Bangladesh and Brunei are expected to sign several deals on bilateral economic cooperation during the PM's April 21-23 visit.

According to the programme schedule, Hasina will fly on a special Biman aircraft on Sunday morning and reach Brunei International Airport in Bandar Seri Begawan at 2:45pm (local time). Crown Prince of Brunei Darussalam Al-Muhtadee Billah will receive the Bangladesh PM at the airport.

On the same day, the PM will attend a community reception, to be hosted by expatriate Bangladeshis in Brunei, at the Empire Hotel and Country Club, where she will be staying during her visit.

On Monday, she will have a general audience with Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah and Royal family members at the Istana Nurul Iman, the official residence of the Sultan.

"After the audience, the prime minister will hold bilateral talks with the Sultan at Baitul Mesyuarah in Istana Nurul Iman," PM's Press Secretary Ihsanul Karim told BSS, adding that the talks would be followed by signing of MoUs.

In the afternoon, Hasina will join a meeting between businessmen from Bangladesh, Brunei and Brunei National Chamber of Commerce and Industry at Empire Hotel and Country Club. She will attend an official banquet to be hosted by the Sultan.

She will lay the foundation stone of the new Chancery Building of the Bangladesh High Commission at Jalan Kebangsaan in Bandar Seri

of scarecrows is tenfold, like 270," the 69-year-old doll maker told AFP in an interview at her home.

It all started 16 years ago when the dexterous Ayano created a scarecrow dressed in her father's clothes to prevent birds eating the seeds she had planted in her garden.

"A worker who saw it in the garden thought it really was my father... he said hello but it was a scarecrow. It was funny," recalled Ayano.

Since then, Ayano has not stopped creating the life-size dolls, made with wooden sticks, newspapers to fill the body, elastic fabrics for skin and knitting wool for hair.

The skillful craftswoman needs only three days to make an adultsized doll that are now scattered all around the village.

The secret to breathing life into the dolls? Applying pink colour to the lips and cheeks with a make-up

brush, revealed Ayano. At the local school, she has placed 12 colourful child-sized dolls at desks, positioned as if part of a lively

class poring over their books. The school closed seven years ago

as there was no one left to teach, she recalled sadly. "Now there are no children. The

youngest person here is 55 years old.' Down the street, a "family" of scarecrows lounges in front of an abandoned grocery shop while a doll dressed as an old farmer window-

shops next door. Near the bus stop, a group of scarecrows gathers as another "father" doll pulls a cart full of "children."

While never humming with people, Ayano remembers as a child that Nagoro was once a well-to-do place with some 300 residents and labourers supported by the forestry industry and dam construction work.

"People gradually left... It's lonely now," she said. "I made more dolls as I remembered the time when the village was lively."

Nagoro's plight is replicated all around Japan, as the world's thirdlargest economy battles a declining population, low birth rate and high life expectancy.

The government has already floated a tender calling the qualified companies to participate in the bidding for demolition of the building, he further said, adding, "We will call the foreign companies to demolish the structure if local companies are not found."

"The overall contribution of adolescent fertility to TFR [Total Fertility Rate] is 25 percent, which means approximately 750,000 adolescents are giving birth annually," the report said.

Apart from these, the declining rate of child marriage in Bangladesh is slow as the prevalence of child marriage was 59 percent in 2018, the report said.

According to it, Bangladesh has made impressive progress on a range of indicators, including education (especially for girls), investments in the working-age population and child mortality.

"Concerning several other indicators, there remains much to be done. The prevalence of child marriage, the high adolescent fertility rate, the incompletion of secondary school education and youth unemployment are especially worthy of mention as areas where increased attention is

essential," the report observed. According to the report, the Maternal Mortality Ratio (MMR) has decreased from 322 maternal deaths per 100,000 live births in 2000 to 176 in 2015 and contraceptive prevalence rate has increased to 62 percent in

2014 from around 45 in 1994. Lauding Bangladesh's progress on various demographic variables, Torkelsson said, "Bangladesh has many lessons to share from which the world can learn."

However, she said the child marriage rate in Bangladesh was still the highest in South Asia, which most likely means that these girls would get pregnant, risking severe injuries and even death.

