

JUTE MILL WORKERS

Fresh demo from Apr 12

Workers of state-owned jute mills from across the country yesterday announced fresh demonstrations, including road blocks next week, to press home their nine-point demand.

They will hold rallies at 26 mills of Bangladesh Jute Mills Corporation (BJMC) on Friday, march on Sunday, and block roads and railways from 8:00am-12:00pm for four days from next Monday, SM Kamruzzaman Chunnu, general secretary of Bangladesh Jute Mill Workers League (BJMWL), told The Daily Star.

Since March 29, jute mill workers have been demonstrating for payment of arrears and other demands.

The demands include implementing the National Wage Scale-2015, paying gratuities, addressing insurance claims of retired and deceased workers and reinstating those who lost jobs during previous demonstrations.

Worker leaders and union representatives from the jute mills made the decisions after a daylong meeting at BJMWL's office in the capital.

If the demands are not met, rallies will be held at the entrances of the mills on April 24 and roads and railways will be blocked for six hours on April 27-29, Chunnu said.

"Our workers are going hungry for days. But the authorities [BJMC] do not pay the dues..." Abu Daud Din Mohammad, president of Khalishpur Jute Mills Employees Union, told the Daily Star.

Experts suggest that the government provides funds immediately to clear arrears in order to put an end to the stalemate.

9 hurt as BCL men, cops clash at CU

At least nine people, including five policemen, were injured as activists of Bangladesh Chhatra League and police clashed on Chittagong University campus yesterday.

The clash ensued around 11:50am near the university's main gate when BCL activists padlocked the gate as part of their indefinite strike and police asked them to unlock the gate.

Five policemen and four BCL men were hurt during the clash, said police, adding that they took first aid at the university medical centre.

On Saturday night, the BCL men in a Facebook post declared that they would go for an indefinite strike yesterday to press home their four-point demand, including resignation of Proctor Ali Asgar Chowdhury and withdrawal of Officer-in-Charge of Hathazari Police Station Belal Md Jahangir for filing a "false" arms case against six BCL activists of the CU unit.

Dutchman ends longest EV trip

A Dutchman yesterday completed an epic 95,000 kilometre (59,000 mile) journey by electric car in Sydney in a bid to prove the viability of such vehicles in tackling climate change.

Wiebe Wakker drove his retrofitted station wagon nicknamed "The Blue Bandit" across 33 countries in what he said was the world's longestever journey by electric car.

The trip from the Netherlands to Australia took just over three years and was funded by public donations from around the world, including electricity to charge the Bandit, food and a place to sleep.

2 students die after 'taking liquor'

Two Rajshahi University students died allegedly after drinking unauthorised liquor yesterday, just a day after the death of a Russian engineer working at the Rooppur Nuclear Power Plant allegedly due to the same cause.

Rajshahi University of Engineering and Technology, who also drank the liquor, is undergoing treatment at Rajshahi Medical College Hospital (RMCH).

Another student of

Police said the three had a bottle of "vodka" together at a private dormitory in Rajshahi's Monafer Mor area on Friday night.

When they complained of feeling unwell early yesterday, other students of the dormitories rushed them to RMCH where duty doctors pronounced the two dead. Dr Nazmul Huda, chief

of the RMCH's medicine unit, said they were

Israel PM vows to annex WB settlements

Turkey, Palestinians condemn

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has pledged to annex settlements in the occupied West Bank if he wins Tuesday's elections, a deeply controversial move that could prove to be the death knell for the two-state solution.

His comments late Saturday, just days before the closelyfought April 9 poll, could be seen as an appeal to right-wing voters who do not believe in the feasibility of a peace agreement with the Palestinians.

"I will apply (Israeli) sovereignty, but I don't distinguish between settlement blocs and isolated settlements," he said in an interview with Channel 12 television.

He did not provide details on how quickly he planned to move ahead with it and whether it would involve all settle-

If done on a large-scale, annexation could end already fading hopes for a two-state solution with the Palestinians. It is a move the Israeli far-right has long pushed for.

Settlements built on land occupied by Israel in the 1967 Six-Day War are deemed illegal by the international community and their ongoing construction is seen as a major barrier to peace.

Senior Palestinian official Saeb Erekat said Netanyahu's statement on annexation was "not surprising."

"Israel will continue to brazenly violate international
