Protest erupts at DU; strike today

Protests erupted in Dhaka University yesterday immediately after most of the prominent panels boycotted the Ducsu election citing mass irregulari-

Agitating students staged a sit-in near the vice-chancellor's residence for around an hour and called a 24-hour strike on the campus today to press home their demand for re-election.

Voting began at 8:00am. Around 1:00pm, all major panels, except the ruling party-backed Bangladesh Chhatra League, announced their decision to boycott the election in two different press conferences.

At the press conference held at Madhur Canteen, panels of quota reformists' platform Bangladesh Sadharan Chhatra Adhikar Sangrakkhan Parishad, leftist Pragatishil Chhatra Oikya and Chhatra Federation, and two alliances of independent candidates Swadhikar Satantra Parishad and Santantra Jote announced their decision to boycott

the election.

Then they brought out procession on the campus, which was joined by over a hundred female students when it reached near Ruqayyah Hall.

At one stage of the demonstration,

when the chief returning officer of the election Prof SM Mahfuzur Rahman came out of the hall, agitating students surrounded him. Many of them chanted slogans

against him and accused him for "ensuring all arrangements for vote rig-They also chanted slogans against the VC demanding his resignation for "his failure to ensure a free and fair election." When Prof Mahfuzur wanted to

Several protesters then guarded him and helped him leave the area. The agitating students then paraded around the campus again. At 2:00pm, they staged a sit-in in front of the VC's

It's a drama

BCL rejects allegation of ballot anomalies at Ruqayyah Hall

Bangladesh Chhatra League, the student wing of the ruling Awami league, alleged that "a drama was staged" at Dhaka University's Rukayyah Hall to "bring controversy in the Ducsu election". Leaders of BCL threatened to file a

case against those involved with the "drama" at a press conference held at the Madhur Canteen of Dhaka University yesterday. The press conference was organised

after reports of mass irregularities surfaced from two girls' halls --Ruqayyah Hall and Bangladesh-Kuwait Maitree Hall -- where proofs of irregularity were found. After three hours of protests after

suspected discrepancy of ballot boxes, girls of Ruqayyah Hall found unmarked ballot papers in the hall, which were allegedly hidden from the election process. A Ducsu VP candidate, Nurul Haq

Nur, was allegedly assaulted at Ruqayyah Hall and "another attack was attempted" on another VP candidate Liton Nandi.

As soon as the VC announced the name of the VP-elect, the crowd present at the Nawab Ali Chowdhury Senate Bhaban started to shout "fake".

The VC remained silent for more than a minute. Amid the shouts of students, he struggled to announce the rest of the results.

The day began with high hopes for a fair Ducsu election pending for nearly three long decades.

Much before the voting started at 8:00am yesterday, Dhaka University students started lining up at their dormitories with enthusiasm.

However, much of the optimism that had gripped the country's top university was deflated soon.

Prolonging the wait of voters allegedly by Bangladesh Chhatra League and boycotts by all rival organisations and groups alleging "irregularities and vote rigging" marred the much-hyped

most cases, BCL men "maintained" the order of the queues at the polling centres. On many occasions, BCL activists of respective halls stood in the lines even

after casting their votes. They allegedly obstructed non-resident students from casting their votes by standing ahead of them in the queues.

BCL men were seen checking ID cards of students. "Chhatra League members ended.

obstructed non-resident students and discouraged them to vote," said a statement of eight teachers who voluntarily observed the election.

"We are ashamed of the irregularities that took place during the elec-

Students of another female dormitory, Ruqayyah Hall, recovered

unmarked ballot papers for Ducsu and hall union polls in two trunks from hall union room. Both the incidents led to suspension of voting for about three hours at

the halls as students protested "marking ballot papers at Maitree Hall before the polling began and an attempted electoral fraud at Ruqayyah Hall".

The university authorities removed the provost of Maitree hall and appointed a new provost after the incident.

A resident student of Haji Muhammad Mohsin Hall alleged that Chhatra League men forced them to wear badges of the organisationbacked panel.

"Chhatra league men were standing in the line even after casting their votes," said another student of the same hall. "They were standing in front of non-resident students to delay their

Similar situation was found at almost all male dormitories.

Our reporters present at Haji Muhammad Mohsin Hall, Dr Muhammad Shahidullah Hall and other dormitories heard BCL men asking their followers to take 10, 15 or 20 minutes to cast vote.

Voting was withheld for an hour from 10:00am at female dormitory Kabi Sufia Kamal Hall as its students wanted to see empty ballot boxes. Independent VP candidate for the

hall union, Mehnaj Akter, said the authorities did not show them all the five empty ballot boxes before start of voting. As the vote started with two ballot boxes, students demanded to see the other three.

