On the 11th Jaishtha in 1306 in Bangla calendar, Nazrul was born in Churulia near Asansol in West Bengal's Burdwan district.

He was famous for his poem Bidrohi (The Rebel) and his many melodious songs. He was a poet, lyricist, musician, revolutionary and philosopher.

The nation drew inspiration from Nazrul's poems and songs during the Liberation War and democratic movements and struggles.

There are 2,400 of his songs, and together they are known as Nazrul Geeti or Nazrul Sangeet.

After the country's independence, Nazrul was declared the national poet and he was brought to Dhaka from Kolkata. He died here in 1976.

"That likely makes it the third largest water reservoir on Mars after the polar ice caps."

Scientists have hypothesized that the layers of ice formed on Mars during past ice ages and were protected from periods of warming by sand that covered their surface and protected from solar radiation.

While scientists have long surmised Mars' past glacial activity, which were influenced by the planet's tilting and wobbling toward or away from the sun over the periods of about 50,000 years, ice caps were thought to have disappeared from Mars entirely.

Instead, much of that ice was locked inside the planet's surface, say researchers.

"Surprisingly, the total volume of water locked up in these buried polar deposits is roughly the same as all the water ice known to exist in glaciers and buried ice layers at lower latitudes on Mars, and they are approximately the same age, Nerozzi said.

Research has implications on not only how Mars looks today, but also how the red planet's climate may have, in the past, been conducive to life as we know it on Earth.

"Understanding how much water was available globally versus what's trapped in the poles is important if you're going to have liquid water on Mars, "Nerozzi said.

"You can have all the right conditions for life, but if most of the water is locked up at the poles, then it becomes difficult to have sufficient amounts of liquid water near the equator. "

As the prospects of human space colonisation become more and more serious, the habitability of Mars by humans is becoming an area of greater interest by bother private and public parties.

Nasa recently awarded one company a \$500,000 grand prize for designing the concept for a humanready habitat that could be produced and replicated on Mars using 3D printing.

# Potato glut badly hurts growers

prospect of exporting local varieties. We are also looking at ways to strengthen our lab facilities to export added. disease free potatoes. We will submit a report to the ministry soon.'

Russia and the European Union were potential markets for Bangladeshi potatoes, but those opportunities ended in 2015-16 when Russia found diseases in potatoes exported from Bangladesh and issued a temporary ban.

The Russian Federal Service for Veterinary and Phytosanitary Surveillance said the potatoes from Bangladesh were infected by brown rot disease and potato tuber moth, as there is no accredited or standard lab in Bangladesh to test the quality of potatoes.

Bangladesh's export of potato, the world's fourth largest food crop after maize, wheat, and rice, reached a record high of over 100,000 tonnes in 2013-14, plummeting to 53,000 tonnes last year. It was 27,811.6 tonnes till April this year.

Manzurul Hannan, managing director of Hortex Foundation (Horticulture Export Development Foundation), said processed potato is the future of Bangladesh. "Yes, we could not increase our potato exports. But, last year, we exported potato flakes and crackers worth Tk 30 lakh to 26 countries."

Hannan, also a former director general of DAE, said some chips and crackers companies are also interested in processed potatoes and have started expanding their capacities.

"We hope the situation will improve within a year as scientists

are work-ing on the quality of the potatoes. Besides, the government is also paying special attention to it," he

Bangladesh exports potatoes to Malaysia, Sri Lanka, Benin, Vietnam, Canada, Bahrain, Qatar, Myanmar, Nepal, Oman, Kuwait, Brunei, Saudi Arabia, United Arab Emirates and Singapore.

Russia has a demand for 2.6 crore tonnes of potatoes a year, facing a shortage of 50 lakh tonnes, said market sources. Bangladesh exported more than 20,000 tonnes of the crop to Russia -- out of 103,000 tonnes of potatoes exported in 2013-14 -according to the agriculture ministry.

In 2015, Russia stopped importing from Bangladesh and suggested the latter to upgrade its phytosanitary system, security measures to prevent the use of fake phytosanitary certificates, and maintain proper inspection at ports to ensure shipment of safe agricultural produce.

The production of potatoes is increasing gradually in Bangladesh, and so is the surplus, according to data from DAE.

Shamsul Alom, deputy director (export) of the plant quarantine wing of DAE, said, the DAE has taken up contact farming in some places, to at-tract foreign buyers. "If we can produce good quality potatoes through good practices, buyers will certainly be interested."

Kazi Munni, owner of Refat Enterprise and joint secretary of Bangladesh Potato Exporters Association, said, "Russia should not be our target market as it takes 70 days for the potatoes to reach there by ship.

# SpaceX outs up 60 internet satellites

SpaceX just vaulted a rocket full of 60 satellites into the sky, marking a huge leap forward on its mission to put up a megaconstellation that could beam cheap broadband all over the planet.

This is the first dedicated mission for SpaceX's internet constellation, called Starlink. It kicked off when the company's towering Falcon 9 rocket blazed toward the sky from a launch pad at Cape Canaveral Air Force Station at 10:30 pm ET.

Around 11:30 pm ET, the second stage of the rocket deployed what's called a payload stack — holding all

60 satellites. It slowly began to drop the individual satellites into orbit. Musk said the satellites would

fan out in a way that will look like "spreading a deck of cards on a table." He confirmed in a tweet not long

after deployment that all 60 satellites were "online," and that the devices would soon spread out their solar arrays, which power the satellites while in orbit.