Torkelsson said the gender-unequal norms which remain worldwide were among the most significant drags on

the progress for women and girls to freely make fundamental decisions regarding their sexual and reproductive health and rights. These norms

manifested in a range of harmful practices, including GBV (gender-based violence), child marriage, etc. "In Bangladesh, too, there is need to continue efforts to eliminate genderbased violence, including this still-high

rate of child marriage, maternal mortal-

ity, and unmet family planning needs.

These are areas at heart for UNFPA, and

central to our work focus," she said.

Mia Seppo, UN Resident Coordinator in Bangladesh, said gender inequality is the key hindrance to achieving SDGs.

"Gender equality is an enabler goal that facilitates the achievement of all other goals -- not only in Bangladesh but for this entire region."

She also said it was clear that this rapid development is taking place in parallel with lingering inequality. "This seems to be the case for not only Bangladesh but also for many countries in this region and, actually, around the world."

State Minister for Health and Family Welfare Murad Hassan said Bangladesh is committed to contributing to the realisation of agendas set by the International Conference on

Population and Development. "We are optimistic that, with our continued efforts and multi-sectoral collaboration, we will soon be able to overcome the remaining challenges and build an equal Bangladesh for everyone regardless of their gender identity," he said.

Saying that Bangladesh is well ahead of most neighbouring countries in promoting women empowerment, Murad said, "Challenges still remain in achieving gender equality, namely, eradication of violence against women, prevention of child marriage and addressing gender digital divide.

Mother detained after Chinese vaccine protest

A Chinese health activist has been detained for more than a month, her husband said yesterday, after she participated in a protest over faulty vaccines -- a re-occurring issue in China.

According to police documents posted online by Li Xin, his wife He Fangmei is under "criminal detention" at the Xinxiang detention centre in central Henan province.

He, 33, who had said her daughter was diagnosed with a neurological disease after receiving vaccinations for hepatitis A, measles, and other illnesses, participated in a protest against faulty vaccines in Beijing in early March. She was later detained by local

police in Henan province on March 5 and charged with "picking quarrels and provoking trouble" -- a broad offense that Chinese authorities often use to arrest activists. She has not been released, said Li.

The drawn-out detention has "delayed the recovery" of their daughter, he told AFP. "We hope the authorities can honour their word, release He Fangmei

earlier, and let us continue to bring our child to the doctor," he said. The local police in Huixian city did not immediately respond to

AFP's request for comment.

China is regularly hit by scandals involving sub-par or toxic food, drugs and other products, despite repeated promises by the government to address the problem. Over the past year, compromised

vaccines have become an incendiary topic infuriating parents whose children may be exposed to potentially unsafe injections. In January, at least 145 children were administered expired polio vaccines in

But the string of incidents has already rattled the confidence of many Chinese parents, some of whom, like He, have taken to social media or the streets to push for more robust regulation.

"The authorities should conduct investigations of any official wrongdoings, but not punish the victims," Patrick Poon, China researcher at Amnesty International, told AFP.

"There is no legitimate reason for the authorities to detain them while they just tried to seek redress for their cases," he said.

US seeks to extend detention of some asylum seekers: report

US President Donald Trump's administration has issued an order that could keep some asylum seekers in jail for months or years as they wait for their cases to be heard, The New York Times reported Tuesday.

The order from Attorney General Bill Barr directs immigration judges to no longer allow asylum seekers who are apprehended after entering the country illegally to post bail, the newspaper said.

The order -- which will not go into effect for 90 days -- does not affect those who apply for asylum at a legal port of entry, the Times reported.

The move was quickly condemned by the American Civil Liberties Union rights organization, which vowed to challenge it in court. "Our Constitution does not allow

the government to lock up asylum seekers without basic due process. We'll see the administration in court Again," the ACLU tweeted. Trump has staked his presidency

on his insistence that the United States is being overrun by migrants and asylum seekers. But opponents, mostly in the

Democratic Party, say his push for building more walls on the Mexican border and his almost daily denunciations of migrants as dangerous criminals incites racial hatred. The president declared an emer-

gency to bypass Congress and unlock funds for his controversial wall project, and has also deployed troops to the border with Mexico.

The White House has also said it is looking into ways to transfer undocumented migrants to so-called sanctuary cities such as San Francisco, Los Angeles and New York that limit cooperation with US immigration officials.

