Eight killed in three road accidents

At least eight people, including three children, died in separate road accidents in Chandpur, Laxmipur and Dhaka yesterday.

In Chandpur's Shahrasti upazila, a speeding CNG-run auto-rickshaw collided head-on with a bus yesterday morning. Six people, who were all passengers of the auto-rickshaw, were killed.

The dead were identified as: Moni Begum, 28, her son Rumman Hossain, 8, Abul Kalam, 62, Ranjit Chandra, 52, Md Shahjahan, 62, and Fakhrul Islam, 75.

Officer-In-Charge (OC) Shahrasti Police Station Md Shah Alam said the incident took place around 9:15am when a Gazipurbound Cordova Paribahan bus collided head-on with the autorickshaw near Kakoirtola Bazar area on the Chandpur-Cumilla road.

Four of the passengers died on the spot, one died on the way to hospital and an-other at Cumilla Medical College Hospital, the OC said.

Swapan, the driver of the CNG auto-rickshaw, was in critical condition and undergo-ing treatment at the hospital, he added.

According to witnesses, the CNGrun auto-rickshaw, after picking up the six pas-sengers from Kachua's Jagotpur area, was moving with excessive speed and over-took four to five vehicles before it collided headon with the bus.

Agitating locals barricaded the Chandpur-Cumilla regional highway and vandalised some vehicles. However, police took control after

around two hours and removed the barricade, af-ter which vehicular movement went back to normal.

Jihadul Kabir, superintendent of Chandpur police, said legal action would be taken after investigating the cause of the accident. Meanwhile in Laxmipur, a madrasa

student was run over by a speeding pickup van while he was crossing a road in Shakchar area on his way to school around 10:00am. The dead was identified as Md

Yasin Hossain, 9, student of Hamid Miaji Madrasa. He was taken to Laxmipur General

Hospital in critical condition, where doctors de-clared him dead. Blocking the road with logs, locals staged a protest against the accident for an hour.

3 RSO men linked to Burdwan blast jailed

A Dhaka court yesterday sentenced three Myanmar nationals to 10 years in jail for their involvement in planning subversive activities in Bangladesh.

The convicts are Md Nur Hossain alias Rafiqul Islam, 30, Yasir Arafat, 26, and Omar Karim, 29. Of them, Omar is still at large.

According to court documents, all of them were members of Myanmarbased militant outfit Rohingya Solidarity Organisation.

Judge Md Rabiul Alam of the Special Tribunal-4 handed down the sentence under Explosive Substances Act in presence of the two accused.

The tribunal fined them Tk 10,000 each, in default of which they will have to serve ad-ditional six months in jail.

The punishment of the fugitive will be effective from the day of their arrest, the judge said in his judgment.

According to the case statement, a team of detectives arrested Nur and Yasir with ex-plosives from Sir Salimullah Muslim Orphanage Road in the capital's Lalbagh on No-vember 30, 2014. Four other militants, including Omar managed to flee from the place of occurrence.

The convicts had links to a blast took place in a rented house in Burdwan town of Kol-kata on October 2, 2014.

Moreover, they had been planning to conduct subversive activities in Bangladesh with the help of international Islamic militant organisations.

On March 3, 2015, investigation officer of the case SI Md Abdul Kader Miah submitted a charge sheet accusing the three.

Beyond belief

"Police filed this case when I was in jail. They say I fled the scene leaving a machete. How could anyone do that when he is already in jail?" Rahi told The Daily Star recently.

"The case was filed to harass me, nothing else," he said.

SI Apurba, the complainant of the case, said he made Rahi an accused because eyewitnesses gave

his name. "The investigating officer can drop the name of any accused if he does not find evidence against him

during investigations," he said. Contacted, investigating officer

Arif said he would not make any comment on the matter.

"Talk to my officer-in-charge or

senior officials," he said. Pressed further, he said he was under no obligation to talk to journalists and answer their

questions. "I'm accountable only to my

senior officers," he said. But the then OC Jamal Uddin Mir, now posted in Kadamtoli Police

Station, squarely blamed Arif. "I am not responsible for this. It was the duty of the investigating

officer to probe the matter properly. It was his duty to find out who was in jail at the time or not," he said. Contacted last night, Dhaka

Metropolitan Police Deputy Commissioner (Tejgaon division) Biplob Kumar Sarker said he could not make any comment without seeing the case documents.

During its study, the rights body analysed reports of dailies Prothom Alo, Jugantar, Samakal, Ittefaq, New Age and The Daily Star.

Some reasons for child murders that the newspapers reported were family dispute, wealth, refusal in relationship, illicit relationship, protest, failed rape attempt, and refusing to give extortion money. Addressing the press conference,

Prof Shahnaz Huda of the law department at Dhaka University said one of Bangladesh government's initiatives to reduce violence against children is to formulate law. However, law formulation is not sufficient to reduce violence against

children despite having provisions like death sentence in a rape case, she said. One of the aims of establishing laws is to deter perpetrators from

"However, this is not happening in our country because of the 'culture of immunity' in most cases, when the perpetrator knows he or she will get away with economic or political influence," she added.

The MJF report says 345 news reports citied 356 child rape victims last year. Of them, 22 died. In previous year, the number of

such reports was 456 and victims were 472, it adds.

In cases of attempted rape, 53 reports were published about the same number of victims. In previous year, 41 such reports about 45 victims.

The report also says the highest number of children -- 412 -- was killed and 133 more injured in road accidents last year.

Whereas, 364 reports on road accidents had 452 child victims in 2017, it says.

In 2018, the newspapers published 56 stories on sexual violence against children citing 77 victims. One of them died.

In 2017, news reports on similar issues were 81 and affected children were 101.

Some 88 reports mentioned 98 child victims of kidnapping incidents last year. Of them, 19 were killed.

On the other hand, such reports in 2017 were 69 and the victims were 72, says the report.

In cases of child marriage, last year 11 news reports were published citing 177 victims all over the

country, it says. In 2017, media reports on child marriage were 36 which cited 525

victims, it adds. In 2018, 38 children became victims of trafficking and 22 news reports were published in this regard, whereas such news reports were 10 and the victims were 80 in 2017, the report mentions.

was that last year 70 children were physically tortured and 17 were raped by their teachers. The situation of the country's children was not improving

despite various initiatives by both government and non-government organisations were in place, said MJF Executive Director Shaheen Anam. One reason might be that the

number of children was increasing. It could also be, violence was increasing in the society, she said. She said legal procedure should

be strengthened so that the victims get justice. Besides, guardians, parents,

teachers and educational institutions have to be more aware to protect their children, she added.

Rony Chakma, senior assistant secretary of the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs, said the ministry was working to reduce violence against children.

the owners of residential hotels and religious institutions in different areas of the capital.

In the meeting with hotel owners, police officials asked them to check every guest through metal detectors and archways very carefully. They were also asked to check every hotel staff members' identity cards and addresses and were advised to take police help if needed, DMP officials

During the meeting with religious institutions' authorities,

police asked them to install security instruments at every entry point and check eve-ry devotee before entry, they added. Earlier on April 24, Inspector

General of Police Mohammad Javed Patwary directed all units of police to beef up security and intelligence surveillance to prevent any untoward incident ahead of the upcoming May Day, Ramadan and Eid-ul-Fitr. Javed came up with the directive
