

Tigers complete second-highest chase in World Cups with 7 wickets and 51 balls to spare

Three sixes off three successive balls, two of them hooked off bouncers delivered by a genuinely fast bowler. 15 minutes later, the score read 305 for three after 40 overs. Nine balls later, a total of 321 was chased down in just 41.3 overs. The batting team were none of England, India or Australia. In a performance that consummately upended perceptions, Bangladesh beat West Indies by seven wickets playing a style of cricket that has not been associated with the Tigers. The second-highest

The style of play may have been a surprise, but the man spearheading the win was not. As Liton Das swivel-pulled the last of a plethora of bouncers to the square leg fence, Shakib Al Hasan crossed over to the striker's end and, with a fist-pump and a smile, calmly uprooted the stumps much like he had extracted the sting from a stubbornly aggressive West Indies attack

successful chase in World Cup history brought over the past three hours. He had to put it back because, as he said later, 'they do not let you keep the zinc bails', but there was no going back from the notion that Bangladesh had served further notice of their prowess.

Shakib regained top spot in the 2019 World Cup run charts with his second successive ton -- yesterday's unbeaten 99-ball 124 following the 121 he struck against England on June 8 -but more importantly, helped lift Bangladesh to fifth in the 10-team World Cup table. The 64 Bangladeshi migrants who have been stranded in the Mediterranean Sea off Tunisian coast of Zarzis for 17 days have finally agreed to return home.

The development comes after Bangladesh Ambassador to Libya Sheikh Sekander Ali had gone to the boat that was 10km off the coast and convinced them to come home.

Chiranjib Sarker, director general of the foreign ministry's consular wing, yesterday told The Daily Star over phone that it took hours of discussion with the migrants to convince them.

"The Bangladeshi migrants will be brought to the Tunisian land first, and will be flown to Bangladesh later," he said. The International

Money in banks not for looting: PM

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has said there is enough money in banks but that's not for looting.

While delivering the closing speech in parliament yesterday before the passage of the supplementary budget for fiscal 2018-19, the prime minister also said the government knows who looted banks in the past.

Hasina, the leader of House, was speaking on behalf of ailing Finance Minister AHM Mustafa Kamal.

Some opposition lawmakers, taking part in the discussion on supplementary budget on Sunday, came down heavily on the government for its failure to check money laundering, soaring loan defaults and black money. They also alleged that banking sector is suffering because

of corruption. "Many say there is no money in banks. Why there

should be no money there? Of course there is money in banks," Hasina said. SEE PAGE 2 COL 3

OC Moazzem sent to jail

Court rejects his bail prayer

A tribunal in Dhaka yesterday rejected the bail petition of former Sonagazi Police Station OC Moazzem Hossain and sent him to jail over recording Nusrat Jahan Rafi's statement on his phone and circulating the video clip on social media without her consent.

Dhaka Cyber Tribunal Judge Ash Sams Joglul Hossain passed the order after police produced Moazzem before the court in a case filed under the Digital Security Act.

The tribunal also fixed June 30 for hearing on charge framing against him.

Nusrat, a student of Sonagazi Islamia Senior Fazil Madrasa in Feni's Sonagazi upazila, was set ablaze on April 6 allegedly for refusing to withdraw a case filed against the madrasa principal, Siraj Ud Doula, for sexually harassing her.


"I don't know how he's spying on me in the shower!" an amused Smith, who relishes long hours in the nets, told reporters. "Yeah, I'm known to play a