"As the students brought out a procession, they showed us the rest two boxes," she said. "We are not sure what happened in the meantime." BOYCOTTS

"We are rejecting the Ducsu election with disgust. This is a farce and a forged election," Pragatishil Chhatra Oikya candidate Liton Nandi said at a press conference at Madhur Canteen around 1:00pm, one hour before voting

Representatives of quota reformists' platform Bangladesh Sadharan Chhatra Adhikar Sangrakkhan Parishad, left organisation Chhatra Federation, independent candidates' alliances Swadhikar Swtantra Parishad and Swatnara Jote were also present at the press conference.

"We want a re-election after cancellation of this election," Liton said, adding that they would go for class and exam boycotts today if the authorities do not cancel the polls.

About 10 minutes later, JCD's VP candidate Mostafizur Rahman announced that they are also boycotting the election.

"This is a staged election. It is vote looting and in fact the election took place on the night before the voting day," he said. He also wanted a reelection under the teachers who are

not biased to any party. DU Vice Chancellor Md Akhtaruzzaman, however, said the environment of the elections were normal except for a few isolated inci-

"The students have shown a stance for democracy and mentality of coexistence, which is commendable and praiseworthy," Akhtaruzzaman told

The Daily Star. Those who boycotted the election submitted a written complaint to the chief returning officer bringing allegations of obstructing non-resident students, attacking candidates, playing hide and seek over the ballot boxes and creating artificial voting lines to linger the voting process.

someone faced obstacles," he said from a post-poll press conference at Madhur's Canteen. "We wanted 100 percent vote cast-

ing so we are cordial with voters. Whenever we heard there is some problem, we rushed to solve it."

Except for BCL, all the student organisations and independent candidates demanded that the polling centres be set up at the academic buildings of the university, instead of the dormitories.

They pointed out that since BCL has the supreme dominance in the halls, fair election is not possible if voting takes place there. However, the univer-

sity authorities did not accept it. They also raised concern about the non-transparent ballot boxes and

The 10 halls where they took both the posts are: Jagannath Hall, Salimullah Muslim Hall, Dr Muhammad Shahidullah Hall, Surja Sen Hall, Haji Muhammad Mohsin Hall, Kabi Jasimuddin Hall, AF Rahman Hall, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman Hall, Muktijoddha Ziaur Rahman Hall and Bijoy Ekattor

Meanwhile, independent candidates bagged VP posts at Fazlul Huq Muslim Hall and Amar Ekushey Hall and GS position in Zahurul Haq Hall.

FROM PAGE 1 on the voting field. During the national election on December 30, finding trace of members from the opposition was a real challenge, as if they were swept away by some miracle

Yesterday, voters stood in long queues with BCL men at the front at nearly all 18 hall centres across the campus. And like the national election, the column of voters remained almost static for reasons unexplained to those standing at the back for hours.

But the voting progressed anyway. And, groups of voters were seen coming out of polling booths to stand in the lines again with their mates at the front.

There was another basic difference between the Ducsu polls and the parliamentary election.

During the December 30 polls, many voters alleged that as they entered the polling booths, they found their votes had already been cast. But yesterday, most of the voters could exercise their franchise if they managed to go in.

Interestingly, only resident students of male's halls somehow found their way at the start of every voter line. Non-resident students, on the other hand, faced all the troubles in moving up the seemingly immobile queues. Some in the queues pointed out that only the students loyal to the BCL got seats in the dormitories.

The day did not progress like the national Election Day, although the university's vice-chancellor echoed the chief election commissioner's ing here since 7:00am. But after all the BCL panel. remark about the polls being fair.

DU students, on the other hand, stood up firmly for their rights to vote, which was not the case for the parliamentary polls. Residents of vote. different dormitories staged protests alleging vote rigging by the BCL.

The Daily Star correspondents had this experience visiting all the 18 polling centres at the halls.

SHAHIDULLAH HALL

Around 8:30am, students wearing badges of the BCL panel were seen disciplining the voters' line inside Dr Muhammad Shahidullah Hall. Almost all at the front was either wearing the same badge or T-shirts with photograph of the BCL-sponsored vice president candidate.

For the next 30 minutes, one of the correspondents observed the queue, which advanced in an unusual slow manner. Several BCL men were heard asking to ensure that no outsiders could stand there.

"Newcomers at the hall were instructed to stand in the queue and spend as much as time possible so that the non-resident students leave without casting votes," one of the leaders said.

At Sufia Kamal Hall, the voters' queue stretched to the nearby Shikkha Bhaban and did not progressed an inch for one hour since 10:00am.

The picture was similar at Haji Muhammad Mohsin Hall, Muktijoddha Ziaur Rahman Hall and Zahurul Haq Hall.
