Water crisis risks India's growth

21 major cities to run out of groundwater by 2020

The world's second-most populous country is running out of water.

About 100 million people across India are on the front lines of a nationwide water crisis. A total of 21 major cities are poised to run out of groundwater next year, according to a 2018 report by government-run think tank NITI Aayog.

Much-needed monsoon rains have only just arrived in some places, running weeks late, amid a heatwave that has killed at least 137 people this summer. Groundwater, which has been steadily depleting for

years, makes up 40% of the country's water supply. But other sources are also running dry -- almost two-thirds of India's reservoirs are running below normal water levels, the country's Central Water Commission said in June. Prime Minister Narendra Modi recently created the

Ministry of Jal Shakti (water power) to oversee water resource management, and reiterated his election campaign promise to provide piped water to every rural home by 2024.

But many fear it won't be enough. According to a UN human rights report, the world is fast approaching a "climate apartheid" where only the wealthy can afford basic resources in the face of fatal droughts, famine and heatwaves.

Trump, Xi urged to reach a trade deal

World leaders urge them in the opening of twoday G20 meeting, warn of risk setting the global economy on a downward trend

US President Donald Trump and Chinese President Xi Jinping have been urged to reach a trade deal or risk setting the global economy on a downward path as world leaders gathered in Japan for the G20 summit.

Russian President Vladimir Putin, Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi and European President Jean-Claude Juncker piled pressure on the two superpowers yesterday to settle their differences when they meet on the sidelines of the Osaka summit today.

Many other leaders of the world's top 20 economies also voiced concern over trade tensions and the risk they pose to global growth, but were at loggerheads on key issues such as World Trade Organization (WTO) reform, Japanese and Russian delegates said.

Host Shinzo Abe, the Japanese prime minister, appealed for unity among the bickering world leaders.

"A free and open economy is the basis

Minister Shinzo Abe told his counterparts in the opening of the two-day meeting. Trump has adopted a belligerent

for peace and prosperity," Japanese Prime

position ahead of the meeting, saying that China was desperate to reach a deal because its economy was "going down the tubes". Xi hit back yesterday by saying that

some developed countries were taking protectionist measures that are leading to trade conflicts and economic blockade calling them the biggest risk of the increase in instability in the global economy.

German Chancellor Angela Merkel said she hoped the US and China would make some progress towards defusing their trade dispute at the meeting.

PUTIN SUPPORTS XI

Putin echoed Xi's concerns at the same meeting, saying in a thinly veiled attack on the US that attempts to weaken the role of the World Trade Organisation - as Trump has suggested he wants to do - were "counter-productive".

Sexual assault accused stabs police officer

A man accused of sexually assaulting his neighbour stabbed a police inspector in Pirojpur yesterday.

Haider Howlader, 33, attacked Rafiqul Islam, assistant sub-inspector at Kawkhali Police Station, in Joykul village of Kawkhali upazila, said Kawkhali police OC Kamruzzaman Talukder.

"Around 11:00am, the ASI, along with a constable, reached Haider's house to investigate a complaint of sexual assault. A woman of the same neighbourhood had filed the complaint. As soon as Rafigul entered the house, Haider swooped on him with sharp weapons," he said.

The 35-year-old ASI was taken to Sher-e-Bangla Medical College Hospital in Barishal with serious wounds on hands and head, said the OC.

Haider and his wife had been absconding since the incident, he added.

Lost ancient palace appears in reservoir

A 3,400-year-old palace has emerged from a reservoir in the Kurdistan region of Iraq after water levels dropped due to drought.

The discovery of the ruins in the Mosul Dam reservoir on the banks of the Tigris river inspired a spontaneous archaeological dig that will improve understanding of the Mittani Empire, one of the least-researched empires of the Ancient Near East, the Kurdish-German team of researchers said in a press release.

"The find is one of the most important archaeological discoveries in the region in recent decades," said Kurdish archaeologist Hasan Ahmed Qasim. The palace would have originally stood just 65

feet from the river on an elevated terrace. A terrace wall of mud bricks was later added to stabilise the building, adding to the imposing architecture.

41 hurt as BCL factions clash in Dinajpur

At least 41 students of Hajee Mohammad Danesh Science and Technology University in Dinajpur were injured in a clash between two groups of Bangladesh Chhatra League on Thursday.

The clash broke out around 11:30pm as a former member of the university's BCL unit, along with 20 to 25 of his men, tried to occupy eight seats in Sheikh Russell dormitory, witnesses alleged seeking anonymity.

The injured students were sent to M Abdur Rahim Medical College Hospital. According to the register book of the hospital's emergency ward, 41 students went there and received treatment after the clash. Of them, two students
