The Chattogram-based GPH Ispat Ltd has constructed a makeshift dam on a stream bordering the Jangal-Bashbaria reserve forest in Sitakunda to secure water supply to its new factory.

The diversion could jeopardise the forest's biodiversity and deprive an indigenous village of water, said forest department officials. The dam was built with sandbags on





Let me see my son before I die

Pleads the mother of a man missing for 3 years; families going through similar ordeal gather to share their anguish

"I am growing old. I am becoming sick... I want to see my son for one last time before I die."

The voice of Saleha Begum, 65, was cracking repeatedly as she sought to know the whereabouts of her son Moazzem Hossain Topu.

A former BCL leader, Topu was allegedly picked up by plainclothes men from the capital's Bashundhara area in 2016 when he was just 28.

"Already 1,186 days have passed. Shocked, his father

died of a heart attack. I met the prime minister four times and the home minister 36 times. But there has been no progress," said Saleha, clearly frustrated.

She is not the only one to have lost a loved one to this new trend of enforced disappearance.

Between January 2009, when the Awami League government took office, and December 2018, at least 507 people have fallen victims to enforced disappearance, according to the International Federation for Human Rights (FIDH).

He is the son of late Foyjul Kabir of border village Tulshidanga Dakkhin Patari in Naogaon's Sapahar upazila, said BGB and police officials.

The shootout at a safe house erupted on Friday in Sainthamaruthu in Ampara district, to the south of the Sri Lankan town of Batticaloa, site of one of the Easter Sunday blasts which have been claimed by Islamic State.
