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CCC conservancy workers exposed to skin diseases

Some garbage collectors of Chattogram City Corporation (CCC) are blaming the corporation for various skin diseases they suffer from, as it does not give them any protective gear.

Md Hridoy, a worker of CCC's conservancy unit, was found scratching his hands while collecting garbage in front of the Almas Cinema Hall in Dampara earlier this month.

He had no protective gear on.

Asked about the itching, Hridoy told this correspondent that the CCC appointed him almost a year ago but never gave him any protective gear.

"I have been suffering from itching for the last six months as I work with no gloves," said Hridoy, who works for daily wages.

Similar picture was seen at Askar Dighir Par, Shahid Saifuddin Khaled Road, KB Aman Ali Road in Bakalia, Aturar Depot Bazar, Katalganj, and KB Fazlul Quader Road areas in the port city.

CCC conservancy department, said, "Safety gears are necessary to protect us from contagious diseases but authorities are yet to provide us with those. Our job is not permanent. So we cannot raise our voice."

Shuvo gets Tk 324 a day for collecting waste from households. He carries the garbage in a van and dumps them on a CCC truck at Dampara. The city corporation launched its

door-to-door garbage collection service in January 2017. The port city dwellers produce around 2,000 tonnes of waste every day, according to sources at CCC.

At present, 3,500 people are working at the CCC conservancy department. Barnali Barua, assistant professor at the Department of Dermatology, Chattogram Medical College Hospital, said people who do such work might become vulnerable to skin diseases like dermatitis, if they continue working without protective gear.

About workers' allegations, Shafiqul

Md Shuvo, another worker of the Mannan Siddique, chief conservancy officer at CCC, said, "We gave them gloves, goggles, boots and other safety equipment several years ago but they were never interested in using them. They said they could not work comfortably wearing those." He admitted that the workers, who

> were recruited in the last two years for the door-to-door service, were yet to get the equipment. "We will distribute them very soon." Echoing Mannan, CCC Chief

> Executive Officer Mohammad Shamsuddoha said, "The conservancy workers were given safety equipment on several occasions since 2008 but they were reluctant to use those. We will make it mandatory for them."

> However, the conservancy workers brushed off the officials' claims.

> This correspondent talked to at least 10 garbage collectors assigned at different zones and they said they were never given protective gear. Most of them have been working for 10-12 years.

Shun negativity for the sake of nation building

Info minister urges political parties

Information Minister Dr Hasan Mahmud yesterday urged all political parties to discard negative politics in the interest of

nation building. The minister was addressing an event, marking Independence Day, in the capital.

"Let's work together to build a developed and prosperous Bangladesh imbued with the spirit of the Liberation War," he said at Department of Films and Publications (DFP) discussion, chaired by its Director General Mohammad Ishtaque Hossain.

"We want constructive criticism... blind and one-sided criticism is undesirable," said the minister.

"Today, on Independence Day, we should promise to build a developed, affluent and non-communal Bangladesh. We've to build 'Sonar Bangla' as dreamt by Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman," said Hasan, also publicity and publication secretary of the ruling Awami League.

The minister said Bangladesh is now a role model of development in the world.

The country's development would get momentum if BNP, Jatiya Oikyafront and other political parties joined these uplift activities by keeping away their negative politics, said Dr Mahmud.


He, however, criticised BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir for his comments, saying the party's politics were now visibly stuck on the issue of releasing BNP chief Khaleda Zia, who was convicted by a court.

"They rather should have promised today to materialise the dream of freedom fighters... I hope they [BNP] will return to positive politics," Hasan added.

He also paid rich tributes to Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and his family members who were assassinated on August 15, 1975. Additional Secretary to the Information

Ministry Azharul Haque, Press Information Department Principal Information Officer Md Jakir Hossain and DFP Director SM Golam Kibria, among others, addressed the discussion.

Earlier, a documentary by DFP on the Liberation War was screened.

space for wildlife: expert Bangladesh, like many other countries,

needs to find space for both the wildlife and its people keeping in mind that biodiversity is important for the world, a global wildlife expert has said.

"Everybody has a role to play," Dr Craig B Stanford, a professor of Biological Science and Anthropology at the University of Southern California, told the news agency in an interview. He said tigers, turtles and fish are important, and also very important is their protection.

He said there are many dedicated people and conservationists in Bangladesh, though many people around the world ask conser-

vationists why they worry about these animals -- turtles and monkeys -- when there are many people who do not have food to The US professor said he is fully aware of

the issues like big population density and other problems, but biodiversity is very important to the wellbeing of the planet. Highlighting the importance of having

space both for wildlife and people, he said there are many species and it is hard to even know which species is the most important

"If we lose them, before we understand we've lost important things for ourselves, he said, adding that turtles are playing an important role in ecosystem.

Prof Stanford visited Chittagong Zoo and Hazrat Bayezid Bostami shrine recently, and had a very "productive" discussion at the latter on how to protect the turtles.

He talked to the shrine's caretaker conveying that he wants to help protect the turtles.

The shrine is largely dependent on the turtles, he quoted the caretaker as saying. "If the turtles disappear, the number of visitors would go down."

Farid Ahsan, a zoology professor of Chittagong University who studied these black soft-shell turtles, in his 1984 survey recorded around 320 turtles in the shrine pond. The number has declined significantly over the past decades.
