Nearly 7.5 lakh teenagers give birth every year

UNFPA report says adolescent birth rate in Bangladesh now as high as 31pc, almost unchanged for 25 yrs

The adolescent (15-19 years) birth rate in Bangladesh is still high as approximately 750,000 adolescent girls are giving birth annually, according to a new UN report.

"Adolescent fertility levels have remained relatively unchanged during the past 25 years with the adolescent fertility percentage being 33 percent in 1994 and it is 31 percent in 2018," said the United Nations Population Fund's (UNFPA) annual flagship report -- "State of World Population 2019".

The report was launched officially in Bangladesh yesterday at a programme in the capital.

Themed "Unfinished business: the pursuit of rights and choices for all", it portrays how the transformation of women's reproductive rights had taken shape over the past

"Approximately 750,000 adolescents are giving birth annually, which means these girls will most likely not continue with their education or enter the work market," said Dr Asa Torkelsson, UNFPA representative in Bangladesh, while unveiling the report.

The report also said the use of modern contraceptives among married teenage girls was at 47 percent, with 42 SEE PAGE 10 COL 2

Widodo on track to be re-elected

Indonesian President Joko Widodo appeared set for a second term as "quick count" results from yesterday's election rolled in, but his challenger claimed that he

had won the popular vote and urged supporters not to let his victory be snatched

Data from private pollsters based on counts of vote samples were in line with opinion polls that had predicted a win for Widodo, a former furniture businessman and low-key reformist.

They showed him winning the popular vote with about 54 percent, with a lead of between 7.1 and 11.6 percentage points over former general Prabowo Subianto, who was narrowly defeated when he took Widodo on in the last election five years ago.

Prabowo, a former son-in-law of military strongman Suharto who was overthrown in 1998, told a news conference

'47 children raped, abused in 15 days'

Girl child, housewife raped in Jashore, Feni

A six-year-old girl was allegedly violated and a mother of two was allegedly gang-raped in Jashore and Feni on Tuesday night.

In Jhenidah, a government primary school headmaster was arrested yesterday on charges of sexually harassing three girl students.

In another incident, a woman in Manikganj filed a case on Tuesday night against a local businessman for allegedly raping her repeatedly for four years by threatening and intimidating her in different ways.

Meanwhile, Manusher Jonno Foundation (MJF) yesterday expressed grave concern over the increasing number of child rape incidents across the country.

At least 47 children were either raped or subjected to attempted rape and sexual harassment in the last 15 days since April 2. Of them, 39 were raped

during this period, the rights body said in a statement. Besides, five children, including a girl, were killed during the same period for different reasons, it added.

MJF Executive Director Shaheen Anam urged the government to take effective measures to ensure safety of women and children.

The organisation also demanded exemplary punishments for those involved in the killing of Feni madrasa student Nusrat Jahan Rafi.

According to statistics of Ain o Salish Kendra, at least 123 children were raped across the country in the first three months of this year.

In Jashore, a priest allegedly raped a girl inside a Hindu temple at Birampur village on Tuesday evening when worship services were underway.

The accused is Prokash Banerjee, priest of Sree Sree Anukul Thakur Mandir, said police.

Man strangles wife, sets her body afire

Police say; husband detained

A woman was strangled and then her body set on fire by her husband in the capital's South Mugda yesterday, police said

The victim, Hashi Begum, 27, was a housewife and the mother of a seven-year-old boy. She had her son from her first marriage with one Sujon.

Police detained her husband Komol Hossain, 30, a motor parts shop owner, from near his rented flat in South Mugda in the morning.

In the evening, Hashi's father Sheikh Altaf, from Dinajpur, filed a murder case with Mugda Police Station, accusing Komol as the lone suspect.

Valley of the dolls

Scarecrows outnumber people in Japan village

In the tiny village of Nagoro, deep in the mountains of western Japan, the wind howls down a deserted street with not a living soul to be seen.

But yet the street appears busy, dotted with lifesized dolls that outnumber humans 10 to one, the product of a one-woman bid to counter the emptiness and loneliness felt in Nagoro, like many Japanese villages decimated by depopulation.

Nagoro, around 550 kilometres (400 miles) southwest of Tokyo, has become known as the valley of dolls after local resident Tsukimi Ayano began placing scarecrows on the street to inject some life into her depopulated village.

"Only 27 people live in this village but the number
