Traffic nightmare for city dwellers

Eid shopping rush, metro rail construction cause long tailbacks on major roads

Although traffic congestion has become way too common in the capital, the Eid shopping spree and ongoing construction work of metro rail in the middle of roads has exacerbated its severity.

The construction work of Dhaka Mass Rapid Transit Development Project has halved the road space on one of the busiest parts of Kazi Nazrul Islam Avenue.

People have also been suffering because of the shopping spree and holiday-makers rushing out of the city. The tailbacks become unbearable in the scorching heat.

The World Bank in an analysis two years ago said the average traffic speed in the capital per hour has dropped in a decade from 21km to just 7km, which is only slightly above the average walking speed.

Congestion in Dhaka costs about 3.2 million working hours every day,

"In the last few days, it has been taking more than two hours to reach Karwanbazar from Sadarghat. It takes nearly an hour to go across Tantibazar and another to go past Shahbagh intersection," said Sohel, assistant of a bus of Bihanga Paribahan.

"Before the Ramadan, we used to make four round trips. Now we only have time for three," he told The Daily Star.

Due to construction work, the road from Shahbagh to Mirpur has been narrowed. Even at Iftar time, when streets become relatively quiet and empty, vehicles remain stationary on this road, thanks to the rush towards several shopping malls, including Basundhara City Complex and Shah Ali

"The situation is worse than last year," said Ahmed Ali, a traffic constable at Shahbagh.

On weekends, the crowd of shoppers became so immense that police SEE PAGE 5 COL 1

45 held over question leak

Mobile court sentences 12 of them in Patuakhali

Police yesterday arrested some 45 people, including 10 women, from different areas of Patuakhali town for their alleged involvement in leaking the question paper of government primary schools' assistant teacher recruitment test.

Of them, 12 were sentenced to different jail terms by a mobile court while the 33 others were produced before the court, said Nurul Hafiz, additional deputy magistrate of the district.

Of the convicts, Dipu Sikder, 24, and Saiful Mridha, 25, are staffers at the deputy commissioner's office in the district, Hafiz said, adding that each of them was awarded one month of prison sentence.

Some officials were working on the last moment preparation for the test at a room in the DC office on Thursday night when the two entered the room without any permission and tried to get a hand on the question paper, Hafiz said.

They were caught in the act and handed over to police, the magistrate also said while addressing a press conference in the SEE PAGE 5 COL 2

PM Modi rejigs Indian cabinet

Amit Shah takes home ministry, Rajnath gets defence; tough times ahead for Finance Minister Nirmala as data shows a slowing economy

India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Friday named his trusted aide Amit Shah to the key home affairs ministry as part of a major cabinet shakeup for his second term in office.

Rajnath Singh will be defence minister. Nirmala Sitharaman moved from defence to become finance minister in a second shock, while career diplomat S Jaishankar became foreign minister. Nitin Gadkari is the minister of road transport and highways.

Hardline Hindu nationalist Shah was the president of the right-wing Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) who masterminded Modi's second straight landslide victory in the country's national election.

Shah, 54, will now pursue Modi's nationalist agenda in internal security, immigration and other key national issues.

A controversial figure, Shah was accused of ordering police to carry out three extrajudicial killings in his home state of Gujarat in 2005. He was banished from the western state for two years before being cleared in 2014 for lack of evidence.

Recently he hit the headlines after comparing illegal immigrants to "termites" that must be thrown out of the country.

But he has been a close confidante of Modi for nearly two decades and some analysts say Shah is now in place to take over the party if Modi stood down.

Hydrogen-powered flying machine ready for take-off

A transportation company is betting its sleek new hydrogen-powered electric flying vehicles will someday serve as taxis, cargo carriers and ambulances of the sky, but experts say they will have to clear a number of regulatory hurdles before being approved for take-off years in the future.

With six rotors on the roof and seats inside for five people, a passenger model of the Skai (pronounced "sky") unveiled Wednesday near Los Angeles resembles an oversized drone crossed with a luxury SUV.

US to hit Mexico with new tariffs

Washington will impose a five percent tariff on all goods from Mexico -- increasing to as much as 25 percent -- until "illegal migrants" stop coming through the country into the US, President Donald Trump said Thursday.

"On June 10th, the United States will impose a 5% Tariff on all goods coming into our Country from Mexico, until such time as illegal migrants coming through Mexico, and into our Country, STOP," Trump tweeted. "The Tariff will gradually increase until the Illegal

Immigration problem is remedied, at which time the Tariffs will be removed," he wrote. According to a White House statement, the tariff will

rise to 10 percent on July 1, then increase by five percent increments each month until topping out at 25 percent on October 1. "Tariffs will permanently remain at the 25 percent level unless and until Mexico substantially stops the

illegal inflow of aliens coming through its territory," the statement said. "If the illegal migration crisis is alleviated through

effective actions taken by Mexico, to be determined in our sole discretion and judgment, the Tariffs will be removed," it said.

The announcement came the same day that Trump kickstarted the process of ratifying the new North American trade pact with Mexico and Canada -- an agreement that now may be under threat.

The tariffs would have severe consequences on Mexico, which sends 80 percent of its exports to the United States.
