

Golan belongs to Israel: US

Trump signs decree angering Syria; world rejects move; air raids pound Gaza after rocket hits near Tel Aviv

US President Donald Trump yesterday declared that the Golan Heights belongs to Israel, a move that risks plunging the volatile region in a new crisis.

With Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu looking over his shoulder at the White House, Trump signed a proclamation officially granting US recognition of the Golan as Israeli territory - a dramatic shift from decades of US policy.

The move immediately triggered global anger and a sharp response from Syria, which once held the strategic

Netanyahu was visiting Washington for the conference of the American Israel Public Affairs Committee (AIPAC), the pro-Israel US lobby, but cut his visit short after a rocket fired yesterday from the Hamas-controlled Gaza Strip hit a house north of Tel Aviv, lightly wounding seven Israelis in an unusually long-range attack.

He arrived in Washington on Sunday, originally for a four-day trip.

Just as Netanyahu entered the White House, Israeli warplanes struck targets in Gaza linked to Hamas -- which denied carrying out the attack -- with the prime minister vowing to respond "forcefully to this wanton aggression."

Student, biker killed in road accidents

A man was killed after being run over by a bus in the capital's Mirpur yesterday.

Nur Islam Shanto, 28, was a mechanic of a motor workshop in the Bijoy Sarani area, police said.

He was on his way to Mirpur when a bus of Tetulia Paribahan hit his motorcycle from behind on Begum Rokeya Sarani in Shewrapara area in the morning, said police, quot-

ing witnesses. "Losing control, Shanto fell on the road and was run over by the bus as the driver sped up the vehicle in an attempt to escape the scene immediately," Abdus Salam, a nearby street vendor told The Daily Star.

"Had the driver stopped right after the first hit, the biker could have survived," Salam said.

Rigging claims mar Thai election

Pro-Thaksin party threatens legal action as military-backed party projected to retain power; final results delayed until May 9

Thailand's first general election since a military coup five years ago was thrown into disarray yesterday as two opposition parties alleged cheating and the election commission said it could be weeks until the make-up of parliament becomes clear. Confusion over the outcome of Sunday's election raised the spectre of a protracted

struggle to form a government, spoiling hopes of a clear cut result that could have ended 15 years of political turmoil in Southeast Asia's second largest economy.

Both the pro-army party seeking to keep coup leader Prayuth Chan-ocha on as prime minister and the opposition party linked to self-exiled former premier Thaksin Shinawatra, claimed they would command enough parliamentary seats to form a coalition government. The pro-Thaksin Pheu Thai party said it was considering a legal challenge over what





Dhaka not in a hurry

Says state minister on shifting Rohingyas to Bhasan Char REUTERS, Dhaka

Bangladesh is not in a hurry to relocate Rohingya refugees to a Bay of Bengal island, a minister told Reuters yesterday, after the United Nations sought more details on the government's plan.

Bangladesh wants to move 100,000 of the nearly 1 million Rohingyas sheltered in cramped camps in Cox's Bazar to the remote island, known as Bhasan Char, which it has been developing for the past two years.

The UN is making plans to help Bangladesh with the move, Reuters reported on Saturday. But in a statement yes-

terday, the world body called for a thorough assessment to ensure the viability of the move, saying it was discussing "critical protection and operational issues" ahead of any relocation.

"We're also examining the potential operational implications of setting up a humanitarian response on Bhasan Char, including the requirements, time frames and costs involved," it said.

Bangladesh is in talks with UN humanitarian bodies, and working on SEE PAGE 11 COL 1

Investigation agency frustrated over delay

It calls for setting up special bench of the SC

The investigation agency of International Crimes Tribunal yesterday expressed frustration over the delay in disposal of appeals against the verdicts in war crimes cases.

The agency also called for setting up a special bench of the Appellate Division to deal with the appeals filed with the Supreme Court by convicted war criminals or the government.

Coordinator of the agency Abdul

Hannan Khan and Co- coordinator Sanaul Huq said these at a press conference at their Dhanmondi office yesterday on the ninth anniversary of the formation of ICT and its prosecution and investigation teams.

The agency also revealed the investigation findings in a case filed against nine Gaibandha men over wartime crimes.

The Awami League-led government formed the ICT-1 on March 25, 2010 to try alleged war criminals. A second tribunal,
