

Overuse of antibiotics gives birth to killer bacteria; research says 70pc death in hospital ICUs linked to it; govt's immediate initiative sought

Arifun Nahar, 33, gave birth to her third child on December 16 through Cesarean section at a private hospital in the capital.

Upon health complications, doctors kept the baby in a Neonatal Intensive Care Unit and applied in the process almost all high antibiotics. As nothing worked, the newborn was shifted to the Dhaka Shishu (Children) Hospital where the baby boy eventually died 28 days after birth.

The cause of his sudden death was an otherwise harmless bacterium --Klebsiella pneumoniae -- that turned deadly, possibly in hospital, by being resistant to 15 types of antibiotics.

"The baby developed infection of Klebsiella pneumoniae after birth; most probably from the NICU. This was one of the major causes behind his death," Prof Samir K Saha, head of microbiology department at the Shishu Hospital, told The Daily Star.

For nearly a century, bacteria-fighting drugs known as antibiotics help control and destroy many of the harmful organisms that can make us SEE PAGE 2 COL 2



BGB deployed at St Martin's after 22yrs

Border Guard Bangladesh personnel were deployed with "heavy weapons" to the Saint Martin's island yesterday for checking smuggling and ensuring security of the tiny island in the Bay of Bengal.

The deployment followed a government directive, according to a press statement issued from the BGB headquarters yesterday.

It, however, didn't say what prompted the government to deploy BGB members there after about 22 years.

"As per the government directive, the BGB has been redeployed with heavy weapons to Bangladesh's Southernmost point, the Saint Martin's island, from today ... The BGB had been deployed to the island for its security till 1997," read the statement.

Contacted over the phone, Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan Kamal said the government redeployed the BGB to the island to guard the southernmost point of the country.

Violating the then building rules, Rajuk in December 1996 approved an 18storey high-rise in Banani, where the FR Tower stands today.

Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk), the city development regulator, approved the building under the 1984 rules that had already been replaced by the new rules of 1996, said a member of the eight-member probe committee, which was formed by the public works ministry, wishing anonymity.

SMHI Faruque, the owner of plot no-32 where FR Tower stands, applied for a building approval in January 1996 with a building plan prepared in accordance with the building rules of 1984.

The Building Construction (BC) committee, which approves a building plan, required corrections to the plan submitted. Meanwhile, by the time the corrections were made and approved, new

building rules came into effect in July 1996.

The rules required 2.5 metres open space on two sides and in the rear and safety preconditions of a building, he said.

The corrected plan was, however, approved in December 1996, as per the old rules which lacked preconditions for open space and some safety

"Mamata Banerjee has made alliance with people who want two prime ministers, one for Delhi and one for Jammu and Kashmir," Modi said at his first election rally in Cooch Behar district.

"Bengal's Didi is losing political ground. The invective being showered on me, her anger with EC expose her fear," he said. Referring to the Saradha scam, Nararda sting videos and Rose Valley chit fund scam, Modi said, "You all know who

benefitted from these scams. I promise to expose all of that." An hour later, Mamata returned the compliment at her rally at Moynaguri in Jalpaiguri district.
