# U-16 girls in final round again

AFC U-16 Women's Championship finals by notching a hard-fought 1-0 win over hosts Myanmar in a Group B

Bangladesh made it to the

encounter of Qualification Round-2 at the Mandala Thiri Stadium yesterday. Midfielder Monika Chakma struck the

lone goal from the right-corner to shoot the girls in red and green into the final round of the championship for the second time in a row as well as ensure a semifinal berth alongside favourites China, who beat Philippines 7-0 in the other Group B match. Following two defeats, Myanmar and Philippines were eliminated while Bangladesh and China, with two wins each, will square off tomorrow to decide the group winners. Fresh from a morale boosting 10-0 win

over Philippines, the charges of Golam Rabbani Choton faced a tough challenge from Myanmar due to their physical superiority, giving Maria Manda, Monika, Akhi Khatun, Tahura Khatun and the others a run for their money before the hosts ultimately went down in front of a home crowd. Bangladesh were thoroughly tested by

Myanmar, who were seemingly more skilled and stronger then their counterparts. However Akhi, Nilufar Yeamin Nila, Nazma Khatun and Anai Mogini built a rock-solid defence, preventing Myanmar's forwards from inflicting any damage.

Maung controlled the game after the side effectively diffused two of Bangladesh's key midfielders -- Maria and Monika -- but the hosts were hardly able to penetrate the attacking third with Bangladesh's defence thwarting them at every turn. Returning after a barren first half,

Bangladesh looked more organized and tried to attack on the break despite the lack of a strong midfield. Anuching darted into the box and struck one straight to the goalkeeper in 62nd minute before Bangladesh goalkeeper Rupna Chakma came out from her post to deny forward Myat Noe Khin in the 63rd minute. Afterwards, Bangladesh claimed two

successive corners, the second of which Monika Chakma used to find the back of the net from the right side. Monika mustered a beautiful left-footed curving corner which kissed the back of Myanmar's net, even though the goalkeeper got a hand to it, in the 68th minute.

Six minutes later, Myat Noe Khin beat the last defender, Akhi Khatun, but floated her shot over the crosspiece from outside the box, much to the relief of Rupna Chakma. Anuching could have doubled the margin but she drove narrowly wide with the goalkeeper beaten two minutes into the fourminute stoppage time.

"It was a tough and competitive match for us as Myanmar is a strong side which we knew before by playing against their senior sides. So, we had some hard works for this match and finally beat them," said captain Maria Manda on a TV interview in

# Meet Robbie Fowler

Robbie Fowler is considered a god by many at Anfield. Having graduated from the Liverpool academy as a local boy, Fowler burst into toptier football and instantly endeared himself to the club's faithful with a flurry of goals. The second-highest scorer for Liverpool in the Premier League era and the sixth-highest overall, he hung up his boots in 2012 and has become a club ambassador. He is currently in Dhaka as part of a promotional campaign of the club's commercial partners Standard Chartered Bank. During an interview with The Daily Star's Atique Anam, Fowler reflected on his football career, his greatest memories, his football philosophy, his thoughts on the current Liverpool team and much more. Here are excerpts of that interview:

Bangladesh. How excited are you and what are you looking forward

what I've noticed so far is the hospitality. People are tremendously friendly here. I'm here as a part of a Standard Chartered promotional trip and it's always nice when you go looking forward to it.

TDS: So what's keeping Robbie Fowler occupied these days? We see you as a football pundit for various TV channels. What else are you

involved with? RF: I still do a lot of work for the TDS: Despite playing for the club in club. I travel around the world to

represent Liverpool, which for me is very good as an ex-player. TDS: Many of your contemporaries including [Steven] Gerrard, [Ryan]

player, I've had a decent career, but when you're finished playing you need something different to do. I've done all the coaching badges, pro licenses. So my next step is to go into coaching a football club and take it from there. I feel I have a lot to give.

TDS: Let's talk about your professional career which started as a graduate from the Liverpool academy and then making a senior appearance for the club, making an instant impact in the Premier League. If you have to pick out one of those early days and moments, which would be your most memorable one?

RF: There are so many. For me to represent Liverpool as a local lad was brilliant. I was fortunate to have a decent career, but I worked hard for my career. I wanted to be the very best that I could be. It was what I always wanted to be, growing up as a footballer. However, the best thing to ever happen to me was signing again for Liverpool.

TDS: How was the reaction from the crowd when you stepped up to take to the pitch for the first time in your second stint for Liverpool?

RF: The reaction from the crowd was unbelievable. The atmosphere at Anfield is always brilliant. The crowd was always very good to me, and when I re-signed, that noise and atmosphere when I made my debut again was the best thing ever.

TDS: You've scored some wonderful

goals for Liverpool and other clubs.

### Federer two wins from 100th title

Roger Federer moved to within two wins of a 100th career title on Thursday after coming through a tough test in difficult conditions against Marton

Fucsovics to reach the Dubai Championships semi-finals.

The seven-time champion beat his Hungarian opponent 7-6 (8/6), 6-4 in conditions which were far from comfortable with gusting winds and brief rain delays.

"You just go out there and try your best. Sometimes you get in the lead, sometimes you don't. It was important not to get down 6, 6-2, 7-6 (7/1). in the score early on," Federer said.

"It was tricky. A couple of rain delays, especially one at 5-all, coming back with sort of no preparation.

"The energy of the body, the adrenaline, tactics, all that stuff kind of fades away just a little bit in those rain delays.

"We made the most of it, the tie-breaker was tough. I'm happy I found a way to get out of that one. That was an exciting match, to say the least."

The 20-time Grand Slam winner will face Borna Coric after the Croatian sixth seed

## Barca eyeing Real double

After knocking Real Madrid out of the Copa del Rey, Barcelona now have the opportunity to send their rivals packing in the title race too.

Barca's 3-0 victory on Wednesday means Barca will return to the Santiago Bernabeu on Saturday with a spring in their step, even if Madrid were the better side and had the better opportunities until the chaotic final 30 minutes, when a Luis Suarez double and Raphael Varane own goal gave victory to the Catalans.
