Lists of farmers raise questions

Genuine farmers, sharecroppers left out of govt lists in the North; many non-farmers, influentials, political people on the lists

Two government lists of farmers as Boro paddy suppliers are not what they look like. Many of them are anything but farmers.

They include shopkeepers, a contractor and even a former city councillor engaged in a profession other than paddy cultivation. The Daily Star found this in a random field survey based on the lists of Rajshahi

Sadar and Bogura Sadar upazilas. The lists prepared as part of the government initiative to procure 1.5 lakh tonnes of paddy at a fair price directly from

marginalised farmers left out sharecroppers. But many farmers, who have cultivated Boro but do not have surplus paddy to sell, made it to the lists. They said nobody talked to them before listing their names.

One of the lists includes someone who left paddy farming 27 years ago and does not have a farmer's card. Nur Mohammed Mollah, a former

councillor of ward 26 under Rajshahi City corporation, is on the Rajshahi Sadar SCAN THE QR CODE TO WATCH VIDEO





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upazila's list of 48 people.

"For the last four years, we are not cultivating paddy. Now we are doing fish farming," said Mollah, a resident of Meherchandi area.

He used to lease out his land to sharecroppers to grow paddy and that was a few years back. No official contacted him before making this list, he said recently. Shamimul Islam,

Yaba godfather killed hours after arrest

Saiful Karim, a listed yaba kingpin, was shot and killed when police exchanged fire with his associates in Cox's Bazar yesterday, police said. Teknaf Police Station Officer-in-

charge Pradip Kumar Das said they arrested him from the Marine Drive in the tourist town around 10:00pm on Thursday.

However, multiple police sources said Saiful, wanted in seven cases, was picked up by law enforcers from Dhaka airport on May 25 on his arrival from Myanmar. He had fled there after the government declared a war on drug in

May last year. Pradip said that during interrogation Saiful revealed a big consignment of yaba was being smuggled into Bangladesh from Myanmar through the Naf river. Police then took Saiful along to raid the area around 4:00am yesterday to seize the pills.

"Sensing police presence, the yaba kingpin's associates opened fire, prompting police to fire back, triggering a gunfight," said Pradip.

Caught in the line of fire, Saiful as well as four policemen were injured, and were taken to Teknaf Upazila Health Complex, said the OC.

Saiful was later shifted to Cox's Bazar Sadar Hospital where doctors declared him dead. Police recovered nine firearms, 42 bullets and 1,00,000 yaba pills from the spot, he added.

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West Indies steamroll Pakistan

West Indies crushed Pakistan by seven wickets in a one-sided World Cup match at Trent Bridge yesterday, with the two-time champions showing they are a resurgent force in the one-day game.

Fast bowler Oshane Thomas took four wickets as Pakistan were bundled out for their second-lowest World Cup total of 105 in just 21.4 overs on the second day of the competition in England and Wales. West Indies cruised to victory in just 13.4

overs, Chris Gayle top-scoring with 50. He reached his half-century off 33

balls with three sixes and six fours before he was dismissed off the next ball he faced. During his innings Gayle, who

calls himself the "Universe Boss", broke the record for the most sixes hit in World Cup history.

He now has 40 maximums, three more than retired South African batsman AB de Villiers.

Nicolas Pooran smashed paceman Wahab Riaz for a huge six over the square-leg boundary to give the 1975 and 1979 world champions an ideal start to their campaign.

"It was a good game. I think the bowlers were outstanding today," said Holder. "We kept our foot on the accelerator. We've eased off in the past but it was good to see the killer instinct

"We wanted to be aggressive. It's the nature of our cricket with bat, ball and in the field.

"We've definitely come to win this World Cup but I just want us to enjoy our cricket, play fearless cricket and make the fans back home proud." The only positive for Pakistan was three wickets

for paceman Mohammad Amir on his World Cup debut after he missed the 2011 and 2015 tournaments due to a spot-fixing ban of 2010. Amir had Shai Hope (11), Darren Bravo (0) and

Gayle caught in an incisive six-over spell, but the

batsmen had not put enough runs on the board to give the bowlers a chance. Pakistan's sloppy and vulnerable batting was cruelly exposed by some short-pitched bowling by

the West Indies pacemen on a Trent Bridge pitch famous for big totals.

Opener Fakhar Zaman and Babar Azam were the joint top-scorers with 22 each in an abysmal display of batting. The only other batsmen to reach

double figures were Riaz, who scored 18, and Mohammad Hafeez Holder took three wickets and

Andre Russell chipped in with two. Pakistan's lowest World Cup score was 74, made against England at Adelaide on the way to their

only World Cup title in 1992. Pakistan captain Sarfaraz Ahmed, said: "Very disappointed at the batting. I was very confident

before the match, batting was a key point but we didn't apply it to the short ball. "Credit to the West Indian bowlers, they bowled

really well. We have to take time if the bowlers are bowling

like that. We lose so many wickets and that's why we lost the match."

Shumi Akhtar, a student of Jagannath University, reached the capital's Kamalapur Railway Station around 8:30am yesterday. She was supposed to catch a train in half an hour to go to her home in Gaibandha to celebrate Eid with her loved ones.

However, the train -- Rangpur Express -- did not arrive till 1:30pm when this correspondent talked to her at the station.

"I've already waited for five hours. I don't know when I will get home," said an anxious Shumi, adding, "It takes eight hours to reach the Gaibandha station. It will be quite late and that's why I told my father to wait for me there."

Although the railways authorities said the departure time was rescheduled at 2:10pm, the train finally arrived at 4:00pm and left half an hour later, Shumi told this correspondent over phone later. Like her, thousands of Eid holidaymakers had to suffer

this way at the country's premier railway station as at least half a dozen trains -- particularly those running to the northern districts -- were delayed by one to seven hours.
