China urges India, Pakistan to 'quickly turn the page'

Without taking any stand on Pakistan's support of terrorism, China today said it played a "constructive role" in efforts to "defuse" tensions between India and Pakistan, in the wake of the Pulwama terror attack in Jammu and Kashmir, the responsibility for which has been claimed by Pakistan-based terror group Jaish-e-Mohammed or JeM.

At a press conference on the sidelines of the second session of the 13th National People's Conference in Beijing, Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi said China wants to see an improvement of relations and "encouraged" New Delhi and Islamabad to "return to negotiations", hoping that "both sides can transform crisis into opportunity", Chinese state media reported.

Significantly, he made no mention of China's position on asking Pakistan to stop supporting terrorism, even as Pak-based JeM carried out a terror attack in which more than 40 Indian soldiers were killed.

Turkish and Russian patrols will begin in Syria's northwestern Idlib region on Friday as part of a deal agreed last year, Turkey's defence minister said.

The jihadist-controlled Idlib province has been protected from a major offensive by the Syrian regime following the September agreement between Damascus ally Russia and rebel supporter Turkey, which included setting up a demilitarised zone around the region.

"Today Russian patrols will start outside of Idlib in the border region (and) Turkish armed forces' patrols will begin in the demilitarised zone," Turkish Defence Minister Hulusi Akar said.

Manafort was convicted by a jury in August of five counts of filing false income tax returns, two counts of bank fraud and one count of failing to report a foreign bank account.

He is one of a half-dozen former Trump associates and senior aides charged by Mueller, who has been investigating Russian meddling in the 2016 election and possible collusion with the Trump campaign. The charges against Manafort were

not connected to his role in the Trump campaign, which he headed for two months in 2016, but were related to lucrative consulting work he did for Russian-backed Ukrainian politicians from 2004 to 2014. Prosecutors alleged that Manafort

used offshore bank accounts to hide more than \$55 million he earned working for the Ukrainians.

lavish lifestyle which included pur-

chases of luxury homes and cars, antique rugs, and expensive clothes, including an \$18,500 python jacket. His conviction was a stunning downfall for a man who also worked

on the White House bids of Gerald Ford, Ronald Reagan, George HW Bush and Bob Dole. Speaking from a wheelchair and wearing a green prison jumpsuit with the words "Alexandria Inmate" on the

back, Manafort told the court that his "life, professionally and personally, is in a shambles." "I feel the pain and shame," said Manafort, who the defense says suffers

Manafort was ordered to pay \$24 million in restitution and a \$50,000 fine.

Manafort still faces sentencing in a money laundering and witness tampering case in Washington next week, where the maximum penalty is 10 years and the judge has appeared more

sympathetic to prosecutors. Trump has dangled the possibility of pardons for some of those indicted by Mueller -- including Manafort,

whom he has praised as a "good man" who has been treated unfairly. Besides Manafort, four other former Trump associates face charges or have

pleaded guilty to charges stemming from the Mueller investigation. Former National Security Advisor Michael Flynn pleaded guilty to lying

to the FBI about his contacts with Russian officials and is awaiting sentencing. Trump's former personal attorney Michael Cohen is to begin serving a three-year prison sentence on May 6 for fraud, tax evasion, illegal campaign

contributions and lying to Congress.

George Papadopoulos, a foreign policy advisor to the Trump campaign, pleaded guilty to lying to the FBI and was sentenced to two weeks in prison. Another Trump advisor, Roger Stone, awaits trial.

Meanwhile, Trump's real estate group the Trump Organization was sued Thursday by Cohen for "millions of dollars" in legal fees Cohen says the company was obliged to pay.

Cohen alleges the company stopped paying his legal costs related to Special Counsel Robert Mueller's Russia probe and other matters "only after" he began cooperating last year in investigations that have since implicated the president in wrongdoing.

It was the latest chapter in the story of Cohen's break with his former boss. Cohen has implicated Trump and the White House in the charges of campaign finance fraud and lying to Congress that he pleaded guilty to.

teaches by rotation. Since it's a specialised school, all the teachers took training for three months. Professionally, they are businessmen and kindergarten school teachers. Some are university students.

The school also has two vans for the students. Solvent parents pay for transporting their children while it is free for the needy ones. Asked what motivated him to take

up the challenge to work with the children with special needs, Rashid said it was primarily need-based. "Many parents considered their

challenged children as burden. Some of them turned to me for advice and at one point, I said to myself if I could to do something for those kids," said Rashid, a proud father of four daughters.

"But it was very challenging when I started," said Rashid, who claimed to have studied up to class X.

Parents were not interested in exposing their challenged children in public domain. I had to create awareness among the parents and convinced them that their children would only get better through the school," Rashid said while reflecting on those tough days when he took door-to-door campaign at 20-25 villages in five unions of Kaliganj upazila.

Nowadays, parents are willingly to send their children with special needs for learning, he said.

"Many such children are at the primary stage of their illness and proper treatment and support might help them get cured. I can't help in this regard. I'm trying to do what I can do best," he said.

"I purchase books, khatas, pens and other educational accessories for the children with the money I earn selling hens, ducks, goats and even cows. I also get help in the forms of wood, bamboos, tin from the local people to build the school," said Rashid. Abdul Hakim, a teacher at the

school, said, "We teach some children by Braille system and sign language. Those with physical disabilities are given general teaching." Rawshana Begum, a guardian from

the village, said her physically and mentally challenged daughter was very happy now to know how to read and write. Besides, the girl enjoys most when at school with other children.

Another local, Shahjahan Sazu, said Abdur Rashid and his Kaliganj Pratibandhi School showed that children with special needs are not burden and instead can become resources if given proper support.

Rashid applied to the social welfare ministry for registration of his school.

Deputy Director in Lalmonirhat Social Welfare Department Mosharraf Hossain said all the school's all necessary papers were at his office and the ministry concerned and that the school would get the approval soon.

"It's great job by a farmer," he said, as he showered Rashid with praise.

However, publishing their findings in the Journal of Power Sources, the

scientists admitted this could be tricky because of the extreme environments the bacteria live in, which is why they had to test their abilities in the field. "This was the first time such bacteria were collected in situ in an extreme

environment like an alkaline hot spring," said Abdelrhman Mohamed, a PhD student at Washington State University who led the research. The team stuck electrodes into the water of four hot springs, and left them

for a month to be colonised by the bacteria. "The natural conditions found in

geothermal features such as hot springs are difficult to replicate in

Some of these electricity-producing

natural environment."

bacteria have the power to convert toxic pollutants into less harmful substances. As they do so, the electrons passing

through their body as they digest their food are dumped outside their bodies on minerals or metals, using hair-like structures that protrude from their bodies like wires. This produces a stream of electricity

in an efficient process that can conceivably be used in low-power applications. While scientists hope that the

microbes could one day power all kinds of systems, they have been limited by the handful of varieties that have been grown in labs. But by employing the naturally

occurring populations in places like laboratory settings," said Dr Haluk Yellowstone, they hope they can develop something that helps to both produce electricity and clear up pollut-
