Caring more for clothes than workers

Oxfam says how Aussie firms back 'systemic exploitation' in Bangladesh, Vietnam

Australian fashion brands have cared more for their clothes than the people making those, reveals a new report.

"Systemic exploitation" of workers has been enabled by Australian companies, whose buying practices compel factory operators to cut production

cost, says the report by Oxfam Australia. It uncovered that Australian firms put pressure on garment factories in many ways including fierce price negotiation, short-term contracts with factories, and reducing delivery time at one end while imposing fines for

not meeting those squeezed deadlines on the other. Oxfam, together with Bangladesh Institute for Labour Studies and the Institute for Workers and Trade Unions in Vietnam, has interviewed more than 130 factory owners, managers and others in powerful positions, as well as 472 women working in Bangladesh and Vietnam factories.

The report released yesterday said 100 percent workers interviewed in Bangladesh were not paid a living wage, and nine out of 10 could not afford enough food for themselves and their families until their next monthly pay.

It found that 72 percent workers in factories supplying to major brands in Australia cannot afford medical treatment when they get sick or injured. In Vietnam, it was at 53 percent.

All the factories supply clothing to Australian brands such as Kmart, Target, Big W, Cotton On and more.

"The Australian fashion industry was worth almost \$23.5 billion in 2018 -- a staggering amount. But a system of entrenched exploitation and the SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

PILKHANA TRAGEDY 10th anniv observed solemnly

With a heavy heart, the nation yesterday observed the 10th anniversary of the Pilkhana carnage that left 74 people, including 57 army officers, dead.

The incident, which took place between February 25 and 26 in 2009, had left the nation benumbed, as people stood aghast at the extent of the atrocity perpetrated at Pilkhana, the then headquarters of Bangladesh Rifles, now Border Guard Bangladesh, in the capital's

Dhanmondi. To pay homage to the martyrs, representatives of the president, prime minister, home ministry, chiefs of the defence forces, BGB director general and the martyrs' family members laid floral wreaths at Banani military graveyard, reports

They also observed a oneminute silence and participated in a munajat to pray for eternal peace and salvation of the departed souls.

4 'robbers' killed in 'gunfight' with Rab

'Drug peddler' killed in another 'shootout' STAR REPORT

Four alleged members of a Sundarban-based robber gang were killed yesterday in a "gunfight" with Rab in Chandpai range of the forest in Satkhira, Rab said.

The dead include Arif, leader of the gang locally known as Arif Bahini, said Mufti Mahamud Khan, director of Rab's Legal and Media Wing, adding that the identities of others were yet to be confirmed.

He said, "The gunfight ensued early in the morning when the bandits of Arif Bahini opened fire on a team of Rab-8, prompting them to retaliate, in Jongra Canal area."

"The four were caught in the line of fire while the others managed to flee," he said, adding that the bodies were handed over to Dacope Police Station in Khulna.

In Joypurhat, an alleged drug peddler was killed in a "gunfight" with Rab in Khetlal upazila early yesterday.

The dead Tofazzal Hossain, 40, was a resident of Moheshpur village in

"Acting on a tip-off, a team of RAB-5 raided in Tausara village to arrest a group of drug peddlers around 1:45am," said ASP Azmal Hossain, commanding officer of Joypurhat RAB.

Sensing presence of the law enforcers, the miscreants opened fire on them, forcing them to fire back, triggering a "gunfight", the Rab official added. Tofazzal sustained a bullet injury during the "shootout" while the rest

escaped. Rab members took him to Joypurhat Modern Hospital where doctors

pronounced him dead. A firearm, a magazine, and 150 bottles of Phensedyl were recovered from

the spot, Azmal added.

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Schindler's factory to turn into museum

New hopes to transform an abandoned factory building that once sheltered 1,200 Jews before their escape from Nazi rule during the Second World War into a museum are in motion.

The Czech factory in Brněnec, made famous by Steven Spielberg's 1993 Hollywood blockbuster Schindler's List, was once the building that hundreds of Jews worked in before managing to escape almost certain death in the Holocaust.

The old factory is now set to be restored from its derelict state into a museum and cultural centre in honour of its owner and the man who helped saved the lives of hundreds of Jews through his world famous list - Oskar Schindler.

The factory, which will be called Schindler's Ark, will allow visitors to see where those escaping the SEE PAGE 2 COL 6

Colman defied all odds to scoop an Oscar on a night when Green Book also sprang a surprise by winning the award for best

Despite controversies surrounding Green Book, and many outspoken critics, the period drama about race relations in the 1960s felt like a more conventional best-picture choice than its two top rivals, both of which had to overcome key hurdles:

"Black Panther" represented the first superhero movie to earn such recognition, while "Roma" not only would have been the first foreign-language winner, but was likely hobbled by those who still see its distributor, Netflix, as an upstart in the movie world.
