BCB to assess SL security



The Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) is currently monitoring the security situation in Sri Lanka, where Bangladesh are scheduled to play a three-match ODI series in July after the ICC Cricket World Cup in the United Kingdom.

BCB chief executive Nizamuddin Chowdhury informed that the board will heed advice from the concerned authorities, such as Sri Lanka Cricket (SLC), before taking any decision on the matter.

Last month, over 300 people were killed while many more were injured during a string of bomb attacks in the island nation.

"We will take advice from our foreign ministry and the Bangladesh High Commission in Sri Lanka. We are also likely to hold talks with the SLC during the Asian Cricket Council meeting," Chowdhury told Cricinfo.

Shooting team set for Munich World Cup

After failing to send the squad to Beijing for ISSF World Cup in April, the Bangladesh Shooting Sports Federation (BSSF) is now planning to send a sevenmember team to the Germany World Cup which will be held in Munich from May 24

to 31. BSSF has already selected six players -- three each in air-rifle and pistol events -- after Bangladesh Navy and Bangladesh Army agreed to bear expenditure of five shooters while the game's governing body will bear the expenditure of a rifle shooter and a coach.

"We have been going through some financial crisis, so we can't send the shooters to every international meet. This time around, the services teams have agreed to bear the cost of some shooters which paved the way for sending shooters to Munich. However, participation in World Cup also depends on getting government order and German visa," BSSF chief executive Mustaque Waise told the Daily Star yesterday.

"Though the BSSF decided to send the added Baki.

shooters to Beijing in April, but we could not send them due to short period of time," Waise said, adding that Bangladesh Navy

will bear the expense of three shooters -- Commonwealth Games double silver medallist rifle shooter Abdullah Hel Baki along with Rabbi Hasan Munna and pistol shooter Piash Hossain.

He added that Army would bear the expense of Commonwealth Games silver medallist pistol shooter Shakil Ahmed as well as Abdur Razzak. The game's local governing body would bear the expense of rifle shooter Rabbi Hasan Munna and a coach.

Even though BSSF is struggling to send shooters aboard with an aim of earning quota places for Tokyo Olympics, the shooters are not much optimistic.

"Preparation is going on and I hope to do well in Munich," Baki said. "To be honest, it is very tough for us to reach eight-man final round because world's top shooters will come to fight for quota places for Olympics."

"However, our final target is Asian Championship in September where we will try to qualify for the final round,"

Kompany's stunner the difference

with Leicester. The long-serving defender once again proved the man for the big occasion as he netted with a ferocious long-range strike 20 minutes from time to settle a tense encounter at the Etihad Stadium on Monday.

The 1-0 win lifted treble-chasing City back to the top of the Premier League, one point ahead of Liverpool, with just one game remaining in a gripping title race.

Kompany's decisive contribution ranked alongside his vital winner against rivals Manchester United during the 2012 title run-in for importance.

Fitness issues may mean the 33-yearold is no longer a regular starter but the influence of the three-time title-winning skipper shows no sign of waning even though he admits his future is uncertain.

"It is amazing, unbelievable," said fellow central defender Laporte. "I never see one goal like that -- maybe because I wasn't on the pitch, I don't know -- but we are so satisfied with this game.

"He is a guy (who is) very important for us, for the club. I think he gives us a lot of things. He is an example for us.

"We have to improve and keep working with him because he can give a lot and he is a very good guy on and off the pitch."

Kompany's sensational strike came as City piled on the pressure in the second half, knowing anything less than a 13th

Sana sees the other side too

Country's top archer Ruman Sana saw the other side of the coin six weeks after producing his career best score as the national champion performed below-par to score 655 in the qualification round of Hyundai Archery World Cup (stage 2) in Shanghai, China yesterday.

Sana, who scored his career best of 681 to finish top in qualification during the Asian Cup (Stage-1) in Bangkok in March, this time finished 35th out of 99 archers in the qualification round where Hakim Ahmed Rubel finished 28th with a score of 658, four points more than what he scored in Thailand.

Tamimul Islam and Imdadul Haque Milon scored 650 and 640 points to become 47th and 68th to set up matches against Finland's Antti Tekoniemi and England's Patrick Huston in the first round of elimination today. Sana, who got two byes during the Bangkok competition following his top-place finish, will face 78th-ranked



Beauty Roy bettered her qualification score of Asian Cup (stage-1) competition by scoring 612 points but she had to be satisfied with a 51st-place finish out of 76 in qualification and set her elimination clash against Iran's Rarmida Ghassemi.

Like Sana, the archers in compound event also frustrated as Ashim Kumar managed 669 points, some 22 points less than what he scored in Bangkok, to finish 60th out of 65 archers while Sushmita Banik finished 18th out of 55 competitors with a score of 681 points, four points less than what she scored in Bangkok.

There are few clubs with a history to match that of Ajax, but they are in the process of writing a new chapter in Amsterdam with Erik ten Hag

taking them to within sight of a first treble since the days of Johan Cruyff. On Sunday, Ten Hag's spellbinding

team secured the first leg as they beat Willem II 4-0 to win the Dutch Cup. The battle with PSV Eindhoven for the

Eredivisie title resumes this weekend, and by then Ajax could be through to their first Champions League final since 1996. They take a 1-0 lead into their semifinal second leg against Tottenham Hotspur on

Wednesday, with young stars like Matthijs de Ligt, Frenkie de Jong and Donny van de Beek mesmerising Europe on a run that has already seen them defeat Real Madrid and Juventus. Those players have dominated the

headlines, but the work done by the 49-year-old Ten Hag has been remarkable, and entirely in keeping with his progress up until now. His career as a player was unremarkable

by comparison, with the 2001 Dutch Cup the only major trophy he won on the field. The midfielder captained Twente to victory on penalties against PSV Eindhoven. Ten Hag was close to Fred Rutten, his

coach at Twente, and after ending his playing career aged just 32, he later became Rutten's assistant at PSV. These days, Ten Hag's playing style

draws comparisons to Pep Guardiola. "When we lose the ball, we must win

it back immediately," goalkeeper Andre Onana told AFP.

"He is focused on that, he is always with Utrecht in 2015. telling us that if we have control of the ball, we have the ability to push back any opponent."
