UN contradicts Myanmar's death toll

The UN human rights office says it fears dozens of Rohingya civilians were killed in a military helicopter attack in Myanmar's Rakhine state last week, despite an official government death toll of six.

Rakhine state has been embroiled in conflict since 2017, when a series of attacks by Rohingya insurgents on police outposts triggered a military response that displaced more than 730,000 Rohingya civilians and killed about 10,000.

UN investigators have accused Myanmar military leaders of "genocidal intent."

"We are now receiving reports that the number may be much higher [than six]. We have unconfirmed reports that the number may be as high as 30," Ravina Shamdasani, spokesperson for the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) in Geneva, said

VICTIM UNDERGOES MINOR SURGERY

A minor operation had been conducted on the victim yesterday and dressing had been changed on her burns, said Dr Samanta Lal Sen, chief coordinator of National Institute of Burn and Plastic Surgery of the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH).

The brutal assault left her with 75 percent of her body burnt and she is currently on life support at the burn

She also cannot be taken to Singapore as the five-hour long plane journey might be too much for her.

'POWERFUL' PRINCIPAL SHOWN ARRESTED

Meanwhile, Siraj Ud Doula, principal of Sonagazi Islamia Senior Fazil Madrasa, was shown arrested yesterday in an attempt-to-murder case filed by the victim's brother on Monday.

Four unidentified female madrasa students and their associates were also named in the case.

Police had detained eight people in connection with the case and sent four of them to court, which granted five day remand for each.

The seven, excluding Siraj, are Afsar Uddin, 33, an English lecturer; Ariful Islam, 22, an Alim examinee of the madrasa; madrasa night guard Md Mostofa, 38, and office staffers Amin, 50, Alauddin, 25, Saidul Islam, 21, and Jashim Uddin, 30.

Madrasa peon Nurul Amin, who was taken into police custody, told police that teachers and employees of the madrasa were held "hostage" by

He said Siraj was a very powerful man and used to form madrasa management committees with people loyal to him.

He also had students who were loyal to him, Nurul said.

The principal was a Rokon -- an important field-level position in the Bangladesh Jamaat-e-Islami -- but he was expelled from the party in 2016. Afterwards, some influential Awami League leaders gave him shelter, according to some locals.

Locals also said Siraj was accused in three cases filed with Feni Sadar and Sonagazi police stations on charges of subversive activities and

attacks on police. He had been arrested earlier but was released on bail.

Sohel was buried around 6:30pm after a second namaz-e-janaza at a local Madrasa premises.

He sustained critical injuries while rescuing trapped people using a hydraulic ladder.

As the ladder basket was overloaded with rescued people and there was not room left, Sohel took posi-

tion on the ladder steps, putting his life at risk. At one point, he got stuck in the ladder and his leg broke as the ladder folded. His stomach too was punctured.

He was rushed to CMH where he While mourning his death, his went underwent two surgeries and was put on life-support until he was flown to Singapore on April 5.

Sohel joined the fire service in 2015. With the money he earned, he used to support his family and bear the educational expenses of his brothers. Before that, he had taken up many an odd-job to support his family as his father Noor Islam, an ultra poor farmer, could not work due to illheath.

Along with his parents, Sohel left behind four siblings -- younger brothOpen University, Uzzal, a college student, and Delwar, a tenth grader, and his sister Selina Akter, a homemaker.

Airfare trouble for migrant workers

The employer has threatened to cancel their visas if they don't arrive there by that time, he told The Daily Star at the Baira office in the capital yesterday.

"If I want to send them by Thursday, they will have to pay additional costs. But if they don't agree, I will have to incur losses," he said.

Several Middle East-bound workers spoke of their troubles to this correspondent. Abdulla bin Saleh from Noakhali's

Senbagh upazila said he has Saudi visa, but the recruiting agent is saying that there is a shortage of air tickets. "I was supposed to fly a week back. But

I am not sure when I can do so," the 24year-old migrant worker said last night.

According to industry insiders, some 4,500 passengers used to fly to Middle Eastern countries by 45 flights from Dhaka every day before the four airlines suspended their operations. Now

the number has come down to around 4,000 due to flight shortage.

"In recent weeks, the number of Umrah pilgrims has gone up. Almost 30 percent passengers of our flights are now flying to Saudi Arabia for Umrah," said a high official of a private airline that operates flights from Bangladesh to Middle Eastern coun-

Baira's Member Welfare Secretary Kafil Uddin Majumder claimed that a section of travel agents are hiking the airfare, taking advantage of the flight shortage.

Emdad Ullah, executive vicepresident of the Association of Travel Agents of Bangladesh (Atab), too said some travel agents are involved with "a syndicate" that is increasing the airfare.

"We have already written to the Prime Minister's Office about this," he told The Daily Star.

As the number of Umrah pilgrims is likely to go up in the month of

Ramadan, there is a fear that the airfare would increase further if the government does not intervene immediately, noted Emdad.

Bangladesh Biman could raise the number of flights to the Middle East, the major overseas labour market with some 50 lakh to 60 lakh Bangladeshis working in the region, he said.

The government could also allow foreign airlines to operate more flights to the Middle East as long as required, added the Atab executive vicepresident.

Baira Secretary General Shameem said the demand for domestic workers goes up in the Middle East during Ramadan. If the jobseekers cannot be sent there timely, it will affect the overseas job sector from which Bangladesh earns around \$15 billion a year.

Of around 25,000 Bangladeshis flying abroad for jobs every day, some 2,000 are going to the Middle Eastern coun-

"We have written to both the civil aviation and the expatriates' welfare ministries, requesting them to address the situation. But we have not yet got any reply," he mentioned.

