With the metro rail construction slowly starting to come into view around major pathways throughout the city, now might be the right time to consider what our expectations for the intercity transport system will be, seeing as we are going to be its users.

TICKET/CARD SYSTEM

In order to ensure the trains don't suffer the same fate as our buses, we have to ensure there is a system in place from keeping the trains getting overloaded. There should be a specific capacity set for the train, accounting for both seated and standing passengers.
