Mahtab Uddin passes away

Mahtab Uddin, a freedom fighter and mentor to a number of journalists in Rajshahi, passed away in Dhaka yesterday morning. He was 80 years old.

Mahtab left two sons and four daughters. He breathed his last at 7:45am, after complaining of chest pains at his son's house in Dhanmondi.

Mahtab studied honours in Bengali literature at Rajshahi University.

In the 1960s, Mahtab Uddin founded Surjo Shikha, an organisation for practicing theatre and Tagore songs.

He actively participated in the country's Liberation War of 1971 and led several groups of freedom fighters and guerrilla warfare. After the liberation, he dedicated his life to research on the war and providing support to poor freedom fighters.

He was the editor of weekly Gono Khobor in the 1990s. Mahtab also wrote numerous songs, poetry, stories and novels.

Social barriers hindrance to women's participation: study

Discriminatory attitude towards female workers and social barrier are the major reasons behind lack of women's participation in trade union activities in the country, a study has found.

Bangladesh Labour Institute (Bashi), a non-government labour welfare organisation, conducted the study through interviewing labourers [both male and female] and trade union leaders in Dhaka's Mirpur, Kalyanpur and Savar areas earlier this year.

Analysing data of 20 labour associations, the study finds that only 15 percent members of the associations are women, although the country has a big female workforce, particularly in the readymade garment sector.

As active trade unions help ensure labour rights, the low participation may put the female workers at a risk of self-security, sextual harassment and violence, it says.

they face various barriers from their family and society to participate in trade union activities, like meetings, rallies and processions -- which mostly takes place far away from their homes.

Those who somehow manage to remain active, face discrimination at their own associations, according to the study report.

In most cases, their male counterparts claim the top posts of the associations and do not accept opinions of female members. Some women even alleged that they were

sexually harassed by male members of the associations, said the report. To overcome the situation, the study suggested

to bring a change to the social system. It also urged men to change their mindset

towards female workers. Speaking at the discussion, Bangladesh Labour Institute Trustee Board Chairman Shah Atiul Islam said, "The patriarchal mindset exists everywhere in

our society, which is the reason behind the current situation. A decent environment -- booth at workplace The findings were unveiled at a discussion and in the associations -- have to be ensured to increase women's participation in the trade union

SEXUAL HARASSMENT OF PEER

M'singh medical college students postpone demo

Mymensingh Medical College students, who had been demonstrating since Thursday protesting authorities' inaction regarding alleged sexual harassment of a female student by an outsider, have postponed their agitation till June 30.

They took the decision after a four-hour meeting with the college authorities yesterday.

"The administration pledged to fulfil our 11-point demand by June 30," said Shehabul Hasib, a fifth-year student. He said their demands include ensuring security for students on the campus and arresting the person responsible for harassing the female student.

Earlier in the day, students staged a sit-in in front of the academic building. "Even though it was a holiday, we gathered here to realise our demands," said Md Robiul Islam, a fifth-year student. "We don't want outsiders entering the campus or hostels," he added. Besides students and college authorities, the meeting, held in the

afternoon, was also attended by police and local administration. Principal Prof Anwar Hossain chaired the meeting. Talking to this correspondent, many students expressed skepticism

over the matter. They alleged that the authorities often make pledges but do not follow through. They threatened tougher movement if their demands are not met.

WHAT HAPPENED?

On May 15, a miscreant made indecent gestures at a second-year student, while she was returning to her hostel in the afternoon.

Immediately afterwards, the girl and other students notified the hostel superintendent and the principal about the matter. The hostel superintendent failed to take appropriate actions and instead asked students to conceal the matter, the protesters alleged.

Refuting the students' allegation, the principal said authorities are taking necessary steps to strengthen security on campus.

the e-passports illegally, the minister said allegations of information theft from the e-passport is "absurd".

"We are doing everything carefully," the minister added.

Last June, the Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (Ecnec) approved a project to introduce e-passports, which many countries of the world are using nowadays.

In July, the government signed an agreement with German firm Veridos GmbH to promote Bangladesh into the e-passport era, which was expected to begin in December the same year. However, the process saw some unexpected delays, according to passport office

sources. Around 120 countries have already introduced

e-passports. As per a planning ministry proposal, Bangladesh introduced MRP and machine-readable visa system on April 2010, in accordance with the International Civil Aviation Organisation guidelines.

Mob beats 'hijacker' to death in N'ganj