Turkish defense minister makes unannounced visit to Pentagon

Turkish Defense Minister Hulusi Akar held unannounced talks with acting Pentagon chief Patrick Shanahan Tuesday amid tensions over Ankara's plans to buy a Russian missile defense system and its threat to attack Kurdish fighters in Syria. The two "met as strategic partners,"

Pentagon spokesperson Charles Summers said in a brief statement to the press after the meeting. "They focused their discussion on interests, rather than positions, and on

the importance of US-Turkish cooperation bilaterally and as NATO allies in achieving mutual security and economic prosperity for both countries and the region," Summers said. Summers made no mention of the spat over the US threat to halt a joint F-35

fighter jet program with Turkey if it buys Russia's S-400 missile defense system. Washington has already frozen

deliveries of aircraft and parts, saying the US aircraft system is too sensitive to be operated in tandem with the Russian equipment.

On April 2, Shanahan said he was confident Turkey would reverse course and buy the US Patriot missile defense system instead, but Ankara has made no such commitment yet.

Last week, Turkey's President Recep Tayyip Erdogan said the delivery of the S-400 system could be earlier than initially planned, according to the

Hurriyet daily. In parallel to tensions over the missile system, the US-Turkey relationship has been strained by Ankara's threat to launch an offensive in northeast Syria against the Kurdish-majority Syrian Democratic Forces, which battled the Islamic State group with backing from Western air strikes and

other support. Ankara links the SDF to the Kurdish separatist PKK movement at home, which it considers a terrorist organiza-

Meeting in Washington with Turkish Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu in early April, Secretary of State Mike Pompeo warned of "devastating consequences" if Turkey strikes Syria.

that - based on internal exit polls and "quick count" numbers - his campaign believed his share of the vote was in a 52-54 percent range. "We have noted several incidents

that have harmed the supporters of this ticket," he said, without giving detail. "Our volunteers should focus on safeguarding the ballot boxes because they are key to our victory." Widodo said the results indicated he had regained the presidency of the

world's fourth-most-populous nation,

but urged supporters to wait for the

election commission to announce official results. Kevin O'Rourke, a political analyst and author of the Indonesia-focused newsletter Reformasi Weekly, said that Widodo's re-election was now clear but his victory over 67-year-old

Prabowo was not resounding. "He failed to attain the psychological 60 percent level that had seemed within reach," O'Rourke said. "Prabowo performed better than expected, which may embolden him to run yet again in 2024, if he is sufficiently fit."

Widodo grew up in a riverside slum and was the first national leader to come from outside the political and military elite. Popularly known as Jokowi, his everyman image resonated in 2014 with voters tired of the old guard.

The eight-hour vote for both the presidency and legislature seats across a country that stretches more than 5,000 km (3,000 miles) from its western to eastern tips was both a Herculean logistical feat and testimony to the resilience of democracy two decades after authoritarianism was defeated.

The poll followed a campaign dominated by economic issues but was also marked by the growing influence of conservative Islam in the world's biggest Muslim-majority nation.

A senior government official close to the president said before the election that a win for Widodo with 52-55

percent of the vote would be a "sweet spot", and enough of a mandate to press on with, and even accelerate, reforms.

'NO BURNING'

The official election results will not be published until May. Any disputes can be taken to the Constitutional Court where a nine-judge panel will have 14 days to rule on them.

More than 10,000 volunteers

crowd-sourced results posted at polling stations in a real-time bid to thwart attempts at fraud. However, even before the election, the opposition alleged voter-list irregularities that it said could affect mil-

lions and vowed legal or "people power" action if its concerns were ignored. Ferdinand Hutahaen, a spokesman for the Prabowo campaign, sought to soothe concerns this could mean a

violent response. "Don't consider 'people power' as a form of violence," he told reporters. "There will be no burning, killing. We will see what kind of 'people power' and revolution society wants. We don't

want conflict in this country." Widodo campaigned on his record of deregulation and improving infrastructure, calling his first term a step to tackling inequality and poverty in

Southeast Asia's biggest economy. But religion has also been a factor. Conservative Muslim groups have

been increasingly influential. Widodo, a moderate Muslim from Java island, had to burnish his Islamic credentials after smear campaigns and hoax stories accused him of being anti-Islam, a communist or too close to China, all politically damaging in Indonesia. He picked Islamic cleric

Ma'ruf Amin, 76, as his running mate. Prabowo, a former special forces commander who has links to some hardline Muslim groups, and his running mate, business entrepreneur Sandiaga Uno, pledged to boost the economy by slashing taxes and cutting food prices.
