All they wanted was fair price for paddy

14 students of Bangabandhu Tech University asked to show cause for demo on campus

The students had only demanded fair prices of paddy for farmers, but the university authorities think it was anti-government activities.

In an unprecedented move, authorities of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman Science and Technology University in Gopalganj have issued show-cause notices to 14 students for "carrying anti-government and anti-administration placards and festoons" during a protest.

Rathindranath Bappi, who studies international relations, is one of them.

He said they were shocked to see the low prices of paddy this Boro season. So they formed a human chain in front of the university gate on May 16 to demand better prices for farmers.

"We didn't carry any anti-government placards. We just urged the government to ensure fair prices for paddy. Still, we will send our replies within the deadline because we respect our authorities."

The notice, signed by Registrar Prof Nuruddin Ahmed, was issued on May 30.

"Your involvement has been found in carrying anti-government and anti-

administration placards and festoons ... without permission of the administration to destabilise the academic atmosphere of the university, which is a heinous act and it goes against the discipline of the university.

"You are therefore asked to reply in writing in seven working days upon receiving the notice as to why punitive actions shall not be taken against you," it said.

Contacted, Dhaka University's Mass Communication and Journalism department's Associate Professor Fahmidul Haq said students and teachers of all the public universities should be able to exercise their right to be vocal for just demands.

"I don't find anything anti-government here. The students only demanded fair prices for paddy. We often see authorities of some public universities do things overenthusiastically to prove their loyalty to certain political parties. This is one such example."

SM Abdullah Kafi, a third-year law student, said they formed the human chain because it was a national issue.

North-bound trains run late up to 3 hours

Home rush eases up on highways, crowds thin at city bus terminals

For the second day, holidaymakers going to the northern districts faced long delays at Kamalapur Railway Station yesterday, as at least half a dozen trains were behind schedule by one to three and a half hour.

Trains for other destinations left almost on time, with relatively lesser crowds seen at the country's premier railway station.

Many people left the capital through Sadarghat Launch Terminal yesterday, while crowds were at a normal level at long-route bus terminals. No major tailbacks were reported on highways.

Meanwhile, Road Transport and Bridges

Minister Obaidul Quader yesterday said vacationers would be comfortable as he had negated any possibility of traffic jams on highways, reports BSS.

"There is no need to worry about traffic congestion on roads and highways this year. The holidaymakers will also be able to return to the capital city smoothly after celebrating Eid," he told reporters while visiting the Mohakhali bus terminal.

TRAIN DELAYS, SOUR MOOD

Asmaul Islam and nine other masons came to Kamalapur station around 1:00pm from Cumilla to go to their home town of Rajshahi.

"We came to know that our train -- Silkcity Express -- was delayed by more than two

hours. We have nothing to do but wait here," he said.

The Rajshahi-bound train was scheduled to leave the station at 2:40pm but the authority later said it would depart at 5:10pm instead.

Similarly, the Chapainawabganj-bound Rajshahi Express was scheduled to leave the station at 12:20pm but was later announced to be leaving at 2:45pm.

But the train did not reach at the station till 2:30pm. The same train had left Kamalapur station after around a two-hour delay on Friday.

"Delay in schedule is a regular phenomenon for this train. The authority is very much

Disgruntled worker kills 12 in Virginia

The gunman who killed 12 people at a Virginia Beach municipal building before dying in a gun battle with police was identified yesterday as a disgruntled city engineer and co-worker of most of the victims.

All but one of the victims from the mass shooting in the coastal resort community were employed by the city, officials said at a news conference, while the other was a contractor seeking a permit. Four people were wounded.

The gunman, DeWayne Craddock, had worked for the city's public utilities department for about 15 years, Virginia Beach Police Chief James Cervera said at a news conference.

Police said he used a .45 caliber handgun equipped with a "sound suppressor" device and extended ammunition magazines that he used to reload during the attack. They said more weapons were found at the scene and at Craddock's home.

Two police supervisors from a building across the street

GOVT PROCUREMENT

Most farmers denied chance to sell paddy

By the time Saminul Islam reached the government buying centre with 500kg of paddy on Thursday, the officials had already wrapped up the procurement activities there. No more buying, he was told, because the procurement limit was reached.

With a sullen face, the farmer returned home to Dhairkhata village in Lalmonirhat sadar upazila, and all the Tk 400 he spent on carrying the grain from his home and back went to waste. The government buying centre, known as the local supply depot (LSD), is located on Kalibari Road in the upazila headquarters, 3.5km from his home.

"I got 55 maunds of paddy (2.2 tonnes) from three and a half bighas of land this season. I sold two maunds for Tk 900 in the local market due to family necessity," he said. "I thought I would get Tk 13,000 from selling the 500kg, and do the Eid shopping for my family."

Saminul is a listed farmer and can sell up to 500kg of paddy against the agriculture card he has. But the number of listed farmers far exceeds the number of farmers

Top yaba dealer's luxury homes confiscated

Police, for the first time, seized two luxurious houses and land properties owned by a top-listed yaba trader and his family members in Cox's Bazar's Teknaf upazila yesterday following a court order.

The houses were owned by of Nurul Haque Vutto, 33, his brother Nur Mohammad Mongri, 35, and their father Ezahar Mia, 70, police said.

Of them, Vutto is currently on the run while Mongri was killed in a "gunfight" with police in Gopalganj six months ago, said Prodip Kumar Das, officer-in-charge of Teknaf police station.

Ezahar is currently living in his house in Nazirpara village, the OC added.

Police seized these houses and the land properties in separate drives conducted between 10:00am and 3:00pm yesterday, Prodip said.

These proprieties would remain under police custody until receiving any further notice from the court, he said.

The owners of the houses used to be rickshaw-pullers in the past and suddenly became millionaires by trading yaba pills, he further said.

Earlier on May 23, a court of Justice Khondker Hasan
