourable guest. Tanjila Sumaia Siddiqye, visual artist, convener and creative director of Artopolitan will deliver welcome address. Renowned thespian Liaquat Ali Lucky, also the Director General of Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy, will preside over the programme.

A befitting closing ceremony, showcasing an array of performing arts including music, dance, poetry recitation, mime and more, will take place at the National Art Gallery Auditorium, BSA at 5:30 pm on March 9.

Anis A Khan, eminent art connoisseurcollector and Managing Director and CEO of Mutual Trust Bank Limited, will grace the occasion chief guest while renowned



Tell us about your book. How does it feel to be a part of the Ekushey Boi Mela as a writer? Rudra ebong tar grand piano revolves around themes of sentiments and hopes present in the middle class - of love, sacrifice and more. I not only wrote the book, but also did the cover art and all the illustrations inside. The book is published by Barshadupur, and I am proud of the fact that I could release my first book at the Ekushey Boi Mela.

How did you manage the time to write a book, despite your busy schedule? To be honest, this is something that I had

wanted to do for a long time. Slowly but steadily, I moved forward with the story whenever I could manage the time to do so. Also, it wasn't an unfamiliar territory as I had written short stories, and even the script for a telefiction earlier. And of course, I write most of my music and lyrics myself.

Who inspires you as a writer?

When I was little, I read almost all the books by Humayun Ahmed. Satyajit Ray's books were also very dear to me, and Professor Shonku was a personal favourite of mine since it took me to a completely different world. Feluda, Harry Potter, Tintin, and other works of fantasy/fiction inspired me greatly to create my own. Do you have any message for your fans? I want to request everyone to read and judge my book by its own merit, and not because they might like me as a musicians. I am confident

Lal – an ode to the moon and menstrual cycle

To celebrate the menstrual cycle through music, dance, and art, Jatra Bangladesh Limited has organised a five-day long festival titled Lal. The festival, providing a platform for women to talk about menstruation openly, started on the night of full moon on February 19.

Lal features artworks and photographs, projecting various stigmas regarding menstruation, by artists such as Nazia Andaleeb Preema, Saria Saguaro, Shehzad Chowdhury and Nuzart, among others. On the opening day, the event started with a dance performance by Arthy Ahmed, Imran, Biswapratim from India, a performance art by Raka Tabassum, followed by a discussion session moderated by Anusheh Anadil, the founder of Jatra Bangladesh Limited. Participating musicians, artists, poets, dancers, photographers, and organisations were part of the discussion, that aimed to normalise this natural process by talking about it.

The festival also includes poetry reading session, a speech by Krishnokoli, performance art by Nazia Andaleeb, music
