Recovery on course

Bangladesh batsman Mahmudullah Riyad's recovery from a calf muscle tear seemed to be on course as the righthander batted for a prolonged period at the outer nets of Edgbaston, the venue for today's all-important World Cup match against India.

Mahmudullah had sustained a Grade 1 tear on his right calf muscle during the Tigers' previous match against Afghanistan in Southampton on June 24. The ensuing seven-day break between matches would have helped the senior batsman recover as it takes around seven to 10 days to recover from the injury.

He appeared to be untroubled by the injury as he was skipping down the track to spinners and hopping on the back foot against pacers without any problem.

Skipper Mashrafe Bin Mortaza was however cautious about his chances while speaking to the media ahead of today's game.

"The physio [Thihan Chandramohan] has not yet given a final call, so there is some time on that front," said Mashrafe, who has also been struggling with a hamstring tear. "I have bowled today, so I am okay."

Team management informed later that a decision on Mahmudullah would be taken in the morning today depending on how the batsman feels after a full day of practice. The team had an optional practice session yesterday which was attended by all members with the exception of opener Tamim Iqbal, who had opted to rest before the crucial match.

Dhoni defended after limp end to England chase

India team bosses on Monday defended MS Dhoni after the wicketkeeper-batsman came under fire for slow batting towards the end of his side's World Cup defeat to England.

Chasing a stiff target 338 to win, previously unbeaten India needed 71 runs from the last five overs of Sunday's match at Edgbaston, with veteran big-hitter Dhoni and Kedar Jadhav at the crease.

But the pair added just 39, scrambling singles but failing to find the boundary regularly, to finish on 306-5. Dhoni was unbeaten on

press and on social media, with pundits labelling their approach as "baffling". But assistant coach

Sanjay Bangar said the criticism levelled at the former captain surprised him, adding that 37-year-old Dhoni was "doing the job for the team".

"Except for one odd innings, he has done the role always. Five out of seven games he has done the job for the team," said Bangar.

"If you see the earlier games, against South Africa he stitched together a partnership of 70 (the partnership was 74) with Rohit (Sharma). After that, what was required of him against Australia he did that.

"In Manchester on a difficult track (against West Indies) he got a vital fifty for us. Here also he was striking the ball really well. I'm surprised that this question continues to come up every now and then.

A powerful middle-order batsman who led India to World Cup glory at Mumbai's Wankhede Stadium in 2011, Dhoni's finishing prowess has recently been questioned.

'Surely not'

For cricket followers, Mashrafe Bin Mortaza is a name associated mostly with his exploits on the field of cricket over the last 18 years and as captain of Bangladesh over the last five. Since December 2018, he has assumed an identity separate from the field of cricket and yesterday, an Indian journalist drew attention to his status as a member of parliament after being elected from Narail in the 2018 general elections.

Up to that point in Bangladesh's pre-match press conference ahead of today's must-win World Cup match against India in Birmingham, the questions and Mashrafe's serious answers revolved around the match. He however cracked a nervous smile when he was asked about another form of leadership.

"Are we looking at the next Prime Minister in the next 10, 15 years?"

Mashafe, who was understandably not ready for such an inquiry, said 'surely not' after a nervous few moments, where he collected himself presumably because it was the last question he would have expected ahead of a game that will make or break Bangladesh's World Cup campaign.

Mashrafe won his election campaign in Narail in December 2018. He has been one cricketer who is universally loved in Bangladesh. Nearing the end of his playing career, his election may divide his popularity along political lines. His response may have been in recognition of that possibility.

A cricketer becoming prime minister has now become a possibility after former Pakistan captain Imran Khan was elected as the head of government in July 2018.

India to persist with Pant at four

India will persist with Rishabh Pant at number four in the batting order to avail the left-right advantage in the middle overs, assistant coach Sanjay Bangar said ahead of Tuesday's Cricket World Cup match against Bangladesh.

The twice champions were left without a left-hander in the top half of their batting order after a fractured finger ended opened Shikhar Dhawan's World

Pant was flown in as Dhawan's replacement and the 21-year-old finally made his debut in Sunday's loss to England, scoring 32 after some nervous running between the wickets early in his knock.

"I felt he had a decent innings," Bangar told reporters at Edgbaston. "He got 32 and played a couple of god shots, got a partnership going (with Hardik Pandya), so we're going to persist with him."

All-rounder Vijay Shankar, who was originally picked in the squad to bat at number four, has been ruled out of the remainder of the ongoing World Cup with a toe injury, the team said on Monday.

"The team management was feeling the absence of a left-hander since Shikhar got injured," Bangar said, explaining the decision to send Pant ahead of Pandya on Sunday. "It was a ploy to use right-left

combination in the middle overs to upset the bowling plans. I feel because of that Adil Rashid could not bowl the number of overs he'd have usually bowled." Known for his six-hitting prowess, Pant

hit a century in an Oval test last year and also smashed an unbeaten 159 against Australia in Sydney in January.

Sunday's match was only his sixth oneday international but Bangar said the time



Pant spent with the World Cup squad has prepared him for the challenges ahead.

"He's spent close to two weeks with us now. He has done well at the international level, especially in the test format. The one-day format is slightly newer to him," said Bangar, who played 12 tests and 15 ODIs for India.

"We're trying to help him with the various mindsets and the roles that come with the middle order job, and the importance of the right-left combination... so straightaway he can put the pressure back on the spinners.

"It can help the team in a big way. On those lines, we've been communicating with him."

India, second in the table with 11 points, need a victory in their final two group matches to qualify for the semifinals.