Contacted, Mohibul Haque, secretary at the civil aviation and tourism ministry, said there is no scope for any travel agents to artificially increase airfares.

"There is no scope for such monopoly." One must provide his or her name and passport's information to book a ticket ... Once a ticket is sold, it cannot be resold to others. Only dates and time can be changed," the secretary told The

Daily Star over the phone. In reply to a query, he said national flag carrier Biman has not increased its airfares.

He further said the civil aviation ministry has already permitted the Emirates to operate one more flight to Dubai from Dhaka every day.

The airline now operates three flights a day.

US to be with Bangladesh in finding solution

without any form of fear and persecution.

Secretary of State Michael R Pompeo said this when Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen met him in Washington on Monday.

Pompeo lauded Bangladesh's gen-

erosity in continuing to host one million Rohingya refugees from Myanmar, and emphasised how they would work with the international community to increase support for the refugees and host communities, while addressing root causes and conditions in Myanmar, according to a press statement of the US Department of State.

"The secretary underscored that responsibility for resolution of the Rohingya refugee crisis rests with Burma [Myanmar], which must create the necessary conditions for voluntary

repatriation," said Morgan Ortagus, spokesperson for the state department.

The secretary also emphasised the importance of advancing good governance, transparency, and democratic values, as Bangladesh continues its emergence as a key partner in the Indo-Pacific. They discussed increasing eco-

nomic, security and counterterrorism cooperation between Dhaka and Washington. This was the first meeting between the two leaders since their assumption of office in respective governments. In a press statement, Bangladesh

Embassy in Washington DC said issues featuring in the meeting were: repatriation of the Rohingyas and creation of credible international pressure on Myanmar in that respect, deportation of Bangabandhu's killer Rashed Chowdhury from the US to Bangladesh, shared vision of a Free and Open Indo-

Pacific, US investments in Bangladesh, duty and quota free access of Bangladesh's garments products in the US market and US-Bangladesh partnership in multiple sectors.

During the meeting, Foreign Minister Momen said Bangladesh at its own expense developed the island, "Bhashanchar", into a livable place in which one lakh Rohingyas are planned to be relocated in coordination with UN agencies and different aid groups. He sought US support to the cre-

ation of a safe zone in Rakhine State monitored by international human rights groups. Regarding deportation of Rashed Chowdhury, the foreign minister

pointed out that he is fleeing justice. "This is essential to carry out a vital common agenda of both countries pertaining to counterterrorism and

countering-violent extremism and

upholding the rule of law," he said. Both leaders agreed that for greater prosperity in the Indo-Pacific region,

vital energy and infrastructure projects need to be implemented on regional partnership basis. In that respect, leaders of the region need to work together on issues such as governance, accountability, the rule of law and maritime security, the statement said.

Momen sought more investment from the US in the oil and gas sector and the US's presence in the special economic zones.

He also sought US support to the candidature of Bangladesh in the upcoming election to the post of deputy director general of International Organization for Migration.

Later in the day, Momen held meetings with senior officials of the US State Department and Deputy National Security Adviser Charles

Blast in Yemen

capital killed 14 children: UN

An explosion near two schools in the rebel-held Yemeni capital killed 14 children and wounded 16, the UN said yesterday, but the cause of the weekend blast remains unclear.

Most of the child casualties in the city's Saewan district were girls under the age of nine, according to statements by both the UN children's fund (Unicef) and the UN special envoy for Yemen's Huthi rebels have accused

a Saudi-led military coalition backing the government of carrying out an air strike. The coalition denied conducting

any air raids on the capital on Sunday. "A blast in Sanaa this week killed 14 children and critically injured 16. This is what Unicef was able to verify, with the actual number of children killed and injured likely to increase," said Unicef's Middle East and North Africa

director, Geert Cappelaere. "It was almost lunchtime and students were in class. The blast shattered the windows and unleashed a burst of shrapnel and broken glass into the

classrooms. The United Nations and international aid groups have called for an investigation into the Sunday explosion but have not apportioned

The World Health Organization estimates nearly 10,000 Yemenis have been killed since 2015, when Saudi Arabia and its allies intervened to prevent the defeat of the government SEE PAGE 10 COL 2

"Primarily, the BJP has been unable to sufficiently distinguish itself from Congress when it comes to making people feel the difference in terms of their livelihoods and economic interests.

"However, when it comes to controlling and responding on terror the same set of respondents do feel a clear and visible difference." CVoter's poll is the most conserva-

tive, predicting 267 seats for the ruling group, while the Times Now-VMR's poll is the most bullish, with 279 seats. The main opposition Congress

and its allies are expected to more than double their seats to about 141 on average. Pre-election opinion polls in India, with thousands of respondents, have proved unreliable sev-

eral times in the past in a vast coun-

try of about 1.3 billion people, of

whom about 900 million are eligible to vote. Congress has accused the BJP of using retaliatory air strikes on Pakistan as a political tool and has instead highlighted job creation, tackling farm distress and empowerment of women, among its top priori-

But the BJP has doubled down on national security issues, promising in its manifesto released on Monday to strip decades-old special rights from the people of Jammu and Kashmir.

Modi has said he will retain power with a bigger mandate than before, while Congress says its plan for annual handouts of 72,000 rupees (\$1,034) to the poorest families will help fuel its comeback. The election will be held in seven

phases and votes will be counted on May 23, with results likely to be clear the same day. The first phase will cover 91 out of

total of 543 constituencies. These 91 constituencies are spread across 20 states and federally-administered territories.
