Bodies of two Christchurch shooting victims arrive in city

The bodies of two Bangladeshi citizens, who were killed in the Christchurch mosque shooing in New Zealand, arrived in Dhaka last

They were Zakaria Bhuiyan of Narsingdi and Omar Faruk of Narayanganj.

Family members and relatives of the deceased received the bodies at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport around 11:15pm, a relative of Zakaria told The Daily Star.

than they could have in 2009. They now have visa-free or visa-on-arrival access to 60 countries.

Sri Lanka improved more than Bangladesh in the last decade. Sri Lankan passport gives people visafree or visa-on-arrival access to 43 countries.

In South Asia, Nepal, Pakistan and Afghanistan fared worse than Bangladesh in the latest edition of the index unveiled yesterday.

The Maldives got the highest ranking amongst the South Asian nations, 58, followed by neighbouring India, 80, Bhutan, 84, and Sri Lanka, 95.

Feeble efforts from the government to work out visa waiver agreements with other countries and diplomatic ties are the reasons behind the poor performance of the Bangladesh passport, Dominic Volek, managing partner and head of Southeast Asia of Henley & Partners, told The Daily Star over telephone yesterday.

Visa waiver agreements are a twoway street, so Bangladesh would also have to offer nationals of those countries visa-on-arrival facility, he said.

At present, Bangladesh offers visaon-arrival to nationals of 48 countries, including EU member nations, the US, Australia, Malaysia, New Zealand, Canada, China, Japan.

Volek advised the government to start a conversation with other countries to improve the efficacy of the Bangladesh passport.

He went on to cite the UAE and China as examples of countries whose passports paced up the rankings in the past decade thanks to deft diplomacy.

Both the countries had quite restricted visa policies; the UAE is now just one spot away from entry into the index's top 20.

"The index has also been a great indicator of bilateral ties and international relations between countries. A snapshot at the index's top 20 today compared to what it was 20 years ago tells an interesting story."

European countries dominated the index then and were immovable. But now they are surely but steadily dropping down the ranks as Asian countries improve to take their place.

The index, which covers 199 passports, is based on "exclusive" data provided by the International Air Transport Authority. The data is enhanced by extensive research and updated as and when visa policy

changes come into effect. Henley & Partners provides consultancy service for obtaining a second citizenship and Bangladesh's weak passport is giving the UK-based

evicting the landless families, 23 of whom are Pahan. They had been living there for over a year.

Mosharraf had sued the families almost a year ago, claiming that the land, about 1 acre and 4 decimals, in Bostabor area belonged to him, said Noren Chandra Pahan, organising secretary of Rajshahi division unit of Jatiya Adivasi Parishad.

Locals said the attackers came around 1:00am on Monday wielding sharp weapons, sticks, and several gallons of what they thought was petrol or other inflammable fuel. They poured the fuel on the houses before setting them on fire.

"I woke up hearing loud screams and feeling extremely hot in my hut," said Basanti Munda, who narrowly escaped from being injured by running outside with her children and saw her belongings, including clothes, being burnt.

Most of the homeless people said their stock of food had also been burnt in the sudden attack.

They added that the attackers left after members of Border Guards of Bangladesh from a nearby camp rushed there noticing the fire and commotion.

"Some of us might have been dead if the BGB men hadn't appeared," Basanti said.

The 37 families started living on the disputed land 13 months ago. Monday's attack followed repeated harassment by Mosharraf and somealleged.

The new rules mean that Google and other online platforms will have to sign licensing agreements with musicians, performers, authors, news publishers and journalists to use their work online.

Google's YouTube, Facebook's Instagram and other sharing platforms will also have to install filters to prevent users from uploading copyrighted materials.

Both provisions triggered fierce lobbying from both sides.

The Commission's digital chief for Europe Andrus Ansip welcomed the outcome, saying the reforms would improve the position of writers, journalists, singers, musicians and actors vis-a-vis the big platforms using their content.

"Today's vote ensures the right balance between the interests of all players - users, creators, authors, press - while putting in place proportionate obligations on online platforms," he said in a statement.

But Google said the reforms would lead to legal uncertainty and hurt Europe's creative and digital economies. The European Consumer Organisation (BEUC) echoed the criticism.

"Consumers will have to bear the consequences of this decision. Their concerns had been voiced loud and clearly but MEPs chose to ignore them," BEUC director general Monique Goyens said.

Firefox browser-maker Mozilla was scathing about the vote.

"The EU institutions have squandered the progress made by innovators and creators to imagine new content and share it with people across the world," its EU policy head Raegan MacDonald said.

"They have handed the power back to large U.S. owned record labels, film studios and big tech.

Vast swathes of online services, not just those concerning music or news, could face unintended consequences, said Raffaella De Santis at law firm Harbottle & Lewis.

"Care will need to be taken to ensure that smaller services are not disproportionately disadvantaged by measures which are in reality designed to curtail the formerly unchecked power of the tech giants," she said.

Lawmaker Julia Reda, a prominent critic of the reforms, said they

threatened the free internet. "Algorithms cannot distinguish between actual copyright infringements and the perfectly legal re-use of content for purposes such as parody," she said.

But lawmaker Axel Voss, who is in charge of the subject, rejected the criticism.

"We have agreed a new set of rules which will do exactly the opposite of killing the internet," he said.
