Traffickers use 3 routes to send Bangladeshi fortune seekers to the 'promised land'

Transnational human traffickers use several countries for transits, including India, Sri Lanka, the United Arab Emirates, Jordan and Turkey, to send Bangladeshi job seekers first to Libya, and then to Europe through the Mediterranean Sea, Rab officials said.



Frightening PHONE CALLS

How traders in Kachukhet live with the curse of extortion

They get 'death sentence'

The cell phone of a man, who owns a shop in the capital's Kachukhet area, started ringing the moment he along with others was about to lift a Rubel.

As he received the call, he heard something that sent shudders down his spine.

"Rubel was killed by my men, now you are my next target. Get ready to die." The caller who introduced himself as Shahin said in a chilling voice.

Only the night before, unknown assailants stabbed Shahjahan Rubel, owner of Raha Partex at Tamanna Complex in nearby Ibrahimpur, to death. His family members alleged that one top listed criminal Shahin Shikder, who has become a byword for terror in the area, murdered Rubel as he refused to give him extortion money.

About two months before the killing on October 31, Rubel had filed a general diary (GD) with Bhashantek Police Station, saying he had received death threats from Shahin.

Another local trader, Mizanur Rahman, was coffin carrying the body of a fellow trader named slain the same way just 15 days before Rubel's

murder. And a month before that, one more trader in the area, Abdur Rahman, survived a similar attack.

for the attacks. He also reminded the traders of similar consequences if they turn down his demand for extortion money.

ROHINGYA REFUGEES

2.5 lakh get identity cards

UN says those will serve as proof of their right to return to Myanmar

The UN said yesterday it has registered more than 250,000 Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh, providing many with their first ever identification cards and proof of their right to return to Myanmar in the future.

The UN refugee agency also said the registration could serve as a tool for law enforcement to help counter human trafficking.

"Over a quarter of a million Rohingya refugees from Myanmar have now been jointly registered and provided with identity cards by Bangladesh authorities and UNHCR," spokesman Andrej Mahecic told reporters in Geneva.

Some 740,000 Rohingya refugees fled a military crackdown in August 2017 to cross into Bangladesh where 300,000 members of the persecuted Muslim minority were already in camps.

Many Rohingya refugees who fled said there had been mass rapes and slaughters in the villages, and in a report published last September, the fact-finding mission said there were reasonable grounds to believe the atrocities

8 killed during nor'wester

Eight people were killed and several others injured as a nor'wester hit the capital and some northern districts of the country yesterday.

Of them, three died in the capital, two in Chapainawabganj, two in Naogaon and one in Rajshahi.

In the capital, Shakirul Islam, 40, was killed as a makeshift pandal of the Baitul Mukarram national mosque collapsed on him and others around 7:00pm. Shakirul along with others was offering prayers there after iftar.

Twenty-two injured were taken to Dhaka Medical College Hospital, said Bachchu Mia, inspector of DMCH police outpost.

In North Badda, two people were killed in a boundary wall collapse, said Abdur Razzak, officer-in-charge (investigation) of Badda Police Station.

They dead are Bulbul Biswas, 23, and Tapan, 22.

According to the Met office, the wind speed was up to 65kmph during the storm and it was accompanied by 23mm of rainfall in the capital.

City dwellers on stréets for safe Wasa water

Demand resignation of Wasa MD

A section of Dhaka dwellers demonstrated yesterday demanding safe Wasa water and resignation of its managing director Taqsem A Khan for what they said was his failure to carry out his responsibilities properly.

Holding placards, several dozen people, under the banner of Wasar Nirapod Pani Andolon (Movement for Safe Wasa Water), marched through roads from Jurain to Shanir Akhra.

During the nearly two-hour protest from around 10:30am, the city dwellers distributed leaflets, including a

five-point demand, among those living in the areas. They asked for compensation for those who suffered from various diseases caused by the unsafe Wasa water. The other demands include providing Wasa consumers with
