Wage war on food adulteration

HC urges PM, orders govt to remove 52 items found substandard by BSTI

Urging the prime minister to declare a war on food adulteration, the High Court yesterday directed the government to immediately remove from the market the 52 food items that have been found substandard by Bangladesh Standards and Testing Institution.

"If necessary, the state may declare an emergency for preventing food adulteration," the HC observed, adding that food adulteration cannot be tolerated and there can be no compromise on this.

"We urge the government, the ruling party and the prime minister to declare a war on food adulteration the way it was done in case of narcotics."

THE HC OBSERVES

The substandard items include daily essentials such as salt, turmeric and chilli powder. Certain brands of vermicelli that see high demand during the Ramadan are also among the food products.

37 Bangladeshis feared dead

Siraj Miah has not stopped shedding tears since hearing news of his son Liton Miah's death in the tragic boat capsize off the Tunisian coast on Friday night. In between mourning, he repeatedly demanded punishment for the travel agent who had planned Liton's journey to Italy.

"My son and others spent five painful months before leaving for Libya," he told our Sylhet correspondent over phone from Fenchuganj upazila yesterday.

Liton and six others from Sylhet division were victims of the tragedy that claimed the lives of 60 migrants. Thirtyseven other Bangladeshis are currently missing. Sixteen others, including 14 Bangladeshis, were rescued by the Tunisian Navy and fishermen.

No pay scale in 9 years, no pay for months

8th national pay scale announced in 2015, but jute workers not getting it; they go on countrywide indefinite strike and road, rail blockade today

On September 7, 2015, the cabinet approved the eighth national pay scale effective from July that year, and it has been implemented in al-most all government offices and corporations.

But four years on, some 60,000 workers of the 22 state-run jute mills are still waiting, although all officials and employees under the jute ministry, including the Bangladesh Jute Mills Corporation, are drawing their salaries under the new scale.

On top of this, the workers have not been paid for six to 12 weeks, with SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

Nusrat Murder Police super withdrawn for negligence

The Superintendent of Police in Feni SM Jahangir Alam Sarkar was yesterday closed for negligence of duty over the murder of madrasa student Nusrat Jahan Rafi.
