

Her Take: Rethinking Masculinity at Chobi Mela X

'Her Take: Rethinking Masculinity' is a seven-part exhibition, by seven female photographers of a photo agency called VII. Armenian photojournalist, Anush Babajanyan, and a member of VII, exhibited the series of photographs at Goethe-Institut Bangladesh, on the fifth day of Chobi Mela X.

In this project, each photographer narrates their take on masculinity through visual representation. By exploring masculinity historically and culturally, they try to reframe and challenge the concept of it.

The first part of the series is called 'Outside the Binary' by Linda Bournane Engelberth, where she explored the world of people that identify themselves as nonbinary. "For me, being non-binary is more of an internal thing. One day, I feel stereotypically masculine, and next day I am more feminine. Sometimes I feel I am neither," says one of the subjects of her

photographs.

The second part, titled 'The Secret Garden of Lily La Palma', showcased the work of Maggie Steber, who photographed men around the world with flowers. Growing up without a father figure, or any male influence, Maggie always found men mysterious. Hence, 'The Secret Garden of Lily La Palma' is her effort to unfold the male mystique. The third part of the series included the works of documentary photographer Sara Terry. Her project, 'Rethinking the Male Gaze', is a response to the contemporary conversation about gender, power and representation. Engaging as a photographer, Sara recreated some of the

famous paintings of nude women from art history, drawn by men.

Other featured photographers of the series included Nichole Sobecki, Jessica Dimmock, Ilvy Nijokiktjien and the speaker of the session, Anush Babajanyan herself. Few of their projects titled, 'Afri Man' and 'Brick' challenged the notion of masculinity in African community and exhibited six portraits of senior transgender women. In the end, few portraits of Anush Babajanyan were shown, where she dressed herself in the clothes of men who left a mark in her life. "To observe and understand the men I have gotten to know, I dressed into their outfits," said Anush.



Molly Ringwald, one of his costars on the show, said on Twitter, "My heart is

broken." Perry also was in the 1992 movie Buffy the Vampire Slayer that preceded the TV series of that name and during his 90210 run portrayed real-life rodeo star Lane Frost in 8 Seconds. He learned to ride bulls and did many of his own stunts in the film. Perry's other TV credits included Windfall, a 2006 series about a group of friends who win a big lottery jackpot; two seasons of Jeremiah, a postapocalyptic drama; and a season on Oz, a prison drama on which he played a preacher


convicted of embezzlement.

Gallery Twenty One in Dhanmondi has organised a solo exhibition, Drawings and Works on Paper by artist Halide Salam. Professor Dhali Al Mamoon, Faculty of Fine Arts, University of Chittagong, and art critic, Moinuddin Khaled, jointly inaugurated the exhibition on March 1.

Halide Salam came to the USA from a war torn country, because her parents feared for her life; as well as the lives of her brothers who were sent to the United Kingdom. However, her passion for painting was born from a very personal connection she made with Vincent Van Gogh

in Paris, a connection of the spirit. She went on to earn a Master of Art in Painting and Drawing from New Mexico High-lands University (Las Vegas, NM) and a PhD in Fine Arts from Texas Tech





University (Lubbock, TX). Halide also completed post-graduate work in Sacred Geometry and Sacred Art Traditions under Dr Keith Critchlow (Professor at the Royal College of Art in London), as well as at the Prince of Wales' Institute of Architecture (London, England) from 1994 to 1996.

Her decision to become an instructor of art and teach painting was at the request of her mentor and professor, Dr Reid Hastie.

As a full-time professor in Radford University's Art department, Halide is responsible for teaching all levels of painting, ensuring that her students gain new skills and thorough knowledge of the subject matter. She teaches her students historical and contemporary art practice, theories, criticism, and aesthetics. She is also committed to collaborative and crossdisciplinary teaching activities, most

Along with her duties as a painting instructor, Halide advises and mentors graduate students in the development and completion of their master thesis. She also contributes to the university through curriculum development, assessment and institution-wide advancement.
