GAPITALIZA English has a number of rules for capitalization. In English you should capitalize:

The first letter of the first word of a sentence. We should all eat sensibly.

The pronoun I.

Jessica and I arrived just in time for our class.

Proper nouns. Proper nouns refer to a specific person, place, event, or group. Runa and Rita prepared the dinner tonight. (Runa and Rita are the names of two people.)

He lives in Dhaka. (Dhaka is the name of a specific place.)

All the boys in our school are in the Boy Scouts. (Boy Scouts is the name of a specific group.)

Tokyo has been chosen by the IOC to host the 2020 Olympics. (Olympics is the name of a specific event.)

Words such as bank, mosque, library, only when they name a specific place. I need to go to Sonali Bank.

He goes to Gulshan Mosque.

He regularly visits Central Library.

Company names. He works for The Daily Star.

6 Brand names. Please buy me a bar of Cadbury.

Do you want Coke?

Names of religions and words that come from them. Buddhism Judaism Christianity Muslim Christian Buddhist Jew

Religious festivals.

Ramadan Christmas Passover Diwali

God and Allah. The Arabic word for God is Allah.

Titles of Books, Movies, TV Shows. Capitalize the first word, last word, and the important words (nouns, verbs, adjectives, and adverbs) of the titles of books, articles, plays, TV shows, songs, and movies. Do not capitalize unimportant words, such as articles (a, the) or prepositions (in, on), unless they are the first or last word in the title. My favourite TV show is "Friends."

Days of the Week and Months of the Year.

My doctor's appointment is on Tuesday, May 14, at 4:30. Do not capitalize words such as week, month, day, or year, unless they are part of

a specific day. Sunday is my favourite day of the week.

Christmas Day is always on the 25th of December.

Capitalize earth when it refers to the planet. We need to protect the Earth.


