Creating the Durjoy collectible toy

Liveaxis, a studio based in Bangladesh, specialises in toy-making, prototyping, brand concept development, make-up effects, custom digital jewelry, board game illustrations and collectible concept art among other areas. They recently launched a collectible toy, based on the comic series Durjoy, by Tauhidul Iqbal Sampad, published by Dhaka Comics. It is distributed as the first of its kind in Bangladesh, the Durjoy collectible toy is a highly detailed and expertly painted four-inch figure made of high quality polystone material. Liveaxis will produce only 100 pieces of the toy, in a limited edition offer. They are selling it on a pre-order basis and have received a widely positive response so far. The product was launched at the Ekushey Boi Mela 2019, in the presence of Ahsan Habib. We caught up with Nazmul Hoque, the founder of Liveaxis and the creator of the Durjoy collectible toy, to find out more about the initiative.

Tell us a little about your background in toy-making.

I graduated in fine arts from Charukola
Institute of Chittagong University. I consider
myself a 3D character sculptor, and I enjoy
working with new and different media to
express my thoughts.

How did you conceive the idea for the

Durjoy collectible toy?

We do not have factories or production companies in Bangladesh that have collectible memorabilia based on our comic heroes. As a result, we collect imported toys and action figures, which is one of the reasons why characters like Iron-Man from Marvel Comics and Batman from DC Comics have such a tremendous fan following in our country. These circumstances inspired me to develop a production pipeline with top-notch technology. After years of research, I, along with my team, launched a collectible toy based on a Bangladeshi comic hero for the first time.

We chose *Durjoy* since the series has garnered immense popularity.

What is your take on the development of comic heroes in Bangladesh?

We have a strong and rich culture of comics. Just the other day at the Ekushey Boi Mela, I saw a young boy waiting for hours with his mother to get an autograph of Tauhidul Iqbal Sampad, the writer and artist of the *Durjoy* series. It spoke volumes about the love for Bangladeshi comics in the readers' hearts. Many people who were not previously aware of the series, discovered it after they came across the collectible toy, which is great.

What can you tell us about the upcoming action figures and collectible toys from Liveaxis?

Under the banner of Liveaxis, we have We R Makers, an online community where artists from different backgrounds share their own visions of a chosen theme, every month for collectible toys. The artists participate in monthly contests of character design challenges. Along with a cash prize, we give each winner a 3D toy of their own character. We will be working with those characters in the future.

There are also not many options in the line of educational toys for children, apart from Lego and a few others. We, at Liveaxis, aim to produce different interactive educational toys for them as well.

A graduate student from the Faculty of Fine Art, University of Rajshahi, Shalim Hossain Saju had a keen interest in the field of arts since his youth. His unique talent lies in his prowess to portray creativity in a simple yet elegant manner. During 1994, he worked as a cartoonist for the popular youth publication, Kishor Potrika and went on to contribute for various other newspapers over the years. Progressing through his career, Saju also worked for films and tele-fictions. Apart from his artistic undertakings, he has been actively involved in the field of advertising for over a decade, including many successful campaigns over the years. He also won an award at a prestigious competition held in Japan, for designing a logo. A zestful character at heart, Saju is currently the Associate Creative Director for a reputed advertising agency in the capital.


His involvement as a cover artist at the Ekushey Grantha Mela began in 1996. Ever since then, he has been contributing to the field purely out of passion. Throughout the years, Saju has worked with several renowned authors and publishers. Due to his busy schedule, this year, he was only able to design around 19 books for the fair. When asked if there was any aspect of the Boi Mela that he would he would like to see an improvement in, he replied, "It is sad to say that, except for a very few people, those who like to employ our talent, do not value it for what it is worth. There is this tendency whereby they want to take advantage of us." The artist further explained, "At times it is actually due to financial con-






straints, but they often use that as an excuse, even when they are capable. And as passion tends to be more precious than payment, many artists give in." He asserts that if this practice continues, the many artistic talents of our country will hardly be valued. According to Saju, when one sees the final outcome of an artist, they can barely evaluate the amount of effort that is required for a piece of work.

Besides the aforementioned activities, Saju has a fondness towards typography and designed 12 exclusive categories of Bangla fonts till date, which he uses when designing book covers. He also designs creative t-shirts, for a popular online apparel store. Saju aspires to publish his own book at the Boi Mela in the near future.

Remembering Talat Mahmood on his birthday

Talat Mahmood, as a singer, had a special gift being endowed with what is called a melodious voice, or *makhmali awaz* in his native Urdu.

His followers from all over the world call him 'The Shahenshah of Ghazal. Indeed, he came to fame with his exquisite ghazal *Tasveer teri dil mera bahela na sakegi* for All India Radio in 1944. Talat Mahmood started his music career in 1939 at the age of 16 on All India Radio, Lucknow. After he came to Calcutta, he became a renowned name there. Onwards, he recorded a number of Bengali songs

under the name 'Tapan Kumar'.

In 1949, Talat Mahmood moved to
Bombay. Music director Anil Biswas gave
his first big break, as he sang Meri yad me
tum aansoo na bahana na jiko jalana mujhe
bhul jana for the film Madhosh in 1951. The
song, composed by Madan Mohan, tells of a
lasting bond between broken hearts. For the
film Dekh Kabira Roya (1957), he sang Humse



aya na gaya tumse bulaya na gaya fasla pyar me dono ka mitaya na gaya, also composed by Madan Mohan.

Talat Mahmoud's ghazals are exquisite presentations of this genre of music. A southern movie, *Parchain*, had a lovely ghazal by Talat Mahmood - *Mohabbat hi jo na samjhe woh zaalim pyar kya jane* composed by C Ramchandra.

Talat Mahmood sang two evergreen love

songs - Jalte hain jiske teri aankhon ki diye dhund laya hun wohi geet teri liye for the film Sujata (1959). The music was composed by S D Burman. The other song is from the film Chayya (1961) - Itna mujhse pyar bara ke main ek badal awara. It is a duet with Lata Mangeshkar, while the music is by Salil Chowdhury.

Talat was also fluent in Bengali, and sang a number of popular Bengali songs with clarity and precision. Andho raate jodi ghum bhenge jai mone pore more priyo, composed by Nirmal Bhattacharya (1948) is a favourite. Tumi sundar jodi nahi hou is also a gem; the music was by V Balsara. Talat Mahmood was in Dhaka (then Dacca) in 1960 and recorded two songs for the film,

Rajdhanir Bukey.

The celebrated singer also acted in 13
Hindi films, primarily opposite Nutan and
Mala Sinha, among others.

Talat Mahmood was born on 24
February 1924 in Lucknow in a conservative Muslim family, and died on May 9,
1998 at the age of 74.
