# Govt to bring Bangladeshi citizens home

50 ready for voluntary repatriation; fighting rages on in and around Tripoli

The government has planned to bring home the Bangladeshis facing high level of vulnerabilities in and around Tripoli, as fighting continues between the UNbacked Libyan government and Libyan National Army.

"Fifty Bangladeshis have agreed for voluntary repatriation. We will charter a plane as soon as the number reaches 150. IOM assists us in the repatriation process," ASM Ashraful Islam, counsellor (labour) of Bangladesh embassy in Tripoli, told The Daily Star by phone yesterday.

He said around 300 Bangladeshi workers had been relocated to the labour accommodations in safe zones of Tripoli since early April when the Libyan National Army led by Field Marshal Khalifa Haftar launched assault on

Last week, air strikes hit the Libyan capital as forces loyal to Khalifa Haftar pursued a three-week campaign to take over Tripoli and also confirmed for the first time that they had dispatched a warship to an oil port.

## Cold case cracked

DB claims to have solved murder case that left them baffled for 2 years

In late March, 2017, police recovered the decapitated body of a woman in a secluded area near Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport. They had no clue about the identity of the victim or who killed her in such a brutal way.

Finding no other option, they ran her fingerprints through the National Identity Card database and a week later they got a match.

The victim was garment worker Kulsum Akhter, 25, of Elias Mollah

slum in Pallabi and a mother of two. She had been missing since March 22, 2017, when she left home for

Her family members, who had been desperately looking for her, was devastated.

Kulsum's mother said, "I've lost my child but the loss Kulsum's

children suffered cannot be explained with words." Her body was handed over to the family following a DNA match with her mother.

The family mourned but could not get justice as the police were clueless as to who committed the brutal murder.

But two years later, detectives got their men yesterday.

#### 3 of a family electrocuted in Rangpur

Three members of a family, including a sevenyear-old girl, died from electrocution as they came contact apparently with an electrified wire in Rangpur city yesterday, police said.

The dead are Tajmahal Begum, 61, her daughter Tania Wafsi, 30, and Tania's daughter Tazmia. Of them, Tania was a teacher of Hajirhat Government Primary School in the district.

Zamir Uddin, assistant superintendent of police (ASP) in Rangpur (Kotwali Zone) told The Daily Star that the family lived in a rented house in Baniapara

Tania and her daughter went to the rooftop of the building to collect clothes around noon after it started to rain, the ASP said, quoting Rubel Islam, husband of Tania. The

#### Sri Lanka vows to hunt down extremists Fears more attacks

Muslims, meanwhile, held Friday prayers under tight security, condemning the jihadist attacks that killed 257 people on April 21. Islamist extremists were

# Stand-off drags on in Venezuela

Guaido calls for protests at military bases as Maduro exhorts armed forces to fight 'any coup plotter'

Venezuelan opposition leader Juan Guaido on Thursday called for peaceful demonstrations at army bases, days after a military uprising in support of his bid to oust President Nicolas Maduro fizzled out.

The latest appeal came after Maduro called on the armed forces of the crisis-wracked nation to oppose "any coup plotter", as the embattled leader dug in his heels in the face of ongoing protests and international pressure, especially from the United States.

In a tweet, Guaido asked supporters to gather for peaceful demonstrations at military bases today in a bid to get soldiers to "support the constitution."

Guaido -- recognised by more than 50 countries as Venezuela's

interim president -- had on Tuesday called on the military to rise up against Maduro, and a small group heeded his call.

But that movement fizzled out, and sparked two days of protests against the government during which four people were killed. The military leadership has

reiterated its support for the government, and Maduro is standing his ground. "Yes, we are in combat -- keep morale high in this fight to disarm

any traitor, any coup plotter," he said at a televised event with the military high command, at which he was surrounded by soldiers. "No one can be afraid -- it is the hour to defend our right to peace,"

he said at the ceremony, which was

attended by 4,500 military personnel,

according to the government. And Defense Minister General

Vladimir Padrino said: "We've come to ratify our loyalty... to the supreme commander of the armed forces, who is our only president, President Nicolas Maduro."

'BRUTAL REPRESSION' Meanwhile, Venezuela's Supreme

Court ordered the re-arrest of opposition figure influential Leopoldo Lopez -- who made a dramatic appearance alongside Guaido on Tuesday after he was freed from house arrest.

Lopez has since taken refuge at the Spanish embassy. Madrid has said it would not hand over Lopez to Venezuelan authorities, nor would it ask him to leave.


