'Us Women II' showcases fierce and soulful artworks

Us Women II, an exhibition held at EMK Center in commemoration of International Women's Day, celebrates the ways in which the young artists of Bangladesh perceive womanhood and all that it entails. The brilliantly curated show includes artworks that are fierce and soulful at the same time. The exhibition includes the works of 26 artists that submitted to an open call for entries on social media. The first installment of this exhibition was hosted last

The group exhibition consists of a harmony that binds the paintings together to tell a larger story. Every piece fits into a narrative that is diverse in the stories told and the imaginations to be interpreted.

On a technical level, all the paintings maintain a consistency of high value. Artists using a broad range of media emphasise their perceptions through deft use of their skills. What also stands out in the exhibition is the vibrancy of the artworks, the loud colours that are used in producing highly pigmented artworks that grasp the attention of anyone entering the gallery.

Surreal works, artworks inspired by Japanese prints and modern and stylistic takes on Bangladeshi folk art are displayed. By making a statement on the role of women in society in terms of the oppression

they face, an artist depicts what it looks like for that role to be reversed. The dark painting, which portrays an eerie mood shows a woman in a red and green saree taking centre stage, as though all eyes are on her while she claims her rightful place in the society, with a crown atop her head. A sinister presence looms behind her,




only the eyes and claws of which are made visible.

Another artist with her painting titled, Breaking Free tells her story without needing the help of the title. In it, the figure of a woman, loosely painted in black and white seems to be crying in a cage which is mostly intact till it breaks into a shocking explosion of colours, implying that the woman's freedom exists in the skies, in the



many hues of pink, blue and orange.

The exhibition, which concludes tomorrow, succeeds in bringing

new voices into the art scene of Dhaka as well as in the conversations surrounding womanhood and femininity.



Celebrating the life of Sayeeda Khanam

Sayeeda Khanam, the first woman photographer of Bangladesh, is an inspiration to many, for her courageous endeavours. Famous personalities, including the likes of Neil Armstrong, Queen Elizabeth, Satyajit Ray, Indira Gandhi and Sheikh Mujibur Rahman among others, have been captured by her camera.

Recently, she received the prestigious Ekushey Padak. To honour her achievement, various photographers of the country organised a progamme at the National Art Gallery of Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy, where Sayeeda Khanam was present along with her friends and well-wishers.

In the beginning of the event, a documentary film based on Sayeeda Khanam's life, directed by Ismat Jahan was screened. It is Ismat Jahan's first ever documentary film.

In the film, Sayeeda Khanam talks

about the very first time she took a picture of two kabuliwalas (hawkers) with a box camera. Ever since then, her love for capturing moments, people and nature only grew with time, leading her to pursue photography as a career. Her pictures were first published in Begum Magazine, a monthly Bangla magazine founded in 1947. The film also showed her friendship with renowned director Satyajit Ray and Indian sarod player Ustad Allauddin Khan.

She has motivated plenty of young women to take up photography as a profession. Many from the local photography community attended the event, where she was honoured with flowers, as people celebrated her life with music and poetry. The event concluded with her speech. "I did not succeed overnight," she said. "I believe photographers need to produce good work and they need to work hard for it."

Discussion on the significance of March 11, 1948

Sommilito Sangskritik Jot and Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy (BSA) held a discussion recently, on the significance of March 11, 1948 from a historical perspective, at BSA. As the leading speakers, the Chairperson of Sommilito Sangskritik Jot, Golam Kuddus, thespian Ramendu Majumdar, Director General of Bangla Academy, poet Habibullah Siraji, Director General of BSA, Liaquat Ali Lucky and General Secretary of Sommilito Sangskritik Jot, Hasan Arif, were present.

Golam Kuddus discussed how we, as a nation, tend to overlook the indirect yet

strong influence Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman had on the Language Movement of 1952. He added that Sheikh Mujibur Rahman continued to inspire the Bangla-speaking people to demand Bangla as the native language of the then East Pakistan. However, according to Kuddus, it is upsetting to see how history books underestimate Sheikh Mujibur Rahman's noteworthy role behind the movement and praise only a select few, which does not really paint a thorough picture of our history.

The programme also included poetry recitations, inspired by the Language Movement and ended with a group musical performance.

Syed Mohammad Musa releases two new albums



Drama fest organised at Jahangirnagar University

A week-long drama festival began at Jahangirnagar University (JU) campus on March 9, marking the 39th founding anniversary of Jahangirnagar Theatre.

The festival is organised under the theme, 'Ruddho Prane Ashuk Proloy'.

JU acting Vice-Chancellor Prof Nurul Alam inaugurated the festival at Selim Al Deen Muktamancha.

"A total of six plays will be staged every evening at the Muktamancha while there will be two respective productions," said Md Ashikur Rahman, General Secretary of Jahangirnagar Theatre.

The six plays are- 12 Angry Men (Open Space Threatre), Socrates-er-Jobanbondi (Drishopot), Aj

Komondoler Fashi and Bajao Panchojonno (Jahangirnagar Threatre), Mohajoner Nao (Subochon Natto Sangsad) and Rarang (Aranyak

Natyadal). Poet Roish Monorom and threatre activist Mostofa Kamal will be hon-

oured at the festival. On the first day of the fest, Open Space Theater of Dhaka staged 12 Angry Men, which met with hugely positive

reactions. The courtroom drama, 12 Angry Men, based on the teleplay of American screen writer Reginald Rose, describes the story of a jury made up of 12 men as they were appointed to take a decision on an 18-year-old-boy whether he is guilty or not on the basis of reasonable doubt. The play is translated and directed by M Arifur Rahman.

Monir Chowdhury performs at 'Chirodiner Gaan'
